A desktop exercise of the Animal Welfare Support Plan (AWSP) was completed on the 19 May 2021 with relevant stakeholders through the Animal Welfare in Emergencies project.

Animal Welfare in Emergencies (AWE) Project

Through the Animal Welfare in Emergencies (AWE) project, Officers have completed the review of the Animal Welfare Support Plan (AWSP).

The project enabled the Shire to review the AWSP and directly plan for the impacts of an emergency with key stakeholders (both agency and organisations) involved in or responsible for animal welfare in emergencies. A consultant was engaged to facilitate the planning workshop and exercise, both held in May, which provided an opportunity to share best practice examples through input from key stakeholders involved in the review, as well as to test the plan for its effectiveness.

By explicitly recognising and integrating animals into emergency management plans and developing an Animal Welfare Support Plan the benefits are:

- Improved management of animals before, during and after an emergency.
- Improved human welfare and safety during emergencies.
- Provided clear roles and responsibilities within a command and control structure to allow effective implementation of plan.
- Developed specific roles for the management of animals that will be assigned by the Shire e.g. Animal Welfare Coordinator.
- Recognised and included local community groups invested in animal welfare thus expanding response and recovery resources.
- Provided effective communication framework for local stakeholders in an emergency situation.

- Increased understanding of emergency management processes with local animal welfare organisation and groups not normally included in emergency procedures.

WA Emergency Management Conference (AWARE Funding)

Planning for the WA Emergency Management Conference, scheduled for 13th October 2021 at the Bunbury Regional Entertainment Centre, is progressing well.

The Shire has received positive feedback from the Hon Reece Whitby MLA, Minister for Emergency Services who has offered to open to conference, as well as the South West Superintendent Andy Wright.

Key speakers who will offer insight, reflection, understanding and motivation over a wide range of cutting edge topics to our theme 'Building Capacity to adapt in an Era of Unprecedented Disasters' are:

- Dr. Robert Glasser Head of the Climate and Security Policy Centre at the Australian Strategic Policy Institute (ASPI).
- Dr. Kate Brady National Recovery Adviser, Australian Red Cross. Research Fellow Community Resilience, University of Melbourne.
- Aaron Kearney (OAM) ABC International Pacific Disaster Preparedness Broadcast Unit Lead and host of "<u>Pacific Prepared</u>" program.
- Lewis Winter Adjunct Lecturer in Emergency Management, Charles Sturt University
- Tim Muirhead Director of <u>CSD Network</u>.

We are also liaising with a number of other speakers that will add value to the day.

The AWARE Grants Program presented a unique opportunity for the Shire to host and facilitate a conference that will showcase emergency management leaders from around the State as well as providing a learning opportunity and promoting the Shire's leadership in emergency management.

Tickets are now available via the <u>Bunbury Regional Entertainment Centre</u> (BREC) or via the <u>Shire of</u> <u>Dardanup</u> website.

Animal Welfare in Emergencies (AWE) Training Grant Program

After the successful completion of the Animal Welfare in Emergencies project that enabled the Shire to review and update their Animal Welfare Support Plan (AWSP), the Shire made application to Round 2 of the Local Government Animal Welfare in Emergencies Grant Program. WALGA and DPIRD invited grant applications that offered an opportunity for the Shire to enhance the skills and knowledge of Shire Officers in safely dealing with animals during an emergency by attending a three-day training course delivered by the Muresk Institute.

Three opportunities are available to attend the training course, with only 45 positions across the State being offered. Applicants needed to indicate in their application their preferred course date. Each course will be limited to 15 people per course. To be eligible for a grant, Local Government staff who have a direct or indirect role in safeguarding animal welfare in emergencies were encouraged to apply, including, but is not limited to: Emergency Management Officers, Community Safety Officers, and Rangers. There was no limit on the number of applicants from any one Local Government.

Successful applicants will be advised in August with the first course commencing in September.

Mitigation Activity Funding (MAF) 2021-2022

The Shire was successful in its submission to Round 1 2021-2022 of MAF for additional funding worth \$337,295.00, for further bushfire mitigation treatments to reduce the bushfire risks within the Shire. A total of 21 treatments were identified.

- <u>Emergency Risk Management Processes/Treatment Strategies</u>

The Shire is has acquitted the 2020-2021 Mitigation Activity Funding (MAF) after completing mitigation activities to identified areas at risk of bushfire throughout the 2020-2021 financial year. A total of 35 bushfire mitigation treatments were completed.

The Shire will continue to reduce the bushfire risk within the Shire through the 2020-2021 MAF program.

Recent active cases of Coronavirus in Perth had little impact on business as usual activities for the Shire, however did see a couple the Shire's employees being required to wear masks during the period of restrictions imposed on the Perth and Peels regions.

State Pre-Formed Team Exercise

The State PFT Exercise will be held at the Koolinup Incident Control Centre (Collie) during the week 23-26 August 2021. It will be exercising a bushfire scenario in preparedness of the upcoming bushfire season.

Severe Weather Exercise

South West Region participate in a Severe Weather exercise in Margaret River on the 28 July 2021. This exercise was held by the Lower South West Region together with DFES staff, local volunteers and other agencies.

Climate Outlook

The BOM have released their latest climate outlook which is available at http://www.bom.gov.au/climate/outlooks/#/overview/video

- August to October rainfall is likely to be above median for most of Australia, however, parts of western WA are likely to see below median rainfall.
- Maximum temperatures for August to October are likely to be above median for the western coast of WA.
- Above median minimum temperatures for August to October are very likely for all of Australia except in the south-west.
- A negative Indian Ocean Dipole has established, and large parts of the eastern Indian Ocean are warmer than average. This can favour above average winter-spring rainfall for parts of Australia. The El Niño-Southern Oscillation is neutral, with three of seven models suggesting La Niña thresholds may be reached during spring. La Niña increases the chances of above average spring rainfall for much of eastern and northern Australia.

Perth experienced its wettest July for several decades with 271mm of rain received. Catchments are saturated and any rain that falls will flow into watercourses, increasing the risk of localised flooding. Minor flooding was experienced in several rivers in the South-west over the past couple of weeks.

Severe storms through July have resulted in local SES units being called out to protect properties with storm damage and prevent flooding to houses. The provision of sandbags and sand for the Yunderup community to collect and utilise pre-emptively appeared to be successful.

DFES Southwest Leaders Forum

The DFES Southwest Leaders forum 2021 is proposed to be held on 30th October at Koolinup ICC, Collie. Aim is to prepare for the upcoming bushfire season and targeting our current and emerging leaders in the BGUs.

WAFES Conference 2021

The WAFES Conference 2021 will be held in Perth on Friday 10th and Saturday 11th 2021.

Operation of Communities – Mark Schorer
