In 2006 Kerry proudly received a Shire of Dardanup Australia Day Citizenship Award for his community work.



Movies by Moonlight. What a Pawsome event!!


We want to thank everyone who came to celebrate an evening of all things dogs on Saturday, 14 January.

Hello fellow petitioners and other interested residents

I'm bringing to your attention the Final Decision of the Council, of the above issues, at their meeting held on the 23rd November 2022.

Decisions were held with officers from MRWA to investigate the possibility of reducing the speed limit along Ferguson Road to 50km/h up to the last residential property along Ferguson Road.

MRWA reviewed the traffic count data taken and indicated they would not be supportive of the reduced reduction in speed limit along this section of road.

Reason stated that Ferguson Road is a Reginal Distributor Road in an urban or semi-urban area, for which the speed zoning range for roads of this nature is 60-80km/h The current speed limit is already at the lower end of this

range and, given that the 85th

high pedestrianised areas.

percentile speed support the current speed zoning, there is no scope to change it.

It should be noted that the Shires Draft Place Plan for Dardanup does include provision for /the introduction of Traffic Calming Measures along Ferguson Road. These include suggestions such as Artful/Decorative Rumble Strips and/or large stone country pavers as carriageway in the

It could be complemented with street trees of dense bright foliage interspersed with car parking, creating visual cues into a public realm that traffic has entered the town area. Speed humps or speed cushions increase noise levels which can become problematic in residential streets such as Haywood Street.

Based on the data collected by the Shire, it is not recommended that any traffic calming devices are installed. Installing Traffic Calming Devices to control isolated users creates an unnecessary inconvenience to the majority of road users

(Note: I personally do not agree with those statements!) Staff recommend that a Speed Indication Device (SID) be installed for a period of 3 months on Hayward Street and 3 months on Ferguson Road.

These signs indicate the speed of the approaching vehicle and then indicate to a driver of the need to slow down.

The SID signs are mobile and can be rotated between locations are required

For placing of the STD's on smaller urban streets such as Hayward Street, the installation of posts in the front verges of private properties is not recommended, which is essentially the same unit mounted on a concrete base and post.

Therefore it is recommended that the Shire purchases two additional mobile SID signs with bases that allow the units to be easily moved from location to location.

February in the garden is traditionally the hottest month, with long days, short nights and strong easterly winds. It is the beginning of the Noongar

Season *Bunaru* (Second summer) and is the time when the Marri trees bloom. Garden smart in the heat. Try to do most of your work in the cool of the early morning and late in the evening.

Planting. To keep your garden producing well into autumn, there is still time to plant another crop of cucumbers, beans and zucchini (yes more). Despite the heat, it is time to start thinking about your Autumn/Winter crops. If you are starting Brassicas from seed then now is the time to get sowing. If you want an early crop of Broccoli, seedlings of a heat tolerant variety can be planted at the end of the month but I would wait until mid to late March before planting Cauliflower seedlings.

What can I plant in February? Don't feel that you have to plant anything this time of year. It is is better to focus on keeping the water and shade up to the plants you have rather than trying to nurse new seedlings through searing heat. Fast growing greens will taste bitter if they get hot and water stressed. If you are keen to plant, it is best done in the cool of the evening so that your seedlings have a chance to settle in before the heat of the next day.

<u>Leaf crops</u> - Amaranth, Endive, Lettuce, Rocket, Silverbeet, Celery, Chicory. <u>Brassica crops</u> *(plant seeds in trays) - Broccoli, Brussel Sprouts, Bok Choy, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Collard greens, Kale, Mustard greens, Chinese cabbage. <u>Root crops</u> - Beetroot, Carrot, Radish, Potato, Kohlrabi, Celeriac, Parsnip, Salsify, Swede, Turnip, Scorzonera. <u>Curcubit crops</u> - Cucumber, Sweetcorn. <u>Legume crops</u> - Dwarf Beans. <u>Onion family</u> - Leeks, Spring onions, Shallots, Onions.

As this is usually our hottest month, double check your irrigation systems are working and delivering the water to the right place. Every drop is precious this time of the year. Remember trees prefer a good deep soaking a couple of times a week, whereas your vegies will need a daily drink. Don't forget your pots and hanging baskets.

Wait until the end of the month before planting Autumn flowering annuals and bulbs.

Pruning. You can start pruning your fruit trees once you have finished harvesting the crop. This will give them good shape for next season and reduce their water needs over the hottest part of the summer. It is important to remember your good hygeine rules when in the garden. If you have found any diseased plants or leaves, be sure to trim them back, place into a sturdy bag and dispose of in the rubbish. Clean your secateurs, loppers and tools afterwards. Wash in warm, soapy water, then rub with a bit of vegetable oil to prevent rusting. You can use a dab of Methylated spirits on a scourer pad for removing any gum or sap residue.

Seed Saving has begun in my garden with coriander, chervil, spring onions and calendula. As the first summer crop sowings start to finish, be sure to let a few of your best non-hybrid plants go to seed. Herbs such as Parsley, Basil & Chives are very easy to collect seed. As are Capsicum, Chilli, Tomato, Beans & Snow peas. Saving seeds that have grown well in your garden will produce better crops next year and save you money on seeds/seedlings next season.

Be sure to make the most of your summer abundance - bottle, stew, freeze, dry and cook up a storm. *Happy harvesting!*

From the kitchen garden

Basil is abundant this time of year and a perfect companion plant to your tomatoes. It has a relatively short season and will finish with the first frost or the onset of the cool weather.

It can be frozen in water or chopped to make herb butter. One of my favourite ways to make the most of a bumper harvest is making Basil Pesto. It freezes beautifully in an ice cube tray and is a handy one person portion for a quick an easy midweek meal. Try it with veggie noodles or spirals.

Quick and easy Basil Pesto Recipe

- 2 cups of Basil leaves, washed and picked off the stems
 - 1 Tbsp Pine nuts
 - 1 clove of garlic, crushed
 - 1 Tbsp Parmesan Cheese

1/4 cup of Olive oil, extra to cover.

- Transfer ingredients to a blender. Add the oil, a little at a time. Pulse until the contents are a smooth. Try not to do it too long, if it gets hot you will lose the lovely bright green colour.
- Immediately spoon the mixture into a small glass jar or ice cube tray and cover withe extra oil. This will stop the pesto oxidising with the air and turning black. Store in the fridge or freezer.

Stir a spoonful or a cube through warm pasta for a fresh tasty meal.





Weeds as Fuel for Fire – Some Insights from Local Biosecurity Group

Over the festive season and past weeks, fire crews were called to a couple of big blazes in Glen Mervyn & Thompson Brook threatening lives & property. The conditions were ordinary in some fairly ordinary terrain that were beyond the control of fire services, making conditions challenging. These blazes were a running fire ground with blackened earth fingers touching numerous back verandah's. The local Leschenault Biosecurity Group offers the following insights regarding the impact of weeds as an added challenge for fire control as experienced by individuals on the front-line in these past weeks.


A common theme that united these blazes were weeds!

Fire crews struggled with visibility in metre tall wild oats (*Avena fatua*) when driving appliances across paddocks. Secondly, tall wild oats were difficult to control in running fire and a challenge to control with spot overs. The biology of wild oats means it is relatively easy to control with a half-life of seed in 6 months equating to 75% depletion after a year. Late Spring slashing is critical here to interrupt the seed cycle with control in under 3 years!

A relatively new emergent in the Donnybrook-Balingup Shire, and rapidly gaining control, is Cleavers (*Gallium aparine*), also known as "Velcro weed", which forms a sprawling matrix of stems 1m long that clamber onto native vegetation for support. Its leaves and stems have fine backward facing hooks and seed that attach themselves to sheep, clothes, kangaroos and more, which help disperse the plant widely. Cleavers are an annual plant that reproduces each year from seed and *dies off at the end of spring leaving a dense tangle of readily flammable fuel*. In Thompson Brook, when fire became engaged with this material, containment lines were lost as dried Cleavers acted like a ladder fuel and wicked up into the canopy and crowned over unburnt ground. This was a dangerous conflagration!

The Leschenault Biosecurity Group (LBG) acknowledges that anything with Carbon (C6) burns in wildfires but the inter spacing between fine fuels (matrix) can exacerbate a serious situation and scale it up to an emergency level. The group encourages any landholders wishing to make enquiries about weeds that can reduce fuel loads to please drop into their Donnybrook office and have that conversation. The LBG can provide advice and/or equipment to enable an effective spring weed management job to become a reality.

Local communities have been seriously damaged and threatened by fire and a huge thank you to all those that did an amazing job to get the fire front under control and pitched in wherever they were needed. Well done you!



Rabbit Control – got rabbits? Landholders across our area are encouraged to participate in local biosecurity group's summer Calicivirus "K5" Release Program.

Rabbits occur everywhere from urban areas to extremely remote, rarely visited sites. As a country, we are all part of Australia's over 160-year long battle to control the spread of hordes of hungry, rapidly multiplying rabbits, to prevent the significant impact and damage they cause to our environment, economy and more. Over the past months community members have reported seeing more rabbits on their properties than they have seen in a long time. This is most probably largely attributable to very wet weather we have had over this past winter and spring as rabbit densities are generally highest where the total rainfall the year prior was more than ~400mm, creating good growing conditions for green feed enhancing breeding and nourishment for kittens, better enabling rabbit populations to rapidly increase. Rainfall in our area in 2022 greatly exceeded this.

If you have a rabbit problem on your property, the Leschenault Biosecurity Group (LBG) encourages you to participate in its current Calicivirus RHDV1 K5 summer release program. Collaboration increases effectiveness: Rabbits reproduce very effectively, and complete elimination of rabbits is close to impossible. With community members working together, significant decrease in numbers can be achieved. The group encourages neighbours to link up to organise a coordinated release and increase the success of the release across the community. The more people that participate, the more effective this program will be.

Facts from the LBG about the RHDV1 K5 Virus Release Program:

- RHDV1 K5 a naturally occurring virus that is selective to the European rabbit only and does not affect other species, even if a pet ingests an infected rabbit.
- Pet and domestic rabbits can be immunised against this virus with the vaccine currently used to protect rabbits against infection from other strains of calicivirus.
- This virus can help significantly reduce rabbit numbers, providing better opportunity to employ further property-specific strategies to make them more manageable.
- It is critical that we do not rely just on the virus alone, but incorporate the virus release with other rabbit control strategies
