Best Practice entity in financials again

For the second consecutive year, the Shire of Dardanup has been recognised by the Office of the Auditor General (OAG) as a Best Practice entity in financial reporting for the 2023/24 financial year.

The accolade comes from the OAG's annual Local Government Financial Audit Results report, which reviewed the financial reporting practices of 135 local governments across Western Australia.

Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner said the significant achievement highlights the Shire's continued excellence in financial management that reflects the professionalism, integrity and dedication of the entire organisation.

"To be recognised as a Best Practice entity for a second year in a row is a big deal — it reflects our organisation's consistent commitment to the highest standards of financial governance," he said.

"This outcome is not just a win for our Finance and Governance team, but for our entire Shire.

"It's a shared success that every staff member and community stakeholder can be proud of."

- · Quality of financial report (financial statements and notes).
- Quality of working papers that support the financial report.
- · Management resolution of accounting matters.
- · Availability of key staff during the audit.
- · Number and significance of management letter findings.

· Achievement of a clear audit opinion.

Unrestricted burning period

The Shire of Dardanup entered the Unrestricted Burning Period on 10 May 2025. Burning permits are no longer required, but conditions still apply. Burning is not allowed during Total Fire Bans or if the Fire Danger Rating is High or above. Burning is prohibited on land under 2000m². From 1 May 2025, all new residential building permit applications to the Shire of Dardanup must meet the updated seven-star energy rating standard under the National Construction Code (NCC). Shire mural celebrates culture, community

The vibrant new mural now proudly displayed on the Shire of Dardanup building is the work of local emerging artist Grace Janowicz, winner of the RCR NAIDOC Week Art Competition.

Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner said Grace's stunning mural design, titled Wanju, has transformed an external wall of the Shire's Administration, Library and Community Building into a dynamic and meaningful celebration of place, people and culture.

Commissioned through a collaboration between RCR Mining Technologies, CheckMate Art Gallery in Bunbury and the Shire of Dardanup, the mural was brought to life during a week-long live painting session by Grace — who was selected as the winner from a pool of Noongar and non-Indigenous artists.

Cr Gardiner said the title of Grace's piece, Wanju, which means "welcome" in Noongar language, resonates strongly with the Shire's own commitment to welcome and inclusion.

"Grace's mural stood out for its bold street-art style and thoughtful reflection of life in the Shire of Dardanup," Cr Gardiner said.

Grace said the project pushed them out of their comfort zone — but in the best possible way.

"When I look at the mural, I see strong connections to community and country," Grace said."

"I wanted to create something bright and fun to look at, but also something that connects people to the cultural roots of the land."

Eaton Rec Centre gets new look

The Eaton Recreation Centre has undergone a major refresh, with upgraded changerooms, toilets and showers now open to the community.

Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner said the works have made the Centre more modern, comfortable, and accessible for all users.

"The Eaton Rec is a place where people of all ages come to stay active and connect," Cr Gardiner said.

"These upgrades ensure it continues to meet the needs of our growing community."

Key improvements include:

- · Upgraded changerooms, showers, and toilets
- · New accessible toilets in the hallway.
- Entry wall removed to open up the space
- Fresh coat of paint, more internal upgrades to come.

The works were supported by the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program – Phase 4.

The Centre attracts over 280,000 visits a year and is home to fitness classes, a 24/7 gym, social sports, crèche, vacation care, and top local clubs like the SouthWest Slammers and Eaton Basketball Association.
