Potential for the outcomes of the group meeting to result in a financial gain, loss, benefit or detriment for the person.

Indirect financial interest

Potential for the outcomes of the group meeting to result in a financial gain, loss, benefit or detriment for a person with whom you have a financial relationship.

Proximity interest

You (or a person with whom you are closely associated) have a proximity interest in any matter that concerns:

- a proposed change to a planning scheme affecting land that adjoins the person's land;
- a proposed change to the zoning or use of land that adjoins the person's land; or
- a proposed development of land that adjoins the person's land (development refers to the development, maintenance or management of the land or of services or facilities on the land).

Impartiality interest

An interest that could, or could reasonably be perceived to, adversely affect the impartiality of the person having the interest and includes an interest arising from kinship, friendship or membership of an association.



- Landscape the residual triangle on the corner of Pratt Road and Ennis Street for additional water sensitive landscaping and possibly community garden beds.
- G Upgrade the irrigation.
- H Investigate a new bore or filter to lower iron content.
 - 7 Eaton Hall (Theatre) New building
- Extend Eaton Hall with sympathetic glazing and timber which are lightweight. Link to a new amenity building shared with the tennis club. Lightweight, natural materials will support the Shire's sustainable direction statement and local supply chain. Provide new toilets, a bar and storage. Improve and activate the theatre with a revamp and wine bar for evening events. Activate the days with the proposed clubrooms to the west.














Bunbury and District Softball - Sports Lighting






