## JUNIOR WIND-UP



#### Shire of Dardanup National Finalist for Sustainability Award

The Shire of Dardanup's Library, Administration and Community Building has been honoured as a national finalist in the 2025 Urban Development Institute of Australia (UDIA) Awards for Excellence. Representing WA in the Sustainability category, the building was recognised for its innovative, environmentally responsible design at the awards ceremony in Brisbane on 19 March 2025.

Shire President Tyrrell Gardiner said being named a finalist among Australia's most forward-thinking projects was a proud moment for the community.

The building previously won the State Sustainability title at the UDIA WA Awards in 2024 and two awards at the IPWEA Awards for Excellence.

Constructed as the fourth all-timber build by the Shire, the facility showcases the Council's commitment to sustainable construction and environmental stewardship.

#### February Ordinary Council Meeting outcomes

The Shire of Dardanup considered several key matters at its Ordinary Council Meeting on Wednesday, 26 February 2025, including plans to explore replacement options for a local footbridge, updates to a draft policy on strategic water tanks, and responses to community-raised motions on urban canopy and landscaping.

#### Key decisions from the meeting included:

#### Council to explore options for footbridge replacement

The Shire of Dardanup Council resolved to explore alternative options for replacing the timber footbridge between Pratt Road Lookout and Watson Reserve.

Council has requested that Shire staff investigate potential replacement designs and costings and bring these options back for review.

Further updates will be provided once replacement options have been presented to Council.

#### Revised draft policy on strategic water tanks endorsed

Council endorsed a revised draft Local Planning Policy for the provision of strategic water tanks for firefighting purposes in non-reticulated areas.

The decision follows the identification of an administrative error in the previously endorsed 2024 version of the policy during the community consultation process.

As a result, Council resolved not to proceed with the 2024 version and instead endorsed an updated 2025 draft policy for public consultation.

The revised draft policy aims to ensure the community is properly informed and can provide feedback before a final version is considered.

# Council responds to electors' motions on urban canopy and Ferguson Road landscaping

Council also endorsed actions in response to two motions raised by electors at January's Annual Electors' Meeting. Council resolved to include in the review of the Council Plan an action to develop a policy encouraging an Urban Canopy Strategy for the Shire. This will be considered as part of the 2025/2026 budget deliberations.

Additionally, Council directed the Chief Executive Officer to investigate the landscaping options outlined in the original 2018-19 road plans for Ferguson Road and to present these options for Council's consideration in the 2025/2026 budget.

**Postal vote supported for 2025 Local Government election** Council unanimously endorsed the appointment of the Western Australian Electoral Commissioner to conduct the 2025 Local Government Election on 18 October 2025.

Council also confirmed that the election will be conducted as a postal election, ensuring accessibility and convenience for voters.





**Year 4:** Students are designing 3D food chain models. Exploring food chains in our Nature Play area.






## APRIL 17th, 2025, 5:30-7:00 pm, Eaton Community Library

**April** is the beginning of the Noongar season **Djeran**. Autumn is here, the morning air is cool and the Magpies song has changed.

Take advantage of the warm days to help along the growth of your newly planted Autumn and Winter crops.

April is a busy month for both planting and pruning / tidying up in the garden. Healthy soil means healthy crops. If you haven't done it already, get busy preparing your soil. Feed the soil microbes by adding compost or aged manure, some rock dust and/or vermicompost (from your worm farm). Remember that your Brassica crops are 'hungry' and will need enriched soil to give you a good harvest. During the colder months, extra applications of fertilisers and tonics take longer to be effective, so good soil preparation now will save you time and effort during winter.

If you haven't started planting your favourite longer season Brassicas (Broccoli, Brussel Sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower & Kale) now is the time! They take between 12-20 weeks before harvest so find some healthy seedlings and plant them 50cm apart. Fill in the spaces around each seedling with faster growing crops such as asian greens, beetroot, lettuce, radish, rocket and spring onions. This maximises the yield from your space and gives you something to eat while you wait for the brassicas to mature.

An interesting faster growing relative is Kohl Rabi, it develops a swollen stems/bulb above the ground, can be eaten raw in salads or cooked like a turnip, also the leaves are delicious. There are green and purple/red skinned varieties (both are white inside) and make great companion plantings with celery, lettuce, spring onions and beetroot. Plant them 15cm apart and you can start harvesting the 'bulb' from 10 weeks. Best grown in the cooler months, you can stagger sow the seeds for continued cropping until late spring. They are hungry crops but don't require very deep soil so even suitable to plant in pots!

Peas need a trellis for support, even the dwarf varieties. They have fine tendrils that like to 'grasp' hold of the trellis, so chickenwire or jute netting works well. Sugar snap and Snow pea varieties are great for producing less waste as you can eat the whole pod. Dwarf varieties grow 0.5m-1m tall and mature

in less than 60 days. Tall varieties grow between 1.5-2m tall you start picking from 70-80 days. Best planted as seeds directly into the bed (5cm apart) they enjoy a sunny spot that is well drained. Regular picking encourages more flowers and gives you more peas! A trick for keeping a continual harvest is to plant your second lot of pea seeds once the first lot begin to flower.

Parsnips are one of my favourite root vegies and really easy to grow if you have fresh seed. They take 100 days to mature and benefit from frost or cold temperatures for better flavour. They can be slow to germinate so be patient and you can plant a fast growing crop of radish in the same spot. If you are wanting a few to go with your Christmas dinner then consider planting some in the garden soon.

If your summer crops are finishing fast and the garden is looking a bit empty then grab a few packets of quick crops like radish, rocket, mizuna, pak choi and lettuce. Punnets give you a 2-3 week head start on the seeds. Even faster are sprouts pea, broccoli and cress can give you a harvest in less than two weeks.

#### What to plant in April?
