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NOISE COMPLAINT

Information Sheet

A significant number of noise complaints are received and investigated by Council officers each year. The complaints are most commonly related to loud music, machinery, building activities, industrial or commercial activities.

All complaints are dealt with confidentially, however complainants should be aware that in all cases a <u>written complaint will</u> <u>be required</u> prior to any action being taken.

Should a matter subsequently involve legal action, a written statement and/or court appearance by the complainant may be required. In all cases, the Council officer will endeavour to negotiate a solution to the situation without recourse to enforcement actions, however in some circumstances, the regulatory tools under the Protection of the Environmental Act 1997 may be utilized.

In general, noise should not be created prior to 7.00am Monday to Saturday and not prior to 9.00am on Sundays or Public Holidays. Evening noise should be limited by 7.00pm Monday to Saturday with all unreasonable noise ceased by 10.00pm. These levels vary slightly depending on the zoning of the land.

A common factor that contributes to noise complaints is conflicting land uses. This may be the interface between rural and residential areas, or areas where dwellings are located near industry or commercial precincts. Managing noise complaints that result from land use conflicts is often time consuming and complex.

A critical step in formally assessing a noise emission is gathering of evidence and formal complaints. The complaint form (attached) once completed will assist staff in building a profile of the noise emission and level of exposure experienced.

There some noise emissions that are specifically exempt from the Noise Regulations - These are;

- Noise from vehicles (engines and brakes) whilst on public roads.
- Noise from trains and aircraft
- Noise from safety warning devices in situations where it is a written (law) requirement to have the safety warning device fitted.

These emissions are exempt as the emissions are either covered under other statutes (Road Traffic Act 1974) or are required for public safety (warning sirens on emergency service vehicles or buildings).

The Local Government (and DEC) has several options when considering enforcement action, from issuing Environmental Protection Notices through to Issuing Infringement Notices and Warnings. The enforcement action is largely driven by the nature and extent of the noise emission.

In some situations the Local Government, after investigating the noise emissions, may not be in a position to take enforcement action. In these circumstances an individual or group of people may initiate a legal case against the noise emitter. Council staff can offer advice on this process if necessary.
