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Our local Jarrah forest is a riot of colour as we enter 'Kambarang' the Noongar season from October to November. The warmer days are perfect conditions for the weeds to go wild and it seems like I will never catch up! October is my

busiest time in the garden. After making my planting plan last month the soil temperatures are finally warm enough for me to start planting out my summer crops. It is really important to also keep an eye on soil moisture levels, especially if you have garlic and onions growing. If they are left to dry out and get stressed before watering then you run the risk of them bolting to seed or witch brooming. Currently I am harvesting my autumn plantings of broad beans, carrots, parsnips and peas, along with the my staples of Silverbeet, perpetual spinach, celery and spring onions. As I harvest something, I plant another crop in its place, this means I have something to harvest year round. Succession planting is a great tool that works for any sized garden. If you love your summer salads a great tip to remember is *Leafy greens can be planted with everything* and are great used as 'space fillers' and act as living mulch.

Does anyone else have an overwhelming urge to plant everything now!? Depending on the crop if you stagger sowing seeds or seedlings you have plants maturing at different times, less gluts and lower food waste. It is time to start thinking about Christmas - *yes*, *I* did just say that ... don't shoot the messenger just yet:) Here is my thought process - Do you want to brave the craziness of the shops during the silly season or would you prefer to just pop out and pick what you need from your own garden?

To make sure I have enough fresh herbs and summer vegies I need to be organised. A plentiful supply is good but a glut in peak holiday season can be overwhelming! Your seed to harvest times are important and succession plantings helps to keep your garden productive but not unmanageable. An advanced cherry tomato planted now should give you tomatoes in time for Christmas lunch. As will cucumbers, dwarf beans and lettuces. Yes, there are thousands of ways to use zucchini but I'm not sure everyone wants to receive them as Christmas gifts... You only need to plant 2 every 2 months and that will give you plenty all summer long. There are a few different varieties - pale green, striped, golden and even ball shaped ones, so why just plant the boring dark green one. If you can find some Tromboncino (Curcubita moschata) seeds they can be grown on a trellis saving you space and giving you 2 crops on the one vine - zucchini when small & green as well as pumpkins when mature and dried at the end of the season.

Garden smarter, It is as easy as 1, 2, 3... Plant once per season. Crops that take a long time to grow are generally only planted once and will mature with an extended crop for the entire summer season. These include Tomatoes, Eggplant, Chilli, Capsicum, Pumpkin, Sunflower, Luffa, Melons, Squash, Pumpkins & Silverbeet. Plant Twice per season. Crops that have a shorter time to maturity and harvest length can be planted twice and this will extend your harvest through into the autumn months. These crops include Zucchini,

Corn, Dwarf Beans, Climbing Beans, Snow peas, Cucumbers, Gherkins, Beetroot and Carrots. **Plant every 3 weeks**. Quicker growing crops such as Lettuce, Asian greens, Cress, Rocket and Coriander can be planted every 3 weeks to allow for a continuous harvest. They prefer a sheltered, cool, shaded position or will 'bolt' in the heat.

One of the easiest ways to increase the duration of your harvest is to be consistent, pick the crop, even if it is only a few beans or a couple of cherry tomatoes. It is important to understand how each of your crops produce - this may sound odd, but if you are not careful when picking you may damage the growing tips / fruiting buds or the next lot of flowers which will reduce your yield. This is especially important with beans, both dwarf and climbing varieties. They need to be regularly picked otherwise they won't continue to crop. If you leave just one to get oversize then the plant will stop producing, we also find this when we accidentally let one of our zucchini get as big as your arm - the plant gets tired and thinks it has now reproduced. Small zucchini (15-20cm long) taste better, are less watery and have fewer seeds. Another tip for crops such as silverbeet, celery and rhubarb you need to tear the stem off at the base to promote regrowth - if you cut the stem it won't trigger new leaves and will take much longer to regrow.

What can we plant in October? *Just about everything!*<a href="Leaf crops"><u>Leaf crops</u></a> - Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Cabbage, Chinese cabbage Root & onion crops - Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, carrot, Parsnip, Scorzonera, Turnip, Celeriac, Daikon, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Yacon, Yam/Oca, Jerusalem Artichoke Legume crops - Dwarf Beans, Climbing Beans, Snow peas, Asparagus pea Curcubit & Solanum family - Cucumber, Luffa, Sweetcorn, Gourd, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Marrow, Zucchini, Tomato, Capsicum, Chilli, Tomatillo, Eggplant, Okra, Rosella, Sunflower. Herbs - Globe Artichoke, Asparagus, Basil, Buckwheat, Coriander, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary and Summer savoury

#### Winter Rains, Abundant Food Spur Increased Feral Pig **Activity in Our Area**

Landholders and local biosecurity group work together for success in tackling pigs on the move!

With a flush of green feed across the landscape following winter rains, feral pigs have been exceptionally active with movement across the LBG operational area...and so have we!

A Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) study revealed that the home ranges of pigs can vary significantly. For example, two collared sows stayed within relatively small areas of 68ha and 190ha, whereas a collared boar roamed an extensive 2,322ha. These home ranges include smaller core areas where pigs spend most of their time. However, our winter weather provides ample resources for feral pigs, with flowing water courses and abundant food. This has prompted the pigs to venture further, clearly making their presence known as they wreak havoc on local properties.

Because of this increased activity over the winter months, many landholders reached out to local Leschenault Biosecurity Group with reports of significant damage to paddocks, as groups of pigs uproot the soil in search of onion grass, earthworms and dung beetles; pigs are known to seek out and overturn cow pats in search of these delicacies! This activity also caused issues for farmers who seeded vegetable or grain crops during periods of high soil moisture, forcing some to reseed or lose patches of their crops.

In response, the group worked with individual landholders to implement feral pig control efforts, successfully eliminating pigs from multiple properties within our area, primarily through implementation of the group's HOGGONE® Feral Pig Management program and, where applicable, with other control methods the landowner may also want to implement.

Feral pigs are a major threat nationally to our environment and our multi-billion-dollar agricultural industry. This is due to the destruction of crops, infrastructure, habitat, land and water sources, ability to spread weeds and diseases, predation of livestock and impacts on biodiversity. It is estimated that nationally, approximately 45% (3.43 million square kilometres) of the country is inhabited by feral pigs\*. While it is unlikely that we will ever completely eradicate feral pigs, every feral pig removed from the landscape is a crucial step in controlling their population expansion. We commend the landowners and local biosecurity groups (Leschenault Biosecurity Group and Blackwood Biosecurity Inc) with their ongoing control efforts to address feral pig incursions on private properties. Control efforts not only protect individual properties, but also contribute significantly to the broader goal of managing this invasive species in our area.

If you see or suspect feral pig activity on your property, you are encouraged to contact Leschenault Biosecurity Group at 0477 049 967. The group will collaborate with you to conduct a site visit, set-up a surveillance camera to both verify and quantify the pest activity. Based on what is seen on camera, the group with will work with the landowner to implement a control strategy that can best address the feral pig incursion and property circumstances.

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#### TANZANIAN SAFARI with Robyn & Jamie Jones

It was some last time last year that Jamie and I decided to go on a 12 day wildlife safari in Tanzania, East Africa travelling with a couple of local Birdwatcher friends. We decided to go in July/August to take advantage of the migrating wildebeest present in the Northern Serengeti close to the Kenyan border and hopefully see a large herd crossing the Mara River. We went with one of the many Tanzanian Tourist Companies specialising in Safaris who efficiently book the internal flights, permits and camp accommodation. We organised flights to Tanzania via a local travel agent which worked well with timing of the Safari trip.

After a couple of days repacking our carry-on size suitcases to fit in the back of the safari vehicle, we departed Perth on a cold late July evening on a 11 hour flight to Dubai, 4 hour stop over and then a 5 hour flight the following day to Dar es Salaam, largest city in Tanzania of 8 million people. We were met and taken to a comfortable coastal hotel to thankfully sleep overnight. We boarded a small plane the following morning for another 3 hours to Kogatenge airstrip in the Northern Serengeti. Landing on a small gravel airstrip, we finally joined our Tanzanian Tour Guide, Jackson, an experienced guide of 14 years and boarded our custom Landcruiser with a raised roof that enabled us to stand and look out. No safari suit or hiking boots needed here. A banded mongoose was the first animal sighted at the airstrip closely followed by elephant, zebra and wildebeest.

We stayed 3 nights at a comfortable permanent camp with our villa within walking distance complete with netted bed canopy and hot water shower. A local tribal gentleman was on hand to escort us walking from our villas. He wore a bow and arrows and a large machete after dark to protect us from the odd lion hunting in the vicinity! We went on scenic day drives after an early breakfast, provided with a packed lunch and returning to camp between 4 and 6 pm for dinner at 7 pm each night. The word Serengeti comes from a Maasai word meaning "endless plains" so yes, there are endless grasslands with the magnificent Mara River full of crocs and sleeping hippos. The African animal ecosystem is mindblowing with a meandering giraffe here and there munching on leaves, sleeping/ mating lions, lionesses hunting a wildebeest for their cubs and lots of elephants to name just a few. We were also grateful for our binoculars and our birdwatcher companions with their fantastic long lens cameras for opening up our eyes to the vibrant colourful world of birds.

They were long days driving in the Northern Serengeti looking for the wildebeest approaching the Mara River. The wildebeest constantly move in large herds eating out the grasslands and intermittently running in long single file lines. There were 14 natural crossing points across the steep banks of the Mara River and the wildebeest often changed their minds about a river crossing after perusing for crocodiles and hippos before leaping from the river bank. We were lucky enough to see a river crossing on our last morning - no crocodiles in this spot! (To appreciate the high energy of this spectacle, google "wildebeest river crossing"). Jackson knew

all the roads like the back of his hand and demonstrated excellent driving skills negotiating the atrocious roads which regularly threw us sideways out of the seat!

Driving south we entered the Central Serengeti National Park where we continued seeing more of the big five including a leopard up a tree sleeping (waking to munch on his wildebeest carcass stashed higher up the tree) and pools of sleeping hippo. We caught sight of multitudes of gazelles, water buffalo, water buck, a couple of cheeters, glimpses of smaller cats, a jackel, hyena, baboons, monkeys, ostriches etc and my favourite warthogs running with their tails up in the air.

After staying 3 nights, we drove south towards the Ngorongoro Crater enjoying the local architecture in small towns, farms, waving children walking home from school and stopped at a traditional Maasai winter village. We were welcomed by their characteristic jumping dance and song, shown how they light a fire without matches and went inside one of their small warm smoky huts. The Maasai women are busy including building the huts!

The Ngorongoro Crater (formed 2.5 million years ago when the volcanic cone collapsed inward after a massive explosion) was a fascinating natural sanctuary with a high concentration of the local animal species harbouring inside the rim– 600 metres deep and 20 kms across. We stayed a night in luxurious accommodation enjoying the abundant birdlife in overlapping wetlands, woodlands with forests of umbrella acacia trees and grasslands full of animals the following day, an amazing world heritage space.

Our safari finished with a 2 night stay in Tarangire National Park known for its large population of elephants. We spent quite some time on the edge of the wetlands watching a large group of about 3 elephant families come in to bathe in the water, spouting each other, often submerging themselves entirely in the water and then getting out to coat themselves by rolling in a mudpit! The elephants then left walking very close to our vehicles parked on the road. We particularly enjoyed this Park's canvas camp with two elephants having to be moved on so we could walk from our spacious tent on stilts to attend breakfast in the morning!

We ended our Safari driving to Arusha, saying goodbye to Jackson at the Town Airport and flying back to Dar es Salaam for a welcome early night. We arranged a city tour the following day in the free hours before going to the Airport to return home. A Tanzanian Safari was an amazing bucket list trip and highly recommended despite the long flights!

#### **Dardanup Heritage Collective News**

#### Sport in Dardanup

Dardanup's famous Bull & Barrel Festival will be held on 5 October this year, with many activities centring on the recreation grounds. The Festival commenced in 2003 and is one of many successful events using various sites around Dardanup since it was settled in the 1850s. Dardanup's Recreation Grounds were once located where the Dardanup Hall now stands. In 1931 a farm block, including the current grounds, was purchased by the Wells family. Land was subdivided from the farm and sold for £156 16s 4d to the Roads Board to create the Dardanup Recreation Grounds in the same year. It was renamed Wells Recreation Park in 2012 to recognise the role of the Wells family in developing and maintaining the site. Early sporting events in Dardanup included horse-racing on settler farms, hunt club runs, and gymkhanas. Sporting teams for men, women and children covering cricket, hockey, football and basketball became part of the town's identity throughout the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. Wells Recreation Park is now used for aerobics, basketball, cricket, dog training, tennis and soccer. Joint amenities support these clubs and




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
