Shire's New Building Wins Two Prestigious Awards From the Shires website



The Shire of Dardanup's newly constructed Library, Administration, and Community Building claimed two distinguished awards at the Institute of Public Works Engineering Australasia (IPWEA) Awards.

The groundbreaking \$16.5 million project received the Best Public Works Project Greater than \$5 million Award (Regional) and the Excellence in Environment and Sustainability Award.

Shire of Dardanup President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner said these accolades underscore the Shire's unwavering commitment to excellence in community infrastructure and environmental stewardship.

"It is truly an honour to receive these prestigious awards from the IPWEA. This recognition underscores Council's vision in creating a space that not only serves our residents but also champions sustainability and environmental consciousness," Cr Gardiner said.

"Congratulations to everyone involved in the creation of the new Library, Administration, and Community Building. It marks the culmination of an 11-year project and the beginning of an exciting new chapter for the Shire's community members, businesses and staff."

Scheduled to become the new heart of municipal operations, the two-storey complex will house the Eaton Library, Council Chambers, Administration Centre, Café, and a state-of-the-art Make-It Space.

Cr Gardiner emphasised the significance of the project which

is the fourth all-timber build undertaken by the Shire, reflecting its commitment to Council's 2050 Vision and Wood Encouragement Policy.

"By incorporating timber into our civic structures, we are not only reducing our carbon footprint but also leading in sustainable construction practices," Cr Gardiner said. "We can't wait to open this building to the community and believe this is something they can all be proud of and utilise daily, in the heart of Eaton."

Cr Gardiner said staff relocated into the new building between Monday, 18 March and Monday, 25 March. He said members of the community can access the new building from Monday, 25 March, followed by the reopening of the Eaton Library on Tuesday, 26 March.

Cr Gardiner said the Shire will host a Community Open Day on Saturday, 4 May from 10 am-1 pm, which will include guided tours of the new building, a sausage sizzle, face painting, engaging library activities for children, and dynamic Make-It Space activations. The new Library, Administration and Community Building was designed by Perth architect Peter Hobbs and constructed by local construction company Perkins Builders.

No Folks This Hasn't Gone Away! **Greenbushes to Bunbury Rail Project – Detailed Feasibility Study**

January-February 2024 Update

Thanks for your continuing interest in the Greenbushes to Bunbury Railway Project Detailed Feasibility Study (DFS). We wanted to take this opportunity to provide an update on the status of the DFS.

Engagement Opportunities

The most recent community information sessions were held in Manjimup and Bridgetown on 20 and 21 February 2024, respectively. The feedback received during the sessions has been fed into the technical studies that are underway. We are in the process of engaging with the local government authorities through which the rail line passes. The focus of the discussions is how the rail line will be managed where it passes through town sites.

Please keep a look out for upcoming community information sessions, which will likely occur mid-year. This is when we are expecting to have more to share on the studies that are currently underway. Information about upcoming sessions will also be posted on www.talisonlithium.com/projects, and through local channels.

Other Upcoming Activities

You may notice additional people undertaking works along the rail line in the coming months. This includes geotechnical surveys, which are starting to occur along the line. These works are required to inform the DFS.

Frequently asked questions

We continue to receive questions via email, and thought we would share these with others, as outlined below.

Will there be train drivers or will the train be automated?

Train drivers will be required, the train will not be operated autonomously. Multiple train operators may be required for a single train – this is yet to be determined.

Is there an opportunity for tourist/passenger rail if the line is recommissioned?

If the railway were to be recommissioned, the infrastructure would be available to other users. The DFS is investigating a freight rail operation, which has different requirements to passenger rail. In summary, a passenger rail operator would need to meet a different set of regulatory requirements and come to its own commercial arrangement.

How many Talison freight trains would travel the line each day?

It is expected that eight train movements per day will be required – four movements each way.

How long will a driver or pedestrian have to wait at a level crossing for a train to pass?

The wait would be approximately 90 seconds, for freight trains carrying Talison product.

Has the project group considered redirecting the railway into the mine? For example, across the highway?

The scope of the DFS is to investigate recommissioning of the current gazetted line, and is not currently investigating redirecting or extending the line. At this stage, it is expected that Talison trucks will cross the South West highway, to transport product from the mine to the proposed intermodal facility, the location of which is currently being evaluated.

How will noise impacts be managed?

The noise freight trains make is dependent upon a combination of factors which include speed, the rail corridor environment (for example, tunnel or open track) and the rail and wheel contact dynamics. This combination means the same train may make different noises at various points on the track. There is a requirement for train horns to sound on the approach to a level crossing. The sounding of the horn is therefore intentionally loud and above ambient noise to effectively warn of and to attract attention to an approaching train, even if it isn't immediately visible.

Noise will be further investigated as a part of the Detailed Feasibility Study. This study will include noise related to operation of the proposed intermodal terminals, as well as other potential sources of noise, such as trucks.





April is the beginning of the Noongar season **Djeran**. Autumn is here, the Magpies song has changed and there is dew in the mornings.

We are still waiting on the rain

but heed the cues! It is time to get busy preparing your soil and planting your Autumn/Winter crops.

April is a month for pruning and tidying up in the garden. If you have access to a mulcher, try to chip/shred as many of your prunings as possible. Smaller sized pieces break down faster in the compost heap and save you money on buying mulch. Pruning your fruit trees now will shape your trees for next season and help to promote good fruiting. While it isn't as easy to see all the branches with the leaves still on, it will limit the crazy growth that happens when you winter prune dormant trees.

Healthy soil means healthy crops. If you haven't done it already, get busy preparing your soil. Feed the soil microbes by adding compost or aged manure, some rock dust and/or vermicompost (from your worm farm). Remember that your Brassica crops are 'hungry' and will need enriched soil to give you a good harvest. During the colder months, extra applications of fertilisers and tonics take longer to be effective, so good soil preparation now will save you time and effort during winter.

Two important yet often overlooked Autumn garden tasks are saving seed and planting green manure crops.

Why save seeds? Saving your own seed (from open pollinated varieties) is a great way to reduce your costs, gives you the ability to grow & eat more variety, while having seeds that continue to adapt to your local conditions. Easy ones to get started with are Beans, Tomatoes and Pumpkins. When ordering and planting your Winter crops, try to get open pollinated seeds or seedlings, so you can save your own for next season.

Green manure Crops 'work' for you in a variety of ways to replenish the soil, feeding microbes, acting as a living mulch and suppressing weeds. You can purchase an Autumn mix from most stockfeed stores and selected garden centres. Broad beans are a fabulous nitrogen fixing green manure with the bonus of beans to eat and tender top shoots that are yummy stir -fried.

It is also a great time to give your herbs a haircut. Don't waste the prunings, just cut and dry them for use during the winter months. Mint, Thyme, Rosemary and Oregano all dry really well with stronger flavour when dried. For softer summer herbs such as Basil, try freezing them in ice cube trays with a

little water or butter. Alternatively, why not make pesto! Garlic is easy to grow, tastes much better than shop bought stuff and doesn't cost \$60/kg! Not all garlic is equal - *Don't* plant the Chinese shop bought garlic - It has been fumigated and is sterile.

It is worth searching out locally grown bulbs first, as they are already adapted to our local conditions. Organic garlic bulbs for planting can also be purchased at Farmers markets & Health food shops, Online from Urban Revolution or Green Life Soils. This past year was a difficult one, so don't leave buying garlic until late in the month or you may miss out!

Plant Garlic when the daytime temperatures are consistently 25degrees C and below. They prefer enriched soil in a sunny, well drained position. If you have soil prone to water-logging, I would recommend planting Garlic in pots or mounded. Break the bulb into cloves, leaving the 'papery-skin' intact. Plant the cloves, 10-15cm apart, pointed end up, to the depth of the clove. They hate competition so be careful to keep them free of weeds, mulching will help with this. They will take about 7-8 months to be ready to harvest, so if you plant them now, you will have Fresh garlic for Christmas.

What to plant in April?

<u>Leaf crops</u> - Celery, Cress, Collard greens, Chicory, Endive, Lettuce, Mizuna, Choi Sum, Gai Lan, Pak Choy, Chinese Cabbage, Mustard greens, Rocket, Spinach, Silverbeet, Radicchio, Witlof and Corn salad. <u>Brassica crops (seedlings only*)</u> -Broccoli, Broccoli Raab, Brussel Sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower and Kale. <u>Root crops</u> - Beetroot, Carrot, Radish, Daikon, Celeriac, Kohlrabi, Salsify, Swede, Turnip. <u>Legume crops</u> - Broad Beans, Snow peas and Peas. <u>Onion family</u> - Garlic, Leeks, Spring onions, Onions, Potato onions, Tree onions and Shallots. <u>Herbs</u> - Artichoke, Bay, Chives, Coriander, Fennel, Lemon Balm, Mint, Rosemary, Oregano, Parsley, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme and Burdock. Happy Planting!

Gloria Maslin. 26 January 1931
- 26 February 2024

Gloria was born in Collie to parents Jack and Mary Bertelli, Gloria being the eldest and had siblings Gordon and Mary. Some other siblings died in infancy and sadly Gloria's mother Mary aged 35 died when baby Mary was born. The children were farmed out to relatives

especially Mrs Zannini who looked after them in their early years. Glorias father Jack leased the farm on Dowdells Line and returned to the sawmills for work. Glorias grandparents, the Pedrolinis had earlier settled on this farm at Dowdells Line with Jack and Mary eventually purchasing this property from his parents.

At this time Gloria was sent to boarding school at the Bunbury Convent and she said was the best years of her life supported by a loving and caring Nun, sister Rose. Gloria left school in 1945 and continued to work with father on the farm with some time spent working in Manjimup and Perth.

Gloria met and married Guy Maslin on the 24th September 1949, we believe. Brian Wells drove her to the church in the local priests car for her wedding at the Dardanup Church. Sadly, brother Gordon died at aged 12 years about this time.

Guy had work with the railways stationed at Katanning and the newly married couple resided there in very poor conditions. Glorias father Jack offered them a lease of the farm at Dowdell's Line, Paradise and they set off together with two little girls Lynne and Ronnie to start their farm life. This continued for a time until finally they bought the farm from Glorias father Jack. By 1961 Gordon had arrived and Jenny and Ann. Gloria and Guy sadly lost baby Robert who died at aged 5 months.

The family ran a full milk dairy business. Gloria working so hard every day and finding time to bring up her family, to care for them, get them to school, growing vegetables for the table as well as growing

fruit from their orchard, all being turned into preserved bottled fruits, jams pickles etc of all kinds. Gloria found time to sew for her growing family, knitting beautiful garments, baking beautiful cakes, so lovingly decorated for family and friends

In 1965 with the help of Guys war efforts through serving in WW2 they were able to build a new home on the farm at Dowdells Line, Paradise which Gloria remained in for 55 years until her health declined and she moved to Bethanie Fields Nursing Home, Guy having predeceased her.

Gloria was a very community minded person supporting her church parish and all the committees and services supporting the school with canteen duties and fundraising for the various needs. Gloria was an inaugural member of the Dardanup Senior Citizens enjoying all the activities, trips and companionship of friends. She was involved with the Riding for the Disabled Group, ever there with fundraising help for the cause. Gloria was involved with Red Cross as a member which commenced in 1971 receiving many awards along the way. Her long service medals and gold bars and finally her 50th gold Laurel Wreath. In 2022 she served as President of the unit for many years. Every year together with family would march with the unit on Anzac Day laying the Red Cross wreath at times. Gloria always very proud marching with family wearing her grandfather's war medals.

Gloria was a member of the SW Rose Society enjoying enjoying growing her own roses.

She joined the Ferguson Valley Visitors Centre doing her bit working at the centre.

She also loved playing golf with her friend Ethel Quadrio as well as playing tennis, badminton, and doing Thai chi at Eaton with friends.

Gloria travelled with husband Guy all over Australia on caravan trips, enjoying the friends they met on the way. Had a few overseas trips also one especially with Barbara when they visited Italy to find relatives.

Gloria was an ever loving Grandma to the family grandkids, always there for whoever had needs, taking them on beach caravan stays, enjoying teaching them all sorts of board games and they were always in her mind.

Although very direct at times with others she was giving and loyal to everyone she met

and fiercely independent.

Gloria loved her garden, grew beautiful orchids, shrubs of all kinds and roses.

Her garden was always immaculate from hard work.

She so appreciated the help in the latter years of her girls who did so much to keep her happy in the garden.

Gloria died on 26 th February at Bethanie Fields Nursing home aged 93 years.

Loving sympathy to all her family. A Tribute to a life well done. Eds Note; After reading Gwen Wells and daughters Jenny and Annes obituary on Gloria think we can all despite early setbacks Gloria had a rich and fulfilling life which many of us would like to aspire too. 

An Indian Wedding

Anybody who has been into the store in the last 12 months will know that I (and a couple of other locals) were invited to my new boss's (Sam) wedding in the Punjab state of India. I had no hesitation in saying yes to what I was told was a 4 day wedding at the end of February 2024. I then went home and checked with David. Thumbs up from David.

20th Feb - When we arrived at the family home in Chaudakur part of the wheat field had been cleared for the luncheon with the whole village (approx. 600), family, friends and representatives from the brides (Sukhman) family. Shopping for clothes for the wedding was next. When it comes to an Indian wedding there is no such thing as too much bling. I was in heaven. David was measured for 2 suits. 1 Punjabi suit and one "normal". These were picked up the next day. (I must say David looks really good in a tailor-made suit.)++While we were shopping the contractors arrived to put up the two lots of framework, 1 in the backyard and 1 on the cleared wheat field. This would have given our OH &S people palpitations. Once the framework was up both sections were covered in material and decorated with flowers, umbrellas, loads and loads of fairy and other bits and pieces. Again enough to give OH&S nightmares. While this is happening the chefs arrived to make the gifts, sweet and savoury, to give to all the visitors, guests and family who came to say congratulations (or see the Aussies). The pots and pans used were massive. I have never seen anything as big. Its hard to explain the tools they used to make tiny round biscuits and long almost spaghetti like ones. The small plot next door was cleared of weeds and debris to be used as a makeshift kitchen for the luncheon. There was hired staff, they specialise in weddings, to cook for the many visitors, contractors and family. This includes the guys renovating the house. The Holy Book is bought to the house for reading in the 4 days leading up to the

walk from the temple to the house.

The celebrations started with the ladies gathering in the living room for 2 evenings of singing and dancing. It starts off sedately and quietly until someone brings the drum and spoon. Then it gets a little louder and more upbeat. Once they have sat for long enough they start dancing. I must say this was my favourite part. The Haldi ceremony is held before the luncheon. Here the family and visitors paint the grooms hair with turmeric oil and put turmeric paste on his face. An Indian tradition representing a life of prosperity for the couple to begin their new life. (Turmeric is a very good cleanser). I dried some of my roses and was allowed to shower some on Sam at this time. The groom (and bride at a separate ceremony) are also showered with monetary gifts.

luncheon. Everything has to be washed, including the road for the

28th - The Holy Book is moved to the canopy in the backyard and guests come and listen to the reading and blessing of the groom before the book goes back to the temple. Again, more showering with gifts and photos. The luncheon was served in the cleared paddock, which has been covered with carpet and surrounded by walls. There

was a security guard with a very big gun to ensure no undesirables showed up. After the luncheon the ladies go to visit the bride and her family to take material gifts and shower the bride with gifts. This is called Shagun. At this ceremony the closest females put makeup on the bride. On returning to the family home there is fireworks, then we set off on Jaggo. This is where the maternal relatives wander around the village singing. Jaggo means 'wake up". This involves carrying a Jaggo pot on your head that is decorated with lights. The ladies take turns at carrying it. When we got back from the walk a DJ had set up a dance floor, sound system and lights that would rival any nightclub in the backyard. The men tend to take over the dance floor. I think the Indians may have invented the first head banging music. This was a very long day. My last photo was taken at 2am on the 29th.

A day off is needed in between each celebration to gather your wits and get ready for the next set of celebrations.

1st March – The day of the wedding Sam is again cleansed with turmeric, and everybody gets ready for another big day. When everyone is dressed and ready there is walk to the temple for blessing and celebration's. The family is taken in decorated cars to the temple where the wedding ceremony is performed. Then we all go the wedding reception venue. The families sit at tables and are fed a variety of snacks. (We would call it a full meal.) I like their snacks because dessert is served first. At this time Sukhman is having time to change and redo anything that needs redoing. While we are served all the other guests are treated to a buffet both inside and outside the venue. So much food. When the bride arrives they walk together to a couch where they sit and allow the family and friends to come and congratulate them and shower them with more gifts. This also includes more photos. While they are being congratulated the other guests are entertained by singing and dancing. Very high energy. After the wedding we went back to the family home for more fireworks and another disco. Unfortunately, this one as cut short by a natural fireworks show and rain.

In Australia this would be the end of the wedding but in India the next day we went back to the local temple for more blessings. After the blessings the bride and groom walk around town. Unfortunately, there was more rain so everyone got extremely wet. Once everyone was dried there was another tradition to carry out. The bride and groom both wear Gana which symbolises deep love and solidarity. They take each others off and try and hang onto their own. Then they try and find the gold coin in a bowl of milk to see who will rule the house.

After this we left the family and moved to a hotel in Amritsar. It was the most amazing experience.
