The 100th birthday party has 3 elements. A street parade which commences at 10.00am. Rural Residents Encouraged to Cleanup Their Verge recycling industry, soft plastics rose by 7%, hard plastics **During the March Long Weekend**

Sunday 5th of March is the official National Cleanup Australia containers, food packaging and lids making up 25% of Day. Mary Smith, Committee member of the Dardanup and Districts Residents Asssoc and local Coordinator of Cleanup Australia Day encourages rural residents to clean up the verge along their boundary. Mary says "This does not necessarily have to be done on the 5th March but can be done as soon as you collect a bag from the Shire Office or use your own bags and before Shire Council pick up from Tuesday 7th March. Bags can be collected from the Shire the week prior to the cleanup. The Dardanup Shire will collect the bags along Crooked Brook Rd, Ironstone Rd and Ferguson Rd from Tuesday 7 March. If you live elsewhere such as Henty, West Dardanup or Wellington Mills then please advise the Shire of Dardanup in Little St and they will arrange collection or alternatively dispose of the rubbish in the usual manner."

For your information Clean Up Australia's 2022 National Rubbish Report reveals that plastics account for 63% of the rubbish items removed from our parks, schools, bushland, creeks, beaches and roadways, indicating a 17% increase from 2021. Bringing to the forefront one of the great challenges facing Australia's

by 5% and polystyrene by 5% compared to 2021, with single-use plastics such as plastic bottles, takeaway all reported rubbish.

During 2022 Clean Up Australia continued to encourage volunteers across the nation to clean up, fix up and conserve the environment by taking to their streets, beaches, parks, bushland and waterways to remove accumulated rubbish. An estimated 934,433 Australians registered 12,474 Clean Up sites, donating around 1,868,886 hours of their time and effort across the nation.

Amid the country's current soft plastics crisis and after the halt of REDcycle collections, the current plastic waste challenges in Australia are concerning. A report by the Minderoo Foundation found Australia generates the most single-use plastic waste in the world per capita, with the equivalent of 60kgs of waste for every Australian per year.

March is the second month of the Noongar Season *Bunaru* (Second summer) and one of my favourite times in the garden. The mornings are cooler but the days are still warm and the vegie patch is a riot of produce. Keep harvesting and getting creative in the kitchen. Every little bit of preserving counts and there are plenty of recipes to freeze, dehydrate, bottle, pickle and ferment your harvests.

As some Summer vegetable crops reach their peak, others are showing signs of finishing, and there are beginning to be a few gaps. These give us room to start planting our autumn and winter crops. You don't have to wait until all the crops are finished, when you pull something out, plant something in its place. That way you will always have something to eat! The only crops that I plant in their own beds are garlic and onions.

Preparation of your soil is important as many winter crops require specific conditions. The Brassica family are 'hungry' crops so will need the addition of some well rotted, good quality compost. They also prefer slightly more alkaline conditions (pH 6.5-7) so add Lime or Dolomite as needed. Your beetroot and pea crops will also thank you.

March and April are busy planting times. Seedlings (instead of seed) for slower growing crops such as Broccoli, Cabbage, Kale and Silverbeet are a great way to get a head start. Successive plantings of fast growing salad and stir-fry greens will also help to fill the gap between the summer veg and your winter crops. Remember that it is best to plant your seedlings out late in the afternoon / evening so they have a good chance to settle in before the heat of the next day.

Toward the end of the month it will be time to consider planting your Garlic. They are a crop that doesn't like too much competition so grow it in a dedicated bed if possible. Prepare the bed a couple of weeks before planting by adding a light sprinkling of lime, some good organic compost and a few

handfuls of rockdust. Hold off planting until after the Autumn equinox (21st) and the days are consistently below 25 degreesC. When ready to plant, make sure the soil is moist and work out how to fit the most cloves into your space - neat rows or block planting. Plant the cloves 10-15cm apart so they have room to grow and there is less space for weeds.

For block planting, you can use an old 'garden' muffin tray as a guide. Press down on the tray to imprint the circle pattern onto the damp soil. Continue the pattern to cover your entire planting area. Then use a stick about as thick as your pointer finger (not very technical but it works) to make a hole twice the depth of the garlic clove in every second space along the row of holes. The holes in alternate rows should be offset so that you plant a clove in between each 'square'. Plant one clove per hole with the pointy end up. Lightly rake the soil surface and water in gently. Garlic is a low maintenance crop-Feed them once a month until October, water when it doesn't rain, pull the odd weed and in 8 months time, harvest. Easy...

What to plant in March:

<u>Leaf crops</u> Asian greens, Celery, Chicory, Cress, Endive, French sorrel, Lettuce, Mustard greens, Orach, Radicchio, Rocket, Spinach, Silverbeet and Watercress. <u>Brassica crops</u> * (plant Seedlings) Broccoli, Broccoli Raab, Brussel Sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Collard greens and Kale. <u>Root crops</u> Beetroot, Carrot, Celeriac, Daikon, Kohlrabi, Parsnip, Radish, Salsify, Scorzonera, Swede and Turnip. <u>Legume crops</u> Broad Beans and Snow peas. <u>Onion family</u> Garlic, Leeks, Spring onions, Shallots and Salad onions. <u>Herbs:</u> Bay, Caraway, Chives, Chervil, Coriander, Fennel, Lemon Balm, Mint, Rosemary, Oregano, Parsley, Sage, Thyme, Salad Burnett, Strawberry runners

Want to Keep Bees?

Couple of things you must do first

1.Register with DPIRD(Dept of Primary Industries Research and Development)

You will need to download this form <u>DPIRD application for registration as a beekeeper</u>.

You will then need to find an available brand. A hive brand is made up of a combination of 3 letters and numbers and can be chosen by you (so long as it has not already been taken). A hive brand search can be done on the DPIRD website to search for existing brands. If it shows that no records have been found then you're on a winner and you can write it on the form! The form can then be posted, presented in person at any DPIRD office, or scanned and emailed to the address listed at the top of the form. Once registered you will receive confirmation of your hive brand. Your brand must then be applied to your livestock. Luckily we are not required to brand every bee!

Just every box of our hives. Some also choose to brand their lids, bases, and frames.

Please note that simply painting (or writing) the brand on your hiveware is not sufficient. There are certain standards that must be met. The WA Apiarists' Society has a great section on what these standards are on their <u>Legal Obligations</u> page.

2. Register with the Shire of Dardanup. The Council has a policy and form to complete but no fee. Speak to Michelle Dennis at the Shire who is very helpful and knowledgeable.

Also there is a local branch of the WA Apiarists Soc(website too and newsletter) who meet regularly at the Edith Cowan Uni, see add this edition. Wealth of info there.

E-waste Collection Service

The Shire of Dardanup are throwing their support behind the passionate work of shire resident Matt Meijer to divert from landfill more e-waste and other recyclables not permitted in your yellow-lidded bin.

Council has committed funds to help Matt Meijer of E-Recovery with providing a regular and convenient e-waste collection service for residents.

Collections are provided at Carramar carpark, off Little Street, 9.00am to 11.00am, first Saturday of every month.

What can you drop-off?

- All e-waste Matt says anything with a powercord or battery-powered like kitchen and household appliances, tvs and audio, landline and mobile phones, toys, tools, computers and accessories. (Please empty vacuum cleaners and provide clean items only.)
- All types of metal
- x-rays
- prescription glasses
- Nescafe branded coffee pods
- candle stumps
- Bread bag clips

What can't you drop off?

Items classified as Household Hazardous Waste such as paint, medicines, pesticides. All HHW can be taken to the Stanley Road Waste Management Facility in the Shire of Harvey.

Banksia Road Transfer Station - Under the trial, E-waste items listed above can also be dropped off at our Banksia Road Transfer Station at no cost.

Community Recycling Stations- Another way we're making it easier for you to recycle is via our 5 handy Community Recycling Stations.

Drop off batteries, plastic bottletops and bulbs to one of the locations:

- Administration Centre, Eaton
- **Eaton Community Library**

Dardanup Office

Batteries and bulbs fall into the category of Household Hazardous Waste and if not disposed of correctly, pose both a health and environment threat. They don't belong in your Redlidded general waste bin.

And plastic bottletops can be recycled but not by the processors who collect your kerbside yellow-topped recycling bin. They need to go to a different processor so drop them off at one of our Recycling Stations.

Where does it end up?

- E-recovery works to re-home and reusable items.
- Most E-waste is being dismantled by E-Recovery and the materials are recycled through the metal recycle industry.
- Unfortunately plastics from e-waste are not being recycled and go to landfill, although Matt has purchased a shredder with the hope of providing shredded plastics like ABS to recyclers in the future.
- Coffee pods are recycled by Nescafe
- Bread tags go to "Bread tags for wheelchairs"
- Prescription glasses go to the Lions Club
- Candle stumps are melted down to make new candles Bottle tops go the Precious Plastics in Margaret River

Dardanup Veterinary Centre News

Travelling with your pet-some major problems/diseases to watch for.

Heartworm

Heartworm is a parasite passed by mosquitoes and affecting mostly dogs and occasionally cats.

It has been predominately in tropical Australia but spreads to Perth, Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and the South West of WA (to a very small extent) approximately 30-40 years ago. The boom in domestic travel around especially the North of WA, NT and QLD has seen an increase again.

Ensure your dog has heartworm prevention (as monthly tablets, yearly injections or monthly backline) and continue to treat for 5 months later (if not always).

2. <u>Ehrlichiosis – See below article</u>

Paralysis Tick

This tick mostly lives in bushland close to the east coast of Australia (QLD, NSW, possibly Northern Victoria Coast). Again use tick control and check your dogs. It will paralysed your dog over a period of several days. Watch these things and enjoy travelling with your pet.

EHRLICHIOSIS.

Pronounced Ur-lik-ee-oh-sis.

Ehrlichiosis is a disease that is transmitted by Brown Ticks, or Brown Dog Ticks. Ehrlichiosis positive ticks can transmit the disease as quickly as 3 hours after first attaching to the dog's skin.

Ehrlichiosis was first recorded in the top of Northern Territory WA in 2019. Since that time, the disease has expanded, now reaching into the North of South Australia, the middle of Western Australia, the Northern Territory and Queensland. Ehrlichiosis cannot be transmitted from dog to dog and is only spreadable by ticks.

How will I know if my dog has Ehrlichiosis?

Some dogs may not look sick while others will look really sick really quickly. There is a period where your dog may not show any signs of infection, and that is common. Signs of Ehrlichiosis are as follows:

- A fever or high temperature
- They may be lethargic and not move around us much as normal
- May go off their food,
- Weight loss,
- Cloudy eyes,
- May have swelling around the head and neck,
- They may develop a runny nose or eyes,

They may have unusual bruising or bleeding and their gum colour will be usually pale or yellowed.

If your dog has any or some of these signs, contact your veterinarian, and they will tell you what to do. It may mean taking your dog to a local veterinary clinic or hospital.

How do I look for a tick?

Ideally, if you are travelling in the area's mentioned in this article, you want to be checking your dog daily. Looking for a tick is simple. Start by running your fingers through the dogs coat, so your fingers are touching the skin, and feel for abnormal bumps. The ticks are approximately 3-5mm in size, however, when they first bite and attach to your dog, they can be smaller, compared to a tick that has been feeding on the dog for a few hours.

Pay particular attention to the head and neck, inside the ears, on the check, between the toes, and around their mouth and gums. Ticks prefer places that are warm and tucked away, and they can hide well, which is why veterinarians suggest checking the skin daily.

What do I do if I find a tick?

If you do find a tick on your dog, don't panic. Finding a tick on your dog may be scary, but there are things you can do if you find one. The first thing to do is to contact your local veterinarian, they can suggest ways of getting the tick out easily and completely. If you were to try and remove the tick yourself, you may end up leaving the head of the tick, or causing the tick to administer more of the disease.

How can I prevent Ehrlichiosis?

Ehrlichiosis can be prevented through careful monitoring and using prevention methods in conjunction with your local veterinarian. Effective/Registered dog tick control provide the major layer of protection. Prevention is always better than a cure. If caught early enough, Ehrlichiosis can be treated, but if left, it can become fatal.







Shire of Dardanup News

At the Dardanup Shire Council's February meeting, Cr Janice Dow submitted her resignation. Cr Dow commenced in 2017 and was elected for a second four-year term in 2021. The next WA Local Government election will be held in October this year. Dardanup Shire President Mick Bennett said Council would consider at its March meeting whether to hold an immediate Extraordinary Election or seek permission from the Electoral Commissioner to leave the seat open until the Ordinary Election in October. Cr Bennett thanked Cr Dow for her committed and passionate service to the community living in all areas of the shire.

Project Update: New Library, Administration & Community Centre

The fenced construction site of the Shire of Dardanup's new Library, Administration and Community Building will spring to life in coming weeks as our contractors move in to begin piling and excavation works in preparation for installation of footings.

Road users accessing Council Drive will encounter minor traffic management conditions.

Shire contractors Perkins Builders took possession of the 4,450 sq m site adjacent to Eaton Fair in December, installing fencing and a site office.

Construction start marks a new chapter in the history of the Shire of Dardanup and its community with completion set for early 2024.

Dardanup Shire President Mick Bennett said the project would deliver a community hub of the future providing an engine room for collaboration, connection and innovation while showcasing the potential for leading sustainable timber construction.

The new building will comprise Library, Council Chambers, Administration Centre, Makerspace plus mixed-use of community spaces – it is a modern two-storey, L-shaped building clad predominantly in stringy bark with charred jarrah timber as accents. It will be a landmark demonstration building for the Shire as a mass timber structure made with Cross Laminated Timber columns and beams, timber floor cassettes and light timber framing. Its L-shape will allow for a civic courtyard space, accessible from the Library and Council Chambers. The library courtyard space will allow for an outdoor play area for children and seating for patrons to read a book or linger and share a coffee with mates from the coffee hub in the library.

First Art Trail Stop On Its Way



Renowned South West multi-disciplinary artist Andrew Frazer has won a bid to design and install the first spectacular stop along what will become the Shire of Dardanup's Ferguson Valley Art Trail.

The full art trail concept includes 15 proposed public art installations throughout the shire and will give more local artists an opportunity to contribute their creative flair to the region through a variety of mediums including sculpture, mural painting, photography and more.

A number of community consultations and artist workshops have been conducted over the past 12 months to inform themes, locations and inspiration for the larger trail concept.

Dardanup Shire President Mick Bennett said: "We are happy to give our local arts community opportunities to develop their skills and also be seen and celebrated by visitors and locals to the region."

"Andrew's sculpture responds to the theme of 'Grow' which we hope is exactly what this project will continue to do."

The first piece, located at the Pile Road pull-in bay and scenic view point will be a circular steel sculpture, inspired by the community, lifestyle and site itself.

Mr Frazer said he design process began with a study of the site and surrounds. "Being a South West artist, this site spoke to me personally and my connection with this community on a deeper level," Mr Frazer said. "The lifestyle, community and celebration of the Ferguson Valley is represented in the art and sculpture - a nod to the growing wine industry within the Ferguson Valley and a nod to the life blood of growth — water. "I want to represent both of these forms and give the community an interactive piece that serves as a frame for photos and the beauty of the valley itself."

Mr Frazer's sculpture installation started this month. Stay tuned for further updates...

Following completion of the \$1 million Wells Recreation Park changerooms in Dardanup back in October, the old public toilets have now been permanently closed ready for demolition. Public toilets are now available for use in the new changeroom facilities.

Have Your Say On New Planning Scheme

The community is invited to have its say on draft Local Planning Scheme No. 9.

The Shire of Dardanup has developed Local Planning Scheme No. 9 to replace current Town Planning Scheme No. 3. The Scheme is a document used to control land use and development in the Shire of Dardanup. It specifies how the land may be used (zones) and developed and outlines the processes to be followed before development can occur. Our expert Planners, apply the Local Planning Scheme to applications and proposals in conjunction with Scheme Maps, State Planning Policies and the applicable Local Planning Policies and Strategies. Under State Planning Laws, Local Governments are required to review their Schemes every 5 years.

The purpose of Local Planning Scheme No. 9 is to:

- Set out planning aims and intentions for the Scheme area;
- Set aside land as local reserves for public purposes;
- Zone land and define its purpose;
- Control and guide development;
- Set out procedures for the assessment of development applications;
- Set out procedures for contributions made by land developers toward the cost of providing infrastructure connected with their developments;

Make provision for the administration and enforcement of the Scheme.

The resulting document is a more contemporary land use planning scheme and has been prepared in accordance with latest amendments to the Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015.

Submissions must be lodged on or before 4:00pm, 23 May, 2023.

Plans and documents setting out and explaining the planning scheme are available for inspection at the Shire Council Offices – 3 Little Street, Dardanup and 1 Council Drive, Eaton and at the Eaton Community Library – 2 Sanford Way, Eaton or can be viewed online via the below links. Dardanup Environmental Action Group News

Just prior to Xmas DEAG met with DWER staff from Perth and the Bunbury office plus Jodie Hanns MLA to discuss the ongoing concerns about Cleanaways Banksia Rd Landfill site and the adjoining Bunbury Harvey Regional Council Composting facility. Yes, we are still fighting on behalf of the residents of Dardanup to stop Cleanaways expansion of this site, to ensure it is operating as per the licence and to move the composting operations to Stanley Rd where it belongs. Residents who live in close proximity to the Composting facility have had enough of the putrid odours from this site.

Recently Cleanaway organised an Open Day of the Banksia Rd landfill site with locals and some from the wider community filling 3 buses visiting at different times. Some of the attendees had backgrounds in metallurgy and mining and were disappointed that some of their technical questions couldn't be answered as Cleanaways Regional Manager John Mulholland, leading the tour, had no professional qualifications in waste management, engineering or mining. Johns knowledge of radiological requirements as per the licence was also limited.

Others were disappointed that John didn't seem to place any importance on vegetating the front face on the Landfill. As this is the view that all residents of the town, tourists and other locals view every day we found this concerning to say the least.

Currently the most southern side of the western face(the raised portion) is sitting at 122m and the entire front face will before too long rise to 128m so the landfill will become a lot more visible. Yes and you thought you could easily see the landfill now! Even though Cleanaway have applied to the Shire and DWER to extend the height of some areas of the landfill to 152m John advised that he didn't think Cleanaway will pursue this. DEAG isn't so sure.

We were also concerned when during the bus tour John stated that they had commenced the capping of Cells 1,2 and 3 when we know that DWER have not approved an amendment to their Licence as we have been advised by DWER that a number of issues (many raised by DEAG) have still not been resolved. He also stated that the closure and rehabilitation plan for the first Tronox Cell had been completed and ready to proceed, this however has been contradicted by DWER who (when we requested a copy) advised DWER has not yet assessed the Rehabilitation and Closure Plan for the TDS Cells. We have since been advised that *The document forms a component of a larger EPA approval application that Cleanaway will be releasing later this month and so would like the package released as a whole where it can be read in context.*

DEAG is expecting the CEO of the Conservation Council of WA to attend 1 of our meetings in the near future so we can discuss the refinery tailings being landfilled at Cleanaways Banksia Rd Landfill site and the impact that this landfill site has on the neighbouring Dardanup Conservation Park and the threatened flora and fauna that live there.

Huge thankyou to Fiona Moriarty who was the DEAG Secretary for some years and is moving to Margaret River. Fiona has been a passionate supporter of DEAG, not afraid to ask the hard questions and will be missed.
