Dardanup Heritage Forum and Heritage Trail Opening

The 2022 Dardanup Heritage Forum was held at Thomas Little Hall in Dardanup on Sunday 20 November, featuring the displays "Women of Charlotte St & Beyond" and "The History of Four Schools".

The new Dardanup Heritage Trail signage was officially opened on the day, unveiled by local resident Gwen Wells along with the Hon. Reece Whitby, Minister for Environment and Climate Action. Les Wallam gave the Welcome to Country, and speakers during the ceremony included Richard Offen, John Giumelli, the Dardanup Shire President, Mick Bennett, member for Collie-Preston, Jodie Hanns and Minister Whitby.

With fine mild weather on the day, an enjoyable day was had by residents and visitors who moved between the Forum, the SW Veteran vintage car display and the Ferguson Valley Visitors' Centre Christmas Market being held at the Old State School. A speaker program was held in the afternoon, with guest speakers Norm Flynn covering the Fee Diaries and migrants from the ship "Travencore", while Richard Offen spoke about society's changing attitudes towards built heritage.

The Dardanup Heritage Collective was formed in 2020, with the purpose of documenting and promoting the history and heritage of this very interesting region of Western Australia. As a group, we knew immediately that with so many stories and sites of significance in Dardanup, adding signage for our already established heritage trail was a top priority. With the help of the Shire of Dardanup, we applied for and were successful in being awarded funding from the Heritage Council of WA. Shortly afterward, through the efforts of Jodie Hanns, further funding was committed to the project by the State Government. A further grant from Wespine Industries was the final step and we were able to get the project up and running.

From the outset, the Shire of Dardanup committed very strongly to the goals of the Collective, and has been tireless in helping us apply for and manage the funds that were received to bring the Heritage Signage project to completion as well as to support the work of members of our group wherever they were able.

The Dardanup Heritage Collective hopes you will all enjoy the Heritage Trail around the townsite and localities. Pamphlets are available from the F.V. Visitor Centre that accompany the trail if you don't want to use the QR codes.

Dardanup Veterinary Centre News

Dardanup Veterinary Centre has been fortunate enough to employ Jamie as a Veterinary Technician & Senior Veterinary Nurse while she is on Working Holiday Visa. We enjoy having her here and Jamie tells us about some of the differences between the practices in Canada and Australia. You may not be aware Australia is very short in Vets and Vet Nurses and Jamie is a great team member.

Jamie, Vet Tech/Nurse – came from Canada to Western Australia. It was a big change, not only in climate but also in what we are seeing our patients for. Being from a city just outside Toronto the craziest things we had come into the clinic were small dogs that had been attacked by coyotes. Most of the time we were able to stitch the little guys up if the puncture wounds weren't too bad. Rabies awareness was another thing we had to deal with at the clinic. Some of our wildlife, such as raccoons, foxes, skunks, and coyotes can have the virus. We always made sure our patients were vaccinated against it and the clients were well informed of the dangers of rabies. Coming to Western Australia I have noticed there are different things you

have to watch out for, such as snakes. Learning how severe these bites can be was a shock and knowing what we needed to get ready in clinic was a learning experience as well. I can't say I have ever had to do a snake venom detection test in Canada, but it was interesting to see how fast everyone must work in these situations. I also never got the chance to try any large animal practice in Canada, which has been one of the areas that are interesting to me. Working at the Dardanup Veterinary Centre gave me the opportunity to experience how large animal practices work. Doctor Liz has taken me on a few farm calls with her and I got the chance to work beside farmers and their Heifers and sheep. I am looking forward to experiencing a Summer/peak Veterinary season in Australia and all of the learning that comes with it!

Dardanup and Districts Residents Association AGM Presidents Report

This year our small Committee has continued to organise activities that have become an important part of community life in Dardanup, such as the Dardanup Times and the Australia Day Breakfast and Xmas Carols organised in conjunction with the Dardanup Lions Club as well as liaising with Council on issues of importance to this community.

Mary Smith initiated our 18th Clean Up Dardanup Day on the long weekend in March. Rural residents of Ferguson Rd and Crooked Brook Rd collected rubbish from outside their properties, the Dardanup Shire assisted by collecting all the rubbish bags. Our Assoc will organise this important event again next year with Mary's assistance.

Our Anzac Day Service was organised this year featuring the story of the postcard sent from Walter Marriner on 2 May 1915, serving in Egypt during WW1 to George Mountford, Dardanup. Speakers were Kim Gosling - Walter Marriner's grandson; Stephen Mountford – George Mountford's grandson and Cecil Mountford, George Mountford's son.

We then organised the 2nd Remembrance Day service as the Shire had the Poppy project in full swing again. About 30 people attended and then we shared late morning tea in the Hall – very successful and looks to be an annual event.

The St John Ambulance 1st aid course is being held this week and next with 15 locals attending and a waiting list to boot. Thanks Mary for coordinating.

The new photocopier is getting a good work out. The Dardanup Times distributed monthly for 23 years has been for the last 8 years produced in house using our photocopier housed at the Shire office. The Dardanup Bull and Barrel Festival and Dardanup Arts Spectacular use it for all their photocopying needs which saved their volunteers time and money. 17 community groups have access to the copier and are charged for the toner used. available online on the Shire of Dardanup website. Out of towners have to pay postage for the year if they wish to receive the Times and there is about 15 of those. Andrea is volunteering her time to present the Dardanup Times which is a huge effort and much appreciated. Chris Commons and Ron Farr have continued to fold the Dardanup Times mostly unaided. A big job and much appreciated. The Times features 3 1/2 pages of business card size ads and 1/4 page supplied by Dardanup Rural Supplies. The advertising in the Times has been well received by local businesses. Dot has done a great job in organising, invoicing and receiving the advertising money which funds printing costs. The Shire of Dardanup have given us an annual grant of \$1100 to assist with the purchase of paper. Wespine has funded 4 coloured pages for 3 years - front, back and front and back inside which means we can place all the coloured posters and photos on these pages. Great effort Wespine and the Shire.Well done to all involved in the production of the Dardanup Times - a very valuable and professional looking newspaper. We run every Tuesday from 9.30 until 11.30 or alternatively we have a playgroup session for the slightly older children to school age children which is run Every Wednesday from 9.30 until 11.30. **Toni Cole**

The Noongar season of **Birak** begins in December. It is known as the first summer and in a '*normal*' year we can expect less rain and warmer weather. The wind patterns are predictably Easterly in the morning and Westerly in the afternoon. I am not a fan of the

hot dry winds and neither are my plants ..

As the weather heats up, our gardens can begin to dry out. It is a good idea to check your irrigation regularly to make sure it is watering where you want it to. If you are planting out seeds and seedlings, try doing it late in the afternoon so that they have longer to settle in before the heat of the next day. Remember to water them in well with seaweed solution to reduce transplant shock. *Slip, Slop, Slap* works in the garden too! Capsicums, Tomatoes and Cucumbers are particularly susceptible to sunburn. A way of making sure your plants can keep their cool, is to erect some 30% shade cloth. It can be a bit tricky to find and I source mine from Jaylon Industries in Malaga. Alternatively, an old beach umbrella can help during the heat of the day, just make sure your plants get some good sunlight exposure in the cooler parts of the day.

Things to do... To avoid an unruly summer patch, keep tying up your climbing vegies as they grow. Fan out your tomatoes on their trellis to make harvesting easier. This also aids in air flow which helps to lessen powdery mildew issues. Keep 'hilling / mounding' your potatoes and trim your sweet potato vines regularly so they focus on creating good sized tubers. You can eat the sweet potato greens steamed/stir-fried or feed them to your worms.

We wait for what seems like an age for our homegrown tomatoes to ripen. They are most tasty when picked in the afternoon - warm and juicy. When you take them into the kitchen, store them on the bench *not the fridge*, to keep that luscious flavour. If you have too many to eat at once, but not enough to make tomato sauce, a good tip is to bag them whole and put them in the freezer. Once you have enough frozen to make a batch of your favourite tomato preserve simply defrost the bags and use as you would fresh ones. They will peel very easily.

Summer vegie patches are a time of abundance, produce and occasionally 'problems'. Two common problems I am asked about are Stink bugs and Blossom end rot.

Why are my tomatoes all blotchy? The Green Vegetable Bug (*Nezara viridula*) or Stink bug are active in summer and lay eggs in 'rafts' (50-100 eggs!) on the underside of leaves. Juveniles are small round black bugs with a few yellow dots, then mature as the distinctly shield shaped, green Stink bug (1.5cm

long). Unfortunately, they are keen on a variety of vegetables, favouring tomatoes and beans. They pierce the fruit with their needle -like mouthparts, sucking out the juice. This leaves behind a pale, shrivelled section or 'corky' area. When they feed like this on beans, it makes the seeds and pods shrivel.

Dealing with Stink bugs: I find the best way is to pick them off whenever I see them, depositing them into a small bucket or

You can use a gloved hand if you prefer, *they are called 'stink bugs' for a reason*! This works for most of the unwanted 'bugs' without needing nasty chemical sprays. Check your washing up liquid is safe to use on the garden. If so, you can then 'compost' the bucket contents after a few days and refresh. If not, simply dispose of down your laundry drain.

Help!! My tomatoes have a black leathery spot on the bottom. Blossom end rot is a disorder that is often caused by a calcium deficiency and it is exacerbated by erratic watering. A dark leathery patch appears at the base of the fruit (the blossom end) and browning around the base of the leaves. This is one of those disorders where prevention is best, prepare your beds well, adding calcium before planting. What can I do? If you find that you do have some damaged fruit, all is not lost. In some cases you can just chop off the effected end and still use the fruit. To remedy the problem, remove and dispose of the damaged fruit, then add some calcium (Lime) to your soil. Ensure you water regularly and the next lot of fruit should ripen normally.

You can still plant more of your summer crops. Most crops will tolerate the heat, however you will find that some don't like it too hot. Lettuce seeds tend not to germinate when temperatures are above 25 degrees C and Beans can drop their flowers when temperatures get above 27 degrees C. Shade any newly planted seedlings for at least a week or sow in a cooler more shaded part of your garden.

What can I plant in December and January?

Leaf crops: Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Cabbage and Chinese cabbage. <u>Root & onion</u> <u>crops:</u> Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, Carrot, Parsnip, Scorzonera, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Yacon, Yam/Oca and Jeruselum artichokes. <u>Legume crops:</u> Climbing Beans, Dwarf Beans and Asparagus pea. <u>Curcubit & Solanum family:</u> Choko, Cucumber, Luffa, Sweetcorn, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Marrow, Zucchini, Tomato, Capsicum, Chilli, Tomatillo, Eggplant, Rosella and Sunflowers. <u>Herbs:</u> Basil, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary, Summer savoury, Horseradish and Chives.

Cleanaway Fine an Absolute Joke

It will have been noticed by many that Cleanaway were recently fined a measly \$18,000 for a Licence Breach at Banksia the Banksia Road Waste Management Facility in Crooked Brook for accepting 20,450.73 tonnes of hydrocarbon contaminated waste from Wren Oil without relevant documentation.

If you get caught using your mobile phone while driving in WA you will be fined \$1000. What Cleanaway did was equivalent to getting caught 3 times a day for approx. 300 days a year. You or I would be fined \$900,000. On the figures above Cleanaway would get fined about \$14 for the same offence.

The purpose of an EPA Licence is to regulate industrial emissions and discharges to the environment. The Cleanaway Licence for Banksia Road is a 54 page document containing sixty eight (68) conditions.

From what was reported and a review of the Licence it appears that this breach could have been for either Condition 1, Condition 60 or both.

Condition 60 requires that the Licence holder \underline{must} ensue that a record is made of:

- i. the time and date of <u>each waste delivery;</u>
- ii. the name and licence number of the carrier;
- iii. the weight of the waste;
- iv. a detailed description of the type of waste;
- v. the determination of the waste type as defined in Condition 1, Condition 2 and Condition 3;
- vi. all supporting documentation related to waste acceptance and classification;

If they were not determining the type of waste they were also in contravention of Condition 1 which specifies the waste types which can be accepted and how they are to be processed.

So how does the penalty compare with the penalties allowed by the *Environmental Protection Act 1986*?

The Environmental Protection Act 1987 classifies contravening a Licence Conditions as a Tier 2 Offence with the penalty for Bodies Corporate being:

Section	Penalty Body corporate	Daily penalty
58(1) Contravening licence conditions	\$125,000	\$25,000

Even if the 20,450 tonnes was considered as a single breach of just Condition 1, a penalty of up to \$125,000 may be imposed. However, there were actually 1250 truckloads delivered, and the Licence conditions refer to **"all waste loads"** and "each waste delivery" which would indicate 1250 breaches each of \$125,000, or a whopping \$156m!!

If the daily penalty is applied then allowing for delivery on 300 days a year (4 loads per day) the fine could be \$7.5m

In June 2022 the same Magistrate also imposed an \$18,000 fine in July for using unauthorised type of waste cover at the facility in early 2020.

On Friday 25th November ABC South West WA reported that "WA's largest regional city is grappling with a multi-million dollar waste problem, after environmental regulators all but shut down its overflowing local tip" (the Stanley Rd Tip at Australind).

The ABC went on to explain "Meanwhile, the City of Bunbury is spending \$44,000 a month to truck household waste to a privatelyoperated facility out of town" (Banksia Rd Tip, Dardanup – the very same tip Cleanaway found guilty of accepting contaminated waste at.)

In July 2021 the Bunbury Harvey Regional Council was issued an Environmental Protection Notice which restricted operations of the Stanley Road Tip which has been classified as a contaminated site due to the as Groundwater beneath the site being contaminated by seepage from the landfill waste which contains ammonia, metals (including aluminium and iron), hydrocarbons (such as from oils, greases, humics and fatty acids) and per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS)

It is hard to comprehend how that after the experience at Stanley Road and the powers the regulator has to prosecute in accordance with the Licence and EPAct, that the disposing of 1250 truckloads containing 20,450.73 tonnes of hydrocarbon contaminated waste at Banksia Road is not taken more seriously.

With this approach it seems only a matter of time before it is declared a Contaminated Site and an Environmental Protection Notice issued.

Welcome News For Ferguson Locals

An automated external defibrillator (AED) is used to help people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It's a sophisticated yet easy-touse medical device that analyses the heart's rhythm and, when required, provides a shock (defibrillation) that attempts to reestablish an effective rhythm.

Sudden cardiac arrest is among the leading causes of death in Australia, and early access to defibrillation significantly increases the chances of survival. In fact, for each minute defibrillation is delayed, the odds of survival are reduced by approximately 10%. When we identified that the nearest AED units were located in

Dardanup, Ferguson Hall, Wellington Mill BFB and Burekup, we realised that they were too far from the Greenwood Heights and Henty localities to be effective with return trips to most exceeding 20 minutes.

When Jeff Jackson, a long-term member of the Ferguson Brigade, suggested he could approach South 32 for a grant, the idea was widely welcomed. After an application process involving the Shire of Dardanup assisting the brigade, we received the funding used to purchase the new unit.

Ferguson Bushfire Brigade Fire Control Officer Lyndon Skeeres commented, "While we hope it remains unused for a long time, it is reassuring to know that in an emergency, we have good access to this lifesaving technology.
