#### Local citizens' Award Honours and Seven New Citizens Welcomed

The Shire of Dardanup celebrated Australia Day in style with three breakfast events held in Eaton, Dardanup, and Burekup today.

These even'ts brought the community together to honour Australia Day Award recipients and officially welcome seven new citizens to the Shire.

Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner described the day as a celebration of community spirit, cultural diversity, and achievement.

"It was a privilege to welcome seven new citizens to the Shire of Dardanup, coming from five different countries — Philippines, Indonesia, United Kingdom, India and New Zealand," Cr Gardiner said.

## Community Citizen of the Year Award winners and nominees:

#### **Dardanup Heritage Collective News**

Settlers cottages in early Dardanup

The idea of thatched roofing conjures images of romantic cottages in small English villages but some of Dardanup's earliest homes also used thatching and had wattle and daub (plaster-like) walls. This would have been a building style well understood by many migrants who came to Western Australia in the 1840s/1850s; farmers and labourers from rural England, Ireland and Scotland. Their homes were modest and affordable at the time, using local materials.

It is interesting to see images of these houses where the majority of settlers would have lived. The Clearys thatched cottage was probably typical of a number of homes in the area. It was removed in about 1920 when Mary Ann Cleary built the current timber and iron cottage on Clearys Road.

Another more local building style had bush slab walls with a shingle or tin roof. Dardanup's first Wayside Inn from about 1850 was of this construction type. It was located near the northern end of what is now Venn Road, once the main road to Bunbury.

The cheaper materials used tended to deteriorate with time and there are almost no examples left of these buildings. An early bush slab cottage at *The Dell* is one example that still exists.

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**February** is the beginning of the Noongar Season *Bunaru* (Second summer). It is the traditionally the hottest month although this year I'm not sure if it will be Hot & Dry or Muggy with some rain... *Time will tell!* Regardless, we

need to garden smart. Maintenance is best done in the cool morning/ evening and retreat to the house during the heat of the day. The strong easterly winds tend to frazzle us all, so think about slowing it down with some kind of wind break. Water consistently, mulch to reduce water loss and providing shade from the hot afternoon sun will help to reduce the damage in your garden.

Even if you are watering consistently, you may notice that plant leaves tend to droop significantly especially on really hot days. In my garden this is really obvious in the Pumpkin patch. Don't be tempted to put the sprinklers on in the middle of the day or you may just steam those vegies before dinner! Plants are clever, by 'drooping' their leaves they reduce the leaf surface area, which reduces water loss and heat on the leaves. When it cools down in the evening the leaves will outstretch again and the plant will stand up as per usual. You can help buffer the effects of heat in your veg patch by applying Seaweed emulsion - late afternoon once the temperature is below 25 is best and make sure you water it in well to make sure none is left on the leaves.

With the summer heat and humidity, Powdery Mildew can become an issue in our gardens. Brassicas, Curcubits (cucumbers, zucchini, pumpkins), Grapes, Roses, Strawberries and Raspberries are all susceptible. You will notice a white/grey powder-like coating appears on your plant. To prevent it spreading you need to prune/remove effected shoots and leaves. A milk spray can be helpful in reducing the spread but won't stop it. Old or stressed plants are generally more prone, also 'sappy' growth cause by over feeding with Nitrogen fertilisers. Good airflow and mulch is key to preventing this.

Old, tired or stressed plants are always more susceptible to disease. If you notice issues/disease in your veg patch, limit the impact by removing leaves or plants. Younger, stronger, healthier plants are less susceptible so plant a few new replacement ones in a separate bed. To keep your garden producing well into autumn, there is still time to plant another crop of cucumbers, beans and zucchini (yes more). Try a few of the quick cropping dwarf varieties of beans and plant seedlings of curcubits to give you a 3-4 week head start. Mulch them, erect some sort of shade and don't let them dry out. Fast growing greens will taste bitter if they get hot and water stressed so find a patch in the shade or try them in pots.

The Green Shield bugs are making their presence known, they discolour a variety of fruit and vegetables. Tomatoes are a favourite and you might notice yellow patches on your red fruit where they have 'sucked out' the juice. Starting off as small round black bugs with a few yellow dots, they grow into the green 'Stink bug'. I find the best way of dealing with them is to pick them off whenever I see them, then deposit them into a small bucket 1/2 filled with soapy water. This works for most of the unwanted 'bugs' without using nasty chemical sprays. You can compost the bucket contents after a few days and refresh.

It is time to think about Seed Saving. As the first summer crop sowings start to finish, be sure to let a few of your best non-hybrid plants go to seed. Herbs such as Coriander, Parsley, Basil & Chives are very easy to collect seed. As are Carrots, Capsicum & Chilli, Fennel, Tomato, Beans & Snow peas. Saving seeds that have grown well in your garden will produce better crops next year and save you money on seeds/seedlings next season.

Winter season vegetables are planted in early Autumn. It varies from year to year, but here it is generally in late February/March. The weather is still warm enough for good germination and growth before the cold weather sets in. Often you will find that your summer crops are still producing when you want to start planting your winter crops. This isn't too much of an issue, just plant into any of your spaces as you harvest. Growing from seed will give you the best choice of varieties however you will need to plant them asap so they will be mature enough to plant out before the cold weather. Or keep your eye out for seedlings as they become available. Covering your newly planted seedlings, especially Brassicas with netting will help to reduce the impact of Cabbage moths/caterpillars.

What can I plant in February?

<u>Leaf crops</u> - Amaranth, Endive, Lettuce, Rocket, Silverbeet, Celery, Chicory.

<u>Brassica crops</u> \* - Broccoli, Brussel Sprouts, Bok Choy, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Collard greens, Kale, Mustard greens, Chinese cabbage. <u>Root crops</u> - Beetroot, Carrot, Radish, Potato, Kohlrabi, Celeriac, Parsnip, Salsify, Swede, Turnip, Scorzonera. <u>Curcubit crops</u> - Cucumber, Sweetcorn.

<u>Legume crops</u> - Dwarf Beans.

<u>Onion family</u> - Leeks, Spring onions, Shallots, Onions. Be sure to make the most of your summer abundance - bottle, stew, freeze, dry and cook up a storm.

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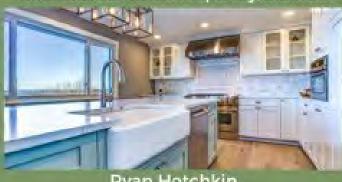

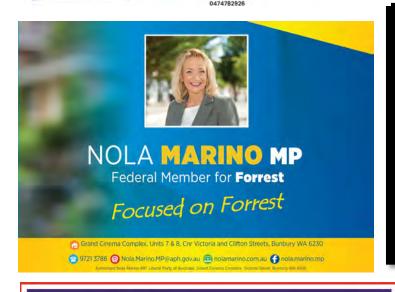
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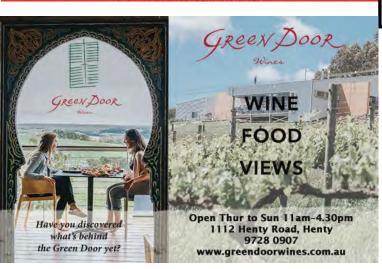

They were asked by the Editor of the Dardanup Times to tell you about their volunteering journey in the hope it will inspire other locals to give volunteering a go. That's if you don't already volunteer!

#### Crooked Brook Forest Group

I have been asked to give a brief story of the Crooked Book Forest as part of Dardanups Australia Day breakfast ceremony.

Not far from here, on Crooked Brook Road, where the coastal plain gives way to the native forest is an area with facilities for anyone to use. This patch of Jarrah forest was developed by a group of locals 31 years ago. Many of the original members are still involved with the building projects and maintenance of these facilities.

This state forest was originally controlled by CALM , Conservation and Land Management , now renamed DCBA, Dept of Biosecurity, Conservation and Attractions.

We have created an attraction and they have supported us the whole time. They have funded some of the amenities such as toilets and BBQ's while the volunteers have funded some projects and donated their time to build some of the shelters and bridges.

What have we achieved in 31 years? You will find toilets, BBQ's in shelters, picnic tables, a 600m walk suitable for wheelchairs, 5 and 10 km bush trails, a small playground for children and a lookout with views over Dardanup, Bunbury and the Indian Ocean. The facilities are accessible 24 hours a day to groups or solitary walkers. We recently had 50 people turn up mid week to have a BBQ lunch however most of the time you will always get a seat at a table near a BBQ.

Looking into the future, we are currently in discussion with DBCA for 2 projects. For families we would like to provide an adventure playground and for groups we would develop a speaking circle or amphitheatre for groups to use for public meetings and private events .

So 30 years ago a group of inspired and capable local volunteers had a vision, then had the fortitude to see those ideas grow into what we have today. As with most volunteer groups maintaining numbers is crucial to the continuing success of projects. Peoples lives change . Some leave the area and new people move in. After 30 years some of the original members are still helping , still willing but not as physically able as they once were.

I would like to take this opportunity to invite anyone who would like to learn more about the forest to have a chat to me or any other of the members . Your questions can be about volunteering or any other inquiries about using the facilities. If you can spare some time , we have approximately 4 busy b's through out the year, usually a Saturday morning finishing at noon and followed with a lunch. These are simple tasks of maintenance to keep the trails and structures in good shape. If you are new to the area or a local who has yet to visit , come and take a wander through the forest or a take a refreshment up to the lookout and watch a sunset .

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## Dardanup Environmental Action Group News Attention! Attention!

A Cleanaway Community Reference Group meeting was held last week. Two DEAG members attended, and were advised that Cleanaway have submitted an application to accept PFAS contaminated soils at the landfill site in Banksia Road (aka Mt Rubbishmore).

Whilst we don't want to alarm everyone at this stage as we don't have all the information, we wish to alert you to this proposal. DEAG does have a lot of concerns regarding the landfilling of PFAS contaminated soils in Banksia Road. PFAS chemicals are dubbed 'forever chemicals' because they don't break down easily, can last in the environment for thousands of years. They can accumulate in humans, and other living species, and are highly mobile in the environment through water, the atmosphere and food chains.

Currently there is only two other sites in WA that are licensed to take PFAS contaminated soil, both just outside of Perth. Dardanup could become the third site, and our concern is that once licenced to take PFAS contaminated soil, then other waste within the same category will come from across the State.

Cleanaway submitted the application prior to Christmas, and DWER will shortly be assessing it before putting it out for public comment. This could be in February, so we want to forewarn you about this so you have time to think about it. DEAG will advise the community on our findings when we meet with DWER, and we believe Cleanaway are going to distribute a Q&A, as they had been advised at the Community Reference Group meeting that the community will have lots of concerns about this.

#### Wellington Mills Unveils Community Sculpture

Creativity, community and Christmas were celebrated in Wellington Mills on 13th December as residents gathered in its Community Park for festivities and the opening of a new

community sculpture - The Leaf Shelter. The locally-crafted artwork represents the timbered woodlands of Wellington Mills and acknowledges the cultural and natural heritage of the Wellington Mills community. Approximately 60 residents attended the ceremony where local artisan, Rob Doherty, explained the 13 year journey of the Leaf Shelter from vision to completion, before cutting ribbons and cake.

But the Leaf Shelter's history and symbolism actually run

much deeper.

future generations.

Rob used materials including old bricks made in the southwest that were salvaged from buildings, and created wooden seating out of timber from the Bunbury Jetty. "The jetty timber would have originally been sourced from here explained Rob. "It's spent 100 years under water, which is why it's full of worm holes. Some forward-thinking community members saved it, and now it's done full circle and is back in Wellington Mills".

A metal interpretive panel melds a range of salvaged objects, such as an old saw blade, railway relics, milking cups and a churn to represent the three main industries on which Wellington Mills was founded - timber milling, dairy farming and the railway. Rammed earth, steel and local timbers have also been used in the leaf-shaped, multi-media design.

It was always part of Rob's vision to record past and present Wellington Mills residents in the structure. One of the shelter's panels comprises a mosaic of wooden leaves, on which residents have engraved their family names. Leaves were also engraved for past residents, and there's space for

"The leaf shelter is a unique and distinctive way to reflect the history of Wellington Mills since it was settled in 1896", commented Mike Hall, whose family have lived in the Wellington/Ferguson district for six generations. "Having names on the leaves connects people. It shows where we've come from and how we have evolved from a mill town, to farming and are now a connected group of people with diverse interests
