
A Dardy Party To Remember

Boyanup Farmers Market Report

The Boyanup Farmers Market Committee, Manager,

Volunteers and Stall Holders would like to thank everyone that continues to support our Market Day, helping our producers to keep their small businesses going and making our market day always a success.

Our lucky raffle ticket winner in March was our very popular stall holder Joe from Da Silva Seafoods, who always buys \$5.00 worth of tickets and generously donates to the raffle, be sure to purchase a ticket or two at our next market to have a chance to win a great hamper. Locally produced in Western Australia, we have a variety of beverages, including Thomson Brook Wines, Oakway Estate Wines, Fifth Estate Wines, The Cidery, Swan River Distillery, Dean & Angela's Non Alcoholic Ginger Beer, Southern Forest Green Tea and Kuza coffee beans.

Our Market day is always held on the 4th Sunday of each month except the 3rd Sunday in December, our, next market is 28th May, 2023



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June marks the beginning of the Noongar season *Makuru*. Traditionally these are the coldest and wettest two months of the year with frequent storms. Known as the season of fertility, it is when the animals being to *pair up* before the breeding season. With this in mind, be sure to get your major garden pruning done as soon as possible, otherwise you risk cutting down all the nesting birds hard work or having to wait until early summer once the babies have left the nests.

The colder months in our garden are more about management and less about planting new crops. A tip for speeding up germination and reducing rot when planting seeds at this time of year is to soak them in lukewarm water for up to 12hrs before planting. Especially helpful for peas and broad beans.

Did you know... Many of our common Autumn/Winter vegies have edible leaves making them useful additions to salads, stir-fries and stews/curries. These include Beetroot, Carrot, Celery, Choko, Broccoli, Onion, Radish and Sweet Potato. Why not harvest a few while you are waiting for the main crop to be ready.

Edible Perennials need a bit of care and maintenance this time of year. Now is the time to lift, divide and plant out Herbs such as mint & chives, rhubarb crowns and globe artichoke suckers. It is also a good time to plant out asparagus crowns and berry canes. Cane berries such as Raspberries, Boysenberries and Thornless Blackberries are best grown in pots to avoid them suckering and 'taking over' your garden. They are vigorous and can be difficult to dig up, especially if they are the thorny varieties. Now is the time to prune & tie up your existing plants to keep them productive and under control. They all prefer it if you enrich the soil with compost, blood and bone then mulch well.

Harvest your Yacon & Jerusalem Artichoke as you need them, both keep better in the soil than they do in the cupboard.

Fertilise your garlic and winter veg every couple of weeks with a soluble Seaweed or Fish emulsion tonic. Remember that higher Nitrogen % is good for leafy vegies but not your root veg. Check your labels carefully. You can alternate with your homemade weed or comfrey tea.

Bare root trees will become available shortly. Now is the time to think about expanding your orchard, designing your food forest or just getting a few extras. Remember to check pollinator and chill

Council Elections - Our Shire Needs You!

Local government elections are held on the third Saturday in October every two years.

The Shire of Dardanup holds postal elections, which are conducted on its behalf by the Western Australian Electoral Commission.

The next Ordinary election for the Shire of Dardanup will be held in October, 2023.

If you are interested in standing for Council, see the Shire for more info or better still talk to a current Councillor. Nominations open for one week between September 2-9, 2021. hour requirements for each tree. If you know that your soil is particularly hard or in need of specific additions of gypsum or compost, dig your holes a week or more in advance. Mix through your additions and water in, so as to avoid burning your new trees roots. The planting hole should be 30cm deep and at least 45cm wide.

When you are ready to plant. Inspect your tree, trimming off any torn or damaged roots, then give your trees a soak in a bucket with a weak seaweed solution. Prepare your planting hole, it should be a minimum of 30cm deep and at least 45cm wide. Add a handful of blood and bone or aged compost into the hole and mix it into the soil with a shovel. While the tree soaks, fill the planting hole with water and let it drain. To plant, Hold the stem of the tree upright in the centre of the hole, making sure that the roots are evenly spread. Back fill your hole being sure to keep the graft site/bulge above ground level. Water in well. Double stake your new trees (one on either side) and tie them loosely, allowing some movement will promote strong root growth.

The cold slows down growth significantly, so it is best to only plant quick growing crops or advanced seedlings in your vegie patch. *What can I plant in June?*

Leaf crops: Asian greens, Cress, Lettuce, Mustard greens, Witlof, Chicory Brassica crops (seedlings only): Broccoli, Cabbage, Kale, Spinach <u>Root crops</u>: Radish, Potato (frost free only) Legume crops: Broad Beans, Snow peas, Peas <u>Onion family</u>: Onions, Salad onion, Potato onions, Tree onions <u>Edible Perennials</u>: Artichoke, Strawberry plants

In the pantry - Check on your Pumpkins. If you have a few stragglers in the vegie patch pick them now with a 5-10cm piece of stem, as this will help to prolong their storage time. Pumpkins are best stored in a cool, dark place. Make sure they are on their side to reduce any moisture pooling at the stem and it is a good idea to rotate them occasionally so there aren't any rotten bits.

Subsidised Soil Testing Available For South-West Farmers

Expressions of interest have just opened for farmers in south-west WA to join a subsidised soil testing and fertiliser management program through government-funded programs Healthy Estuaries WA and Soil Wise.

The programs enable farmers to make the most of their fertiliser investment without compromising pasture productivity. Previous participants could save an average of \$12,000 per year on the cost of phosphorus fertiliser by following the soil test recommendations. In doing so, phosphorus loss from the farm is minimised, optimising phosphorus needed for pasture growth and out of waterways where they can fuel potentially harmful algal blooms.

Participating farmers test soils across their whole farm, receive support to interpret the results and make evidence-based decisions on nutrient management. In consultation with an agronomist, farmers receive a fertiliser plan specific to their production requirements for every paddock tested.

"We want to assist landholders to better understand soil nutrient levels and how understanding and measuring the nutrients in their soils can optimise productivity on the farm, saving money, improving productivity and assisting with conserving biodiversity." – said Leschenault Catchment Council's Healthy Estuaries WA Officer Jacquie Nichol

David Weaver, Principal Scientist from the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) said that extensive research shows that most paddocks have sufficient phosphorus for good pasture growth.

"Although soils in WA have a reputation for being nutrient poor, our testing of 30,000 paddocks covering more than 370,000 hectares of farmland since 2009 has found that more than 70% of paddocks have phosphorus levels higher than what is needed for maximum pasture growth,"

"This means that many farmers are applying more phosphorus than their soils and pastures need. At the same time, they are not addressing other productivity constraints such as soil acidity or potassium and sulphur deficiencies. In most cases, money is wasted on phosphorus fertiliser that is not needed. Savings can be made and redirected to address any constraints identified through the soil tests," said Mr Weaver.

"Excess nutrients are lost from soils and enter waterways, where they increase the growth of aquatic plants and fuel harmful algal blooms. This can cause fish kills and be dangerous to human health," said Sustainable Agriculture Project Coordinator Dr Deborah Holtham from the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation.

"These negative impacts on water quality are projected to worsen with declining rainfall and increasing temperatures. It is more important than ever for farmers manage their soils and improve nutrient use efficiency. Farmers can help protect our water resources and build resilience in sensitive aquatic ecosystems as we all adapt to variable seasonal conditions and climate change."

The fertiliser management program is delivered in partnership with the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation, the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, Peel-Harvey Catchment Council, Leschenault Catchment Council, GeoCatch, Lower Blackwood Land Conservation District Committee, Wilson Inlet Catchment Committee, Torbay Catchment Group and Oyster Harbour Catchment Group.



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
Dardanup's 100th Celebration

Changes To E-Waste Service

Ensuring compliance with State Government waste disposal regulations while providing a community service that makes it easier to responsibly dispose of e-waste conveniently, has led to changes in delivery of this service.

Our bi-monthly e-waste collections in Dardanup and Eaton by Matt Meijer from E-recovery are being replaced by a more centralised drop-off service at the Banksia Road Transfer Station.

To accommodate this change, the Shire has expanded its facilities at the transfer station to better manage the collection, storage and processing of e-waste.

Mr Meijer will be based at the transfer station and continue to be engaged by the Shire to assist with processing of the waste stream to maximise recycling of the materials and avoid landfill disposal.

Once processed, eligible e-waste will be transported by the Shire to Total Green in Welshpool which is the recognised National Computer and Television Recycling Scheme product stewardship provider for Western Australia. The Shire's e-waste collection service through Mr Meijer's E-Recovery first commenced in March, 2021 and in its first year resulted in an incredible 21 tons of e-waste diverted from landfill. That's about the size of a large, adult whale shark and a fantastic outcome for our environment.

Maintaining a convenient and cost-effective e-waste drop-off service puts the Shire of Dardanup in a positive position ahead of the State Government's commitment to banning of e-waste disposal to landfill by 2024.

Council Plan 2022-32 also has "Adopt innovative and more sustainable waste management solutions" as a listed objective.

Under the service changes, the final community e-waste collection services will be:

Dardanup – 3 June, 2023

Eaton – 26 June, 2023

Following this, residents are encouraged to drop off their e-waste for recycling to our Banksia Road Transfer Station which is available for disposal of General Waste and Recycling between Friday and Monday from 8.30am to 4.00pm and from 1.30pm to 4.00pm on Wednesdays.
