Look forward to seeing you at our next market on 28th July, 2024 or any fourth Sunday of the month.






Women of Charlotte St & Beyond presents the stories of eight remarkable women of Dardanup who played a significant part in the development of the town and its surrounds: Eliza Little, Mary Jane O'Neill, Ellen Skipworth, Mary Ann Cleary, Catherine Prout, Mary Holland, Frances Craig and June Craig.

The book also contains an introduction and a brief overview of the history of the Dardanup area.

Adventures on the Ferguson is a collection of eight newspaper articles, originally printed in the Bunbury Herald in 1908, humorously recounting a journey from Bunbury through the Ferguson Valley in 1908. The central character is part-fiction but the people he meets along the way were real, early settlers on the Ferguson

River. Woven into the main story are a set of tall tales, rambling implausible stories told and retold for entertainment. This collection gives modern readers a rare window into the past of this cherished region.

Private landholders are invited to take advantage of resources focused on control of the declared pest weeds, Arum Lily

and Bridal Creeper over the next several weeks.

Got Arum Lily and/or Bridal Creeper on your property? Once again, the control seasons for these two prevalent, invasive declared pest weeds in our area, Arum Lily and Bridal Creeper, are upon us. Local Leschenault Biosecurity Group (LBG) invites private landholders within its operational area to contact them for support specific for these two highly destructive invasive species plants during this optimal control window. This support is focused on private properties in alignment with the group's mission to support private landholders in meeting their responsibilities to manage declared pests on their property.


ARUM LILY ATTACK – ELIMINATE THIS WEED FROM YOUR PROPERTY

Arum lilies (Zantedeschia aethiopica) pose a significant threat to our native plant and animal species, as they outcompete native vegetation and disrupt local ecosystems. It's rapid growth rate and high reproductive capacity, allow it to quickly establish and aggressively out complete native plants reducing biodiversity, creating a dense monoculture, disrupting and decimating natural habitats. This highly invasive, destructive pest plant forms a monoculture, reducing food and habitat for native wildlife and pasture productivity and is toxic to most stock, pets and humans. Effective management strategies include a combination of mechanical, chemical, and biological control methods. Private landholders can participate in Leschenault Biosecurity Group's Arum Lily Attack program with support including:

BRIDAL CREEPER BIOCONTROL - "Rust" Fungus Program

Bridal Creeper control season control efforts are already in progress in many forms in our area. As many are aware, the Bridal Creeper "rust" fungus is considered to be a major ally in the fight against bridal creeper, as an effective and least toxic method of control. While this control method doesn't have the immediate results of an herbicide application, this fungus is as an effective biocontrol method, which is species-specific, resulting in no off-target damage and with no restrictions on the use of the rust for control of bridal creeper in any environment. The group is actively seeking rust in our local environment to be able to harvest it and transfer to new locations

Timely and focused control efforts with wide participation in our area can make a substantial difference in our fight against these aggressive declared pest weeds. Working together, we can better combat these invasive species, helping to stop their spread and preserve our natural biodiversity. FERGUSON VALLEY

June is always a busy month for our Ferguson Valley Marketing administration with Associate membership renewals falling due and web updates being carried out. At the time of going to press, the 24/25 Association renewals and new members had not been completed so final details are not yet available. Pleasingly, in what is a tight economic climate, membership numbers seem to have been retained.

In the past few weeks, we have completed improvements to the Ferguson Valley Marketing website, and are investigating what can be further done to refresh the web experience for both our members and visitors. For the 23/24 year, the FVM website had more than 81,000 visitors. One of our goals is to improve upon that for 24/25.

Our speaker engagement at the Tourism and Hospitality Job Expo in Bunbury on 6th June was well received. The workshop attracted both mature-aged workers as well as current TAFE students looking to get into the hospitality and tourism industry. There were eight guest speakers from across the BunGeo area. Each shared their personal journey within the industry and provided highlights of the advantages of working in the sector.

We have almost completed setting up the What's App group for the Gnomesville Pop Up Volies and are looking forward to having the volunteers from Dardanup Primary School fully trained and in place by mid-July in time for School holidays. We are also working to develop a token system that will help to track the number of visitors that come into the Valley via Gnomesville. There is a significant volume of daily tourists who enter from the top end of the Valley and we are endeavouring to better measure the dollar value flowing into businesses in the valley generated from the Pop-Up Visitors Centre.

Over the next few months, the five large tourist information maps throughout the Valley will be re-skinned and updated. Keep an eye out for these refreshed information boards. We did another interview about attractions in the Valley – this time for a French website. We met with Oceane Jacques who was interested in the history of Gnomesville and other attractions in the valley. We can expect to receive a link to the web-based piece but will need an interpreter as it will be written in French! It's exciting to see the Valley receiving increased levels of interest from overseas.

Lastly, the Lost and Found Festival 2024 is progressing. We have locked in 13 events and will soon be able to go to market with the festival program.



Shire recognised for best-practice financial reporting

The Shire of Dardanup has been recognised by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries as a Best Practice entity for the 2022/23 financial year.

Shire of Dardanup President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner said the accolade comes from the Office of the Auditor General's annual Local Government 2022-23 Financial Audit Results report, highlighting the Shire's exemplary financial reporting practices.

Cr Gardiner said the report summarises the final results of annual audits conducted on 137 of 147 local government entities for the year ended June 30, 2023, as well as one remaining audit from 2021-22.

Dardanup Lions Club News

Lions Eye Health Program (LEHP): The Dardanup Lions Club has joined clubs throughout Australia in delivering an eye health screening program in our local community for primary school children.

We have now been operating the screening program for two years. So far we have completed screening at the Dardanup (twice), Boyanup, and River Valley Primary Schools. We particularly focus on years 3 and 6 students, but have been able to include screening years 4 and 5 students.

We have screened 90 students of whom we "referred" 12 for assessment by an optometrist, as a result of our screening. The testing assesses:

- 1 visual acuity
- 2 depth perception
- 3 colour vision
- 4 the spot vision camera that screens for these;

Myopia (near sightedness) Hyperopia (far sightedness) Astigmatism (blurred vision) Anisometropia (refractive error) Binocular Vision (gaze) - (eye misalignment) Anisocoria (unequal pupil size) Our team is made up of several community volunteers from a range of backgrounds and Lions members. All the screeners have undergone training with an 'accredited trainer' to be qualified for the administration of the screening process in accordance with guidelines set under the Australian Lions Eye Health Program. Special thanks to ALL involved including teachers & staff.

The experience of the program nationally is that about one in six children at primary school level in Australia have undiagnosed eyesight issues which require either intervention to correct the problem or at least awareness of the issue by the child and the child's carers/teachers to assist the child to reach her/his full capacity.

We thank all volunteers involved and look forward to continuing to provide this service to our local community and expanding it where the need arises.



July is the second half of the Noongar season *Makuru*. Traditionally a time of frequent storms, making this one of the wettest and coldest months of the year in our region. We are grateful for the

replenishing rains and hopefully you are well on the way to filling up your rainwater storage. The chilly mornings mean wearing a few more layers but it does give me a good opportunity to get out and see where the frosty pockets are and also the cosy warmer spots in my garden. Observation is one of your superpowers as a gardener and helps you to create microclimates for specialty crops.

Winter solstice (our shortest day) has past and despite the days beginning to lengthen, growth in our gardens will be slow during these cold months. It gives us a chance to catch our breath and plan for a summer of abundance. My suggestion is stay inside, grab a cup of something warm and get stuck into reading seed catalogues, magazines and recipe books. There are some great options for purchasing seeds within WA, including Urban Revolution, Thrive Sustainability, Harvest Me Seeds and Yilgarn seeds. Purchasing from these small businesses ensures fresher seeds that are adapted to our Climate, greater variety and no nasty fumigates/coatings.

It is prime Brassica time in the vegie patch. We are picking a head of broccoli and cauliflower every second day and a few leaves of tuscan kale is delicious in my lunchtime minestrone soup. The sugar snap peas are producing well but need a bit of help staying on the trellis. Their fine tendrils require something thin to hold onto and I have found a bit of repurposed chicken wire attached to my mesh trellis works really well. I've grown a lot more perennial spinach this year, their leaves are softer in contrast to Swiss chard and easier to grow than traditional spinach. Great steamed and added in with my other greens giving us a delicious vitamin and mineral Herbs: Artichoke, Asparagus crowns, Strawberry plants

Garden maintenance is very much 'tidy as you go'. I've found a few self sown silverbeet and lettuce in the pathways, easily transplanted these free plants are great for filling in any gaps. When you are out harvesting a few things, take a few minutes to remove any old or yellowing leaves on Brassicas, Silverbeet and Celery. Add them to the Compost or feed them to your Chooks. The 'girls' are in need of their greens this time of year and the leafy greens will help give the yolks a lovely naturally dark yellow colour.

Lush with weeds at the moment? Weeds are full of minerals, so instead of getting frustrated, why not make use of them to help 'fertilise' your garden. There are a few different ways to make 'Weed tea' and one quick method is making your own Fermented Plant Juice. How to make it: Fill a sturdy container with equal parts by weight, weeds and brown sugar. Plants

first then sprinkle with sugar. Weigh down the contents (a rock works) and cover the container with a cloth. Store it out of sunlight and at room temperature. After a week you can begin to strain out the liquid and dilute before using. It is very concentrated and a little goes a long way! So start with a dilution strength of about 1 part liquid to 500 parts water, about 20ml in a watering can. Apply fortnightly, in the morning just like you would for Seasol etc. If you are interested in other ways to create your own homegrown fertility, check out the book The Regenerative Grower's Guide to Garden Amendments by Nigel Palmer.

At a pinch, if your garden is in a sunny sheltered position, you may be able to plant seedlings of fast cropping varieties such as asian greens, english spinach, lettuce, and radish seeds. Everything else will just sit in the cold soil waiting for the warmer weather to arrive or become food for the slugs and snails. If you are desperate for Brassicas find some advanced seedlings of the crops you want.

While we hold off with planting annuals until August or September, now is a good time to plant perennials such as Strawberries, Rhubarb, Asparagus crowns and bare-rooted deciduous trees. Keep an eye out for Jerusalem artichokes, Ginger & Turmeric tubers as these have a short season and can be planted in pots in a warm sheltered position next month. If you have an established Asparagus patch make sure it is weed free, fertilised and mulched ahead of your August harvest.

If you are really keen to plant in July....

Leaf crops: Asian greens (Choi Sum, Gai Lan, Mibuna, Mizuna, Pak Choy, Chinese Cabbage), Cress, Lettuce, Mustard greens, Witlof, Chicory. <u>Brassica crops (seedlings)</u>*: Broccoli Raab, Cabbage, Kale, Spinach . Root crops: Radish. Legume crops: Broad Beans, Snow peas, Peas. Onion family: Onions, Salad onion, Potato onions, Tree onions. Perennial

Stay warm and make use of your planning time!

The Land Army Girls by Jenny Golding

Plaistowe's, tomatoes, beans and brides
In 1943 one thousand acres of land on the Waterloo –
Dardanup Road became home to a hard-working group
of Land Army girls (all volunteers) when demand for
fresh and canned vegetables for the Australian and
Allied fighting forces during World War II greatly
increased.

Plaistowe's, well known in Perth at that time for the processing of vegetables and fruit, took up the Waterloo land, applied to have 30 young women work on the large market garden, quickly installed a manager and equipment and had accommodation built. Dwarf beans and tomatoes were the crops chosen to be grown in Waterloo because they travelled well when carefully picked. Peas and cabbage were also grown later and the vegetables went by train from the Waterloo siding to Perth. The garden was irrigated from channels from the Wellington Dam. There was also approximately six men working at the site. During peak picking times, over 100 additional workers came to the site.

Work was hard, often muddy and tiring, particularly for women not used to outdoor labour. "Land girls" were reportedly paid thirty shillings per week before tax. Blunt stakes for the beans had to be pointed and an extra three pence a stake could be earned for this job, executed on a Saturday afternoon. A cow had to be hand-milked.

Weekend dances were popular, held in local halls at Waterloo, Bunbury, Dardanup, Burekup and Brunswick. Romance blossomed and local farmers found brides among the land army. The district benefitted considerably when Peggy Hancock married George Tyrrell, Beryl Ridley married Paul Edwards, Pat Johnson married Bernard Panizza and Marjorie Crockett married Edward Haddow. Many of their descendants remain in the community.

When the war ended, Plaistowes closed the site as it was considered unviable to maintain. One of the huts still exists. The property is still farmed.
