

Timber Treaters Henty Riding Club Winter Dressage Championships

The weekend of August 24th/25th saw a huge amount of activity on the Dardanup Equestrian Centre's grounds on Garvey Road when it hosted the Timber Treaters Henty Riding Club Winter Dressage Championships. This event has over the years become a major feature on the WA Dressage calendar, winning Event of the Year several times. The prestige of the event is partly due to the presence of Internationally qualified judges who make this event significant in raising the standard of dressage in WA. Dressage is the discipline that looks like effortless equine dancing, yet takes years of practice, talent and training for each combination. Championship classes were offered this year from the lowest level (Preparatory) to the very highest (Grand Prix) with club members, non members, Para-Dressage and Pony classes equally well catered for. Riders and their associates flock to this show from as far away as the Wheatbelt and Albany, such is the attraction of this event.

Locals who successfully competed was Kaitlyn Brown who won the Participant Novice Champion; Darline Morgan competing in her first ever official competition achieved a very notable 3rd place in the Henty Preliminary Championship and Liz Anderson on her beautiful horse San Shivago won the Reserve Champion in the Small Tour class just a whisker behind the eventual champion.

This year to make the weekend bigger and better than ever, the event was supported by a number of generous sponsors. Timber Treaters (Bridgetown) continued as longstanding naming rights sponsor and champions returned home with rugs emblazoned with their logo. Elementary and Small Tour championships had the support of Duncan Equine whilst Blue Hire supported the Pony championships. Register now for Leschenault Biosecurity Group's Rabbit Control Calicivirus RHDV1 K5 Release Program to be Conducted Jan – March 2025

Do you have a rabbit problem on your property?

Registration is now open for Leschenault Biosecurity Group's summer 2024-2025 Rabbit Control Calicivirus RHDV1-K5 Release Program.

The LBG will once again facilitate a Calicivirus RHDV1-K5 (K5) Release Program with participating landholders across its operational area, including the northern localities of the Donnybrook-Balingup Shire, Shires of Capel and Dardanup and the City of Bunbury. This program will commence in mid-January with targeted releases anticipated through March 2025. The more people that participate, the more effective this rabbit control program will be. Rabbits reproduce very effectively, and complete elimination of rabbits is close to impossible. With community members working together, significant decrease in numbers can be achieved.

Calivivirus "K5" releases are part of an integrated approach to optimise control of feral rabbits.

Calicivirus RHDV1-K5 is a very helpful, effective rabbit bio-control tool, but NOT a "silver bullet". The virus provides an important tool for suppressing pest rabbit numbers throughout the landscape, reducing the substantial impact pest rabbits have on both agricultural production and the environment. While the "K5" releases won't eliminate all rabbits, they do provide for a significant reduction in rabbit population, hopefully better enabling landholders the ability to implement other rabbit control strategies around their property.







Individual and Collective Focus on Biosecurity Important to help protect our beautiful and unique area from the impact of established and potential plant and animal pests.

As we usher in summer and 2024 comes to a close, our local Leschenault Biosecurity Group offers the following:

The Leschenault Biosecurity Group sends a big thank you to our community members for their dedicated efforts in managing, reporting, and tracking declared pests. Many landholders across our area have reached out to and collaborated with the group for guidance and resources to support for the ongoing challenges of controlling priority widespread and well-established pests in our area, including wild rabbits, foxes, feral pigs, and invasive declared pest plants such as arum lily, blackberry, cape tulip, and cotton bush. Spring Weed Roundup _ Summer Focus on Blackberry & Apple of Sodom

As we enter summer Cape Tulip, Arum Lily, Watsonia's & Thistles get parked in the rear-view mirror for another season. This spring was a particularly challenging weed season with three weeks of no rain in September followed by average falls in October & warm nights contributing to a proliferation of growth. Anecdotal evidence from farmers who reached out to the LBG said they had Thistles in their paddocks that didn't exist last year. Thistles aren't particularly long lived in the seed soil bank but are usually recruited through airborne dispersal or rolled up in hay that have been imported from infested paddocks off farm. Given, the hay crisis last summer, it would not be a stretch to think that this was a point source of contamination. The group loaned out their spray unit this year to several landholders purely to deal with thistle, mainly Nodding or Sheep Thistle and to a lesser extent Spear/Variegated thistle. Cleavers continue to roll into town coming to your paddock sometime soon. Cleavers are a relatively new entrant to the coastal flats coming out of the Blackwood basin. It is likely that the causative agent here is hay cartage from eastern localities where Cleavers mature at the same time as hay cutting.

As we turn our attention towards summer weeds, the LBG is already engaging with landholder requiring some assistance with their upcoming blackberry program. The purple, red hue to the leaves over the winter dormancy period is replaced by a new lime green flush of growth signifying 'game on.' Contact LBG to discuss best strategies and available resources to help manage blackberry infestations.

Apple of Sodom is also on the radar as it sends out purple flowers & a modicum of new leaves. 'Sod of an Apple' is best dealt with prior to the onset of really hot continuous days where it enters a temporary shut down through water stress. Henty and Newlands are a particular hotspot within our local area from which the LBG receive the most calls for assistance to control this challenging declared pest plant! Landholders are encouraged to reach out to the LBG for assistance with this tough customer!

Some more personal histories

The stories of many prominent Dardanup citizens are featured on the Dardanup Heritage Collective web site but there are other stories too, those lesser known but personal stories of ordinary citizens.

One recently added to the web site is that of Syd Gardiner who resided most of his life at Wellington Mills. The story is taken from a journal recorded by Syd in the early 2000s. One riveting aspect of his story is the recounting of the devastating fire of April 1950 that swept across from Burekup and caused extensive damage in Ferguson and Wellington Mills. Syd wrote: "In April that year, the ominous smoke from a bushfire in the hills of Burekup started to increase. 12 and 13 of April, was spent trying to halt the blaze with many other firefighters from the area, and I will never forget the roar of the fire and the frightfulness of it on the night of 13 April,

1950 as it roared across the hills towards us at Wellington Mills.

Then, on the 14th of April 1950 the day before my wedding, it claimed my home that I had worked on for 18 months. However, the wedding went ahead as planned, and Joan and I were married in Donnybrook on the 15 April 1950." To finish reading this story go to:



The Importance of Monitoring Lumps on Your Pets





Its that time of the year... Zucchini season! December is the beginning of the Noongar season of **Birak** and is known as the first summer. We can

expect less rain and warmer weather, with wind patterns that are predictably and predominately Easterly in the morning and Westerly in the afternoon.

As the weather heats up, we need to prepare ourselves and our gardens so that we can reduce the heat stress. A very familiar slogan is 'Slip, Slop, Slap', not just for humans this works in the garden too! Many of our favourite summer vegie crops are susceptible to sunburn and although the plant tag or description will advise 'full sun', we know ours can be particularly harsh especially late in the afternoon. Capsicums, Tomatoes and Cucumbers will develop white, withered sunburned patches on their fruit, beans will drop their flowers and stop producing, and sensitive leafy greens can become bitter. One way of making sure your plants can keep their cool, is to erect some shade cloth, 30-50% is ideal as it lets enough light through for plants to grow and not get leggy, but gives some protection from the searing rays. It doesn't need to be elaborate, get creative and use what you have on hand, an old beach umbrella can help during the heat of the day, just make sure your plants get some good sunlight exposure in the cooler parts of the day. Another more edible solution is to grow some shade. Clever positioning of your trellises can provide a shade shadow for planting leafy greens and soft herbs. Pumpkins, Choko, Snake beans and heat tolerant Melons and Cucumbers (try Armenian or Poona) can be grown over trellises creating dappled shade and also give you a harvest - Win, Win!

I am often asked "What is the best mulch to use my vegie patch" - My reply is to use the one you have easiest access to and is within your budget. We need to cover the soil to protect it - the same way we put a shirt on to stop our skin from burning and drying out. While in my garden I do use WA made DSATCO mulches (Lupin or Triple C), I also use a mix of living, edible ground covers such as warrigal greens and nasturtiums. This time of year chopped up broad bean stalks also get used to cover the soil and break down adding organic matter. Mulch helps to keep in soil moisture, reduce evaporation and reduce weeds. Hay, Straw, Wood-chips and Bark will break down over time, adding organic matter to your soil. Choose a mulch that has irregular shapes or is fairly course so that water can percolate through and it doesn't compact/pack down becoming water repellant. Leave a few cm around each plant for good air flow and to reduce any potential rot and fugal issues. A word of caution, try to choose material that doesn't contain too many weed seeds or you will grow a lovely crop of weeds instead of vegies! Summer is the season when I grow a good variety of my pantry Staples. I like to focus on the crops that we eat more regularly, store well and can provide my family with nutrient dense food. The garlic is harvested making room for Sweet corn, Beans (for both fresh eating and dried), tomatoes of all shapes and sizes, Pumpkins, Zucchini and plenty of salad greens! Silverbeet, Spring onions and Parsley are also great year round producers.

Here are a couple of helpful tips I use to make sure we have a continual harvest of food for us to eat. Firstly, I don't wait to have empty beds. I simply plant into any of the spaces in the current crops and continue to replace with new seasons crops as my harvests finish.

Eventually, all the spaces are filled and I have crops of varying ages, helping to avoid big gluts of any one crop. Keep planting, so you can keep harvesting:) Secondly - an easy way to increase the length of your harvest is to Be Consistent pick the crop, even if it is only a few beans or a couple of cherry tomatoes. Zucchinis seem to double size overnight and if we miss one letting it grow into a limb sized fruit then the plant thinks it has 'reproduced' and will stop producing any new fruit. It is important to understand how each of your crops produce - this may sound odd, but if you are not careful when picking you may damage the growing tips / fruiting buds or the next lot of flowers which will reduce your yield. This is especially important with beans, both dwarf and climbing varieties. They need to be regularly picked otherwise they won't continue to crop. Other crops such as silverbeet, celery and rhubarb need to be torn off at the base of the stem to promote regrowth - if you cut the stem it won't trigger new leaves or take much longer to grow.

I love that everyones garden is different - each is a reflection of our personality and we have the opportunity to create the space that gives us joy. While we grow food gardens to feed ourselves and our family, we also need to enjoy the process. Self sufficiency is not a goal for everyone and it is important not to feel overwhelmed, especially as we go into a very busy season. It is definitely Ok to buy in your seed or seedlings and it is perfectly fine to purchase hybrid varieties - pick your battles. Many modern hybrids are fantastic as they fruit earlier and have higher yields. Some heirlooms have wonderful taste, great yields and grow well here - others don't. Choose varieties based on your needs, taste and preserving requirements. It is also fantastic to buy local, supporting producers who are passionate about growing their seasonal crops. You don't have to grow everything! You still have time to plant more of your favourite summer crops. Here are a few suggestions for What to plant in December and January.

Leaf crops: Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Cabbage and Chinese cabbage. Root & onion crops: Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, Carrot, Parsnip, Scorzonera, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Yacon, Yam/Oca and Jerusalem artichokes. Legume crops: Climbing Beans, Dwarf Beans and Asparagus pea. Curcubit & Solanum family: Choko, Cucumber, Luffa, Sweetcorn, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Marrow, Zucchini, Tomato, Capsicum, Chilli, Tomatillo, Eggplant, Rosella and Sunflowers. Herbs: Basil, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary, Summer savoury, Horseradish and Chives.

Wishing everyone a very Merry Festive Season and Happy New Year. I hope you take time to enjoy your summer garden and cook up a storm with your homegrown produce. Until next year, Happy Gardening!

Christmas Recipes


Here is some tried and true Christmas recipes supplied by the locals.

Julie Isbister has supplied her Christmas Shortbread recipe which makes an ideal Xmas gift or serve with coffee or cheese as not too sweet.

Christmas Shortbread

Ingredients

225g Plain Flour Pinch of salt 1 tsp cinnamon ½ tsp nutmeg ½ tsp ginger 230g unsalted butter 100g icing sugar 120g rice flour Method



Preheat oven to 180 deg. Sift plain flour with salt, then incorporate al ingeredients in food processor. Knead on lightly floured board to a smooth dough. Refrigerate 30 mins. Roll out dough to ½ cm thickness on floured board, then cut into fingers or use cutters to cut into festive shapes. Julie cuts hers into rounds with crimped edges and decorates with an almond in the centre. Place on ungreased tray bake. Bake 15 minutes (the shortbread will still be a little soft, but will firm as cools)

Stuffed Pumpkin


Ingredients

Butternut pumpkins Any vegetables & herbs

Method

Halve Butternut pumpkins longways, leave skin on and bake in oven til soft(watch they don't catch on the bottom) Discard seeds, scoop out pumpkin flesh into a bowl leaving centimetre or 2 around the edge.

Cook in pan with little oil or butter diced onion, celery, maybe capsicum or any vege that you fancy. Maybe add little curry powder if inclined and lightly fry. As you will only reheat the pumpkin ensure any vege is slightly softened unless you like the crunch. To the pumpkin flesh mix in the softened vege and some breadcrumbs and even add some sultanas or herbs. Can add roasted nuts too. Fill pumpkin shell and smooth top, sprinkle with cheese if desired and bake in oven til hot through, then slice and serve. Makes a nice addition to the roast or even bbq and can be prepared in advance.



Tray Bake Chicken Caesar

Ingredients

4 boneless chicken thighs, ideally skin on 8 rashers of streaky bacon

4 trusses of cherry or truss tomatoes

Finely grated zest of ½ lemon

3 tbsp extra virgin olive oil

Salt and pepper

About ½ loaf of ciabatta or sourdough bread torn into chunks

1 lge or 2 baby cos lettuces

Handful of fresh basil or flat leave parsley leaves to garnish Grated parmesan to garnish

Caesar dressing

1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil

2 cloves garlic crushed

5 canned anchovies with a little of their oil

1 cup cream

½ cup of grated parmesan(about 40g)

Finely grated zest of ½ lemon

Salt and pepper

Method

Preheat oven to 200 deg, fan bake. Line 2 shallow roasting dishes with baking paper for easy cleanup

Arrange chicken, bacon, tomatoes on 1 tray. Sprinkle chicken with lemon zest, drizzle everything with oil and season with salt and pepper. Arrange bread chunks on 2nd tray and drizzle with oil and season with salt and pepper to make croutons. Bake until chicken is fully cooked through (20-25 mins). Allow to cool for 10-15 mins. While chicken bakes make the Caesar dressing. Heat oil and sizzle garlic and anchovies over medium heat for 30 seconds, mashing anchovies to paste. Add all ingredients to pan and boil hard until thick enough to coat the back of a spoon (2 minutes). Cool before use. The dressing will keep for few days in fridge. It thickens on cooling so warm gently to loosen or thin with little water as desired. To prepare the salad, cut lettuce into wedges or cut leaves in half and pile on platter. Drizzle with 1/4 cup Caesar Dressing and toss to coat. Cut each chicken thigh into 3-4 pieces and each bacon rasher into 4 pieces. Arrange evenly over salad with tomatoes and croutons. Drizzle with more dressing, then serve remainer in a small jug. Garnish salad with basil or parsley leaves and grated parmesan. Delish!
