Dardanup Art Spectacular Celebrates Successful 21st Year.

250 artworks were displayed at this years Dardanup Art Spectacular Exhibition entered by 149 artists. Since 2017, 456 artists have entered this competition which has become a widely recognized and highly respected artistic event in the region. This year 60% of those artists entering lived outside the Shire of Dardanup with the 40% remaining either adults or children who reside from within the Shire. 9 artists from within the Shire of Dardanup were classed as emerging artists which has been the vision of the Art Spectacular Committee and the Shire of Dardanup to provide a platform for emerging artists to showcase their work.

The Exhibition Opening and Awards Night held on Friday 4th April saw more than \$13,050 prize money awarded over 12 categories with Adrianne Kinnear taking out the \$3000.00 major prize for her painting 'River Gum'.

Dardanup Art Spectacular Chairperson Kerry Lowe said "the exhibition provided a great opportunity for not only established artists but for those wanting to build confidence in exhibiting their work. The Dardanup Art Spectacular was created to encourage our local young and emerging artists to enter a competition and to provide a platform for them to have their art recognized" The Dardanup Art Spectacular Committee thanks the Shire of Dardanup for financially supporting this event for 21 years and our major corporate sponsor Quantum Underwriting Agencies. Bunbury Farmers Market provided the delicious food with our local wineries and breweries supplying the wine and beer for the Friday night opening all served by the Dardanup P& C and OLOL P&F. The 2 schools benefited from the proceeds on the Friday night, raffle and the gold coin entry over the weekend raising \$4818.00 \$15980.00 in art was sold from the hall over the weekend. A record for the art Spectacular Committee.

The raffle was organised by the Dardanup P&F and Our Lady of Lourdes P&F. Winners were Barb Della- Sale who won a Pamper pack and Eaton Tavern voucher; Lorna won the gift pack compliments of Simon Bushell and Treendale Farm Hotel; Anne won the Ciao Bella dresses gift pack and store voucher; Delia Dillon won the Scentsy pack and Ange won the Rose Hotel voucher.

The Dardanup Art Spectacular Art Trail held on 5th and 6th April attracted hundreds of art lovers to venues in Dardanup, Ferguson Valley and Wellington Mills. Historic buildings, home studios and wineries hosted over 40 artists giving visitors the opportunity to meet the creators behind the many mediums on display. In addition, a trail of more than 30 sculptures as part of the Ferguson Follies Sculpture Trail was coordinated by Peppermint Lane Lodge on their idyllic property.

The Event survey revealed that 33% of those attending the Dardanup Art Spectacular and Art Trail were from the City of Bunbury, 32% were from the Shire of Dardanup and 7% were from the Perth metro area.

Kath Keefe from Green Door wines commented that the Art Spectacular weekend increased business at their winery.

Many beautiful wreaths were laid, Maureen Ward recited the ODE and the highlight was Alexander Humphreys playing the Last Post and Reveille whilst the flags were raised by the 2 schools students and 1st Leschenault Scouts.

A very poignant address was delivered by Steve Gibbs who told us about his Great Uncle Basil Narroway Gibbs who served and died in WW1.

A special touch of the service was the Poppy Project organized by Dardanup Primary School teacher Amanda Drummond who got her students to create a paper poppy and write on each poppy the name of the 400 Dardanup and locality residents who served in any war and are listed on the wall near the War Memorial. The



poppies were then placed into the ground around the wall. A beautiful touch and thank you to the students and Amanda for being involved in our Anzac Day Service.

Dardanup Environmental Action Group News

DEAG has recently received advice from Dept Water Environment Regulation (DWER) that they have approved the Amendment to Cleanaway's Licence so they can accept Class 3 PFAS contaminated waste. This is despite all the work DEAG and this community has put into opposing this amendment. DEAG and members of our community put a lot of work into the submission opposing the amendment as well as the Shire also opposing the amendment. Very disappointing to say the least.

Over the last month DEAG has

- Distributed a flyer to all the community advising of the concerns with regards to storing PFAS contaminated waste at Cleanaway's Banksia Rd Landfill site
- Launched an online petition opposing the application to store PFAS contaminated waste at Cleanaway's landfill on Banksia Rd- 1762 signatures were received and and the petition was emailed to 2 Govt Ministers, our local member Jodie Hanns and 3 opposition politicians.
- Organised Facebook posts 4 anti PFAS videos with key people in the community. These were viewed by 300 – 7500 people

You can rest assured that DEAG will continue to oppose any expansion plans at the Cleanaway Landfill site, comment on all applications by Cleanaway and ensure that the site is being managed in accordance with the licence.

Vale - Joan Coralie Lantzke 5/5/1923 —28/3/2025

Joan died peacefully on Friday the 28th March, aged 101. She was a beloved Mother,

Grandmother and Great-Grandmother.

Joan was born in England and moved to Australia as an infant with her parents and older

brother. Inspired by her mother, she had a career in nursing and midwifery. She lived

abroad and travelled widely during her life, settling in NSW on the Central Coast then living in Canberra until the death of her husband Reginald.

Recently widowed, she fell in love with the Ferguson Valley after a visit to Lisa and Tony in 1993. The rolling hills had worked their magic, so she came to live in a cottage at Wellington Mill Farm. She named it "Durisdeer" which in Gaelic means Entrance to the

Forest. Joan was a lady of her time, always making an effort to set the table prettily with

the best china, a posy of flowers, some classical music and be well groomed to entertain her guests in her genteel manner. She could also be found hot, sweaty and in old gardening clothes digging holes, weeding and working in her beloved garden wherever she lived. Her hard work was rewarded when she won Dardanup Lions Best Urban Rural Garden Competition in 1997.

A caring and community minded woman, she became involved in various local groups.

While she never held a driver's licence, thanks to lovely friends she was able to attend the Ferguson Book club, Seniors, Red Cross, The Guild and had many shopping trips and outings.

Joan was an inaugural member of the Dardanup Senior Citizens, she held the position of Secretary for a time, then scribe sending birthday cards and writing letters to member who were ill. She loved the outings, picnics and bus rides. Her dear friend Rhonda Weetman would take photos and then Joan later compiling them in Albums with her beautiful printing, recalling the occasions. The albums are still preserved for members to enjoy and relive the memories. At times she was the social writer for the District Times, informing people of the Seniors Activities and always ending the Report with "take time to smell the roses".

Compassion and Community spirit were constants through her life - Remembered for

always helping others, knowing what to say - to cheer or soothe. She had a gift for caring, whether it was baking a cake, making a posy or compiling a thoughtful note or letter. This extended to Joan teaching anyone who was interested how to knit or crochet beautiful Knee Rugs for the needy. These were distributed to Palliative care in the Hospitals and Hostels, also to "The Wheelchair for Kids" Organisation which is run by the Rotary club in Perth. The Wheelchairs together with a rug and a toy were sent to countries all over the world for disabled children suffering in places of war or natural disasters. She also knitted hundred of Bears that were donated to St Johns Ambulance.

A staunch ANZAC supporter and passionate member of the Dardanup Red Cross, she

received many Long service medals and certificates of appreciation for services spanning 30 years. Proudly getting up before Dawn and hoisting the Australian flag at services. Fondly known as Mumma, she loved and was loved by all her family, playing scrabble and snap with the grandchildren. She also loved a good party and many will remember her 90th birthday party at Ferguson Hall where 90 friends joined in her celebration.

She was diagnosed with dementia at 92 but fortunately, despite suffering from short term memory loss, she remembered and recognised her family and those friends who visited her always. She moved to Gaelic Lodge in 2017 where she grew a beautiful courtyard garden and spent many hours playing games of cricket with her great grandchildren. Thrilled with the possibility of being wicket keeper and then bowler as girls were never allowed to play when she was growing up! Joan moved into Regis Residential Care in 2022 where she was very well cared for by

some amazing staff members. Daily family visits and many family events including her

100th birthday were highlights, although she always insisted that she wasn't 'Old'.

She was a member of St Aidans congregation, lovingly polishing the brass for many years and donating a cloth for the Altar that was hand tatted by her Aunt Moggie. It is this little chapel full of memories that has become her forever home. She has a view to the hills and the Ferguson River flowing by, surrounded by beauty and special friends.

Loving sympathy to all her family. She was much loved by all. A life well lived.





Green Waste Kerbside Collection 12-21 May 2025

Get ready for the Shire's Green Waste Kerbside Collection, which is back this autumn, giving residents the chance to tidy up their gardens and responsibly dispose of green waste.

The Shire will conduct the collection in the townsites of Eaton, Millbridge, Burekup and Dardanup from Monday, 12 May until Wednesday, 21 May 2025.

What will be collected:

Tree and shrub cuttings (up to 2 cubic metres).

Maximum branch length: 1.5 metres.

Maximum branch diameter: 200mm.

What won't be collected:

Lawn clippings or roll-on turf. Green waste in bags or boxes Hard waste (e.g. timber). Stumps.

Piles larger than 2 cubic metres.

Important reminders:

All green waste must be placed on the verge before 6am on Monday, 12 May.

Waste should be kept clear of reticulation, water mains, electrical domes, footpaths, street signs and street corners.

100% of green waste collected is recycled into compost – helping your garden and our environment!

Streets will only be serviced once. Waste placed out after the collection or in an incorrect manner will not be collected and must be removed by the property owner or occupier. Council cannot provide specific collection times or dates.

The Shire will conduct its Spring Green Waste Collection from Monday, 20 October – Saturday, 25 October 2025.

May is the second half of the Noongar Season *Djeran*. It is usually the time when the first rains come, we begin to experience cooler mornings with dew and with the chill in the air. Listen out for the

melodious chorus of Koolbardi (Magpies) their autumn song is beautiful.

definitely time to be planting your winter veg patch with urgency. Yes, there is still time to get your winter vegies in the garden, but to ensure you get a timely harvest you will need to plant seedlings of the longer season crops such as Broccoli, Cauliflower, Cabbage and Kales.

Don't forget your Legumes! Sugar snap peas are one of my favourite you can eat the whole pod - no food waste and they are great as a snack, in salads or steamed for dinner. I also adore the old fashioned Broad bean. In my frosty inland garden, I plant my broad beans now. They grow slowly over winter, I harvest some of the tops for greens and they flower then pod in spring. Closer to the coast you can wait until August/September then plant yours, giving you more space for fast growing crops or plant them now for a nourishing cover crop in your patch.

Anyone else got a few weeds? It is the perfect time to get composting! Utilise all those greens, any fallen leaves, old mulch, spent hay and chipped up garden prunings to make some homegrown fertility. If you need some help getting started or ideas on how to make it less of a chore then book in for this months workshop at the Dardanup Hall or check out my upcoming ones at the Bunbury Library. It is Composting Month!

Lately the focus of many gardening questions have centred around concerns with household budgets and rising food costs. Growing your own can save you money and we can be thrifty with how we set up and manage our spaces. Here are 3 ways to help you garden smarter...

1. Write a list - What do you buy regularly and what are you most expensive vegies/herbs? Eating Seasonally can provide significant savings, as will looking at where the product is grow - locally grown means less transport costs! Grow the more expensive crops and buy the cheaper staples.

2. Grow your Greens - These reliable, easy to grow and nutrient dense crops will help bulk out your meals and most can be grown in very little space. Greens are also one of the most heavily sprayed crops so worth growing your own Parsley, Silverbeet (Swiss Chard), Kale, Spinach, Mustard Greens and Rocket. Most of these are cut and come again so you can continue to harvest them for the entire season. Great value crops.

Small Space Substitutions - These pack the flavour without We had already experienced a few blustery days of late, so it is needing lots of space, you can even grow them in pots! Try Spring onions instead of Onions, Garlic chives instead of Garlic, Silverbeet instead of Spinach, Parsley instead of Celery and Kale instead of Cabbage.

Plant now:

<u>Leaf crops</u> - Celery, Cress, Collard greens, Chicory, Endive, Lettuce, Mizuna, Choi Sum, Gai Lan, Pak Choy, Chinese Cabbage, Mustard greens, Rocket, Spinach, Silverbeet, Radicchio, Witlof and Corn salad. Brassica crops (seedlings only*) -Broccoli, Broccoli Raab, Brussel Sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower and Kale. Root crops - Beetroot, Carrot, Radish, Daikon, Celeriac, Kohlrabi, Salsify, Swede, Turnip. Legume crops - Broad Beans, Snow peas and Peas. Onion family - Garlic, Leeks, Spring onions, Onions, Potato onions, Tree onions and Shallots. Herbs - Artichoke, Bay, Chives, Coriander, Fennel, Lemon Balm, Mint, Rosemary, Oregano, Parsley, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme and Burdock.

While you are waiting for the 'main harvest' many of our common Autumn/Winter vegies have edible leaves making them useful additions to salads, stir-fries and stews/ curries. These include Beetroot, Carrot, Celery, Choko, Broccoli, Onion, Radish and Sweet Potato. Have fun getting creative in the kitchen and Happy Gardening!

The next Sustainable Living Workshop is on Thursday 8th May at the Dardanup Hall, from 10am -11.30am. The Topic: Homegrown Fertility - Composting made easy. Rarely do we have the space, materials or energy to build traditional hot compost heaps. However, this doesn't mean that our only option is to continually buy in fertility. Come along as we 're-think' how we can utilise food waste, weeds and garden prunings. Learn how to increase soil fertility and soil health in your backyard - transforming your 'waste' into something wonderful! 
