

# **Discover Japan**

Our travels led us to Japan this year, a lastminute decision, but an amazing one.

We landed in Tokyo, the largest city we have ever seen by far. Miles of concrete buildings and highways. The major roads were all above the ground, often 4 storeys of roads. Mind blowing! In Tokyo we visited the Skytree, the tallest tower in the world, and got a 360 degree view of Tokyo, so many tree lined roads and even still some

cherry blossoms were out. We also visited our first of many Buddhist Temples, originally founded in the 7<sup>th</sup> century, and an incredibly busy market shopping district, and enjoyed a stroll around the Hamarikyu Gardens.

From Tokyo we caught the bullet train to Odawara, cruised across Lake Ashi and braved a cable car for views of the surrounding hills and lakes, apparently!!!, the only thing we saw was drizzling rain and cloud cover all day. So, no views of Mt Fuji at all, all day. One of our major highlights was lost in the clouds.

We travelled onto Takayama, a beautiful place and enjoyed a stroll through the morning markets, a museum, and other very old architecture. Then headed onto Shirakawago, a UNESCO-listed village with steep thatched roofs and cherry blossoms. Onto Kyoto, and to a Zen Temple and incredible zen garden with fifteen stones, cleverly arranged so that one rock is always hidden from view. Fifteen is considered the number of perfection; just as no individual is perfect, viewers are unable to see all the stones, reminding us of one's imperfect and limited perspective.

We then drove to Nara and fed the sika deer, who have learned to bow to visitors, and insist you feed them! And then into the mountains to experience the beauty of Mt Koya, the heart of Shingon Buddhism, and Japan's largest cemetery, before heading to Osaka. Here we walked around the Osaka Castle and strolled the extremely busy Dotonbori district before our final evening.

Throughout the tour we also were a little crafty making washi paper, decorating a pair of chopsticks with gold leaf, we attempted origami and the rituals of a tea ceremony. Japan is such a mountainous country, so many tunnels, and spectacular views everywhere we went. We unfortunately didn't see any cows, but Phil has a new 'cow' shirt! It was a fantastic tour and we have learnt so much of Japan and how steeped it is in history and culture. We had a wonderful time.


# **Ferguson Valley Visitor Centre New**

## Dardanup Heritage Collective News War Service Personnel

The Anzac ceremony at Dardanup this year featured the story of Basil Gibbs from Ferguson. Born in 1899, Basil commenced school at Ferguson in 1895, finishing his formal education in 1903 to work on his family's farm, *Sunny Corner*.

Basil was 26 when he enlisted with the army in August 1915, where he was noted as a logger/timber worker. He would have worked on the farm seasonally and supplemented the family income at the nearby Wellington timber mill. His records show he was at Blackboy Hill Camp and Helena Vale Camp before sailing on the *SS Medic* on 18 January 1916, arriving in Marseilles, France two months later.

Basil was killed in action at the Battle of Flers in November 1916. Over a hundred years later, his death is still deeply felt by descendants of the Gibbs family. His story, recounted by Steve Gibbs, is partly told through his letters home to family.

### **Dardanup Environmental Action Group News**

You may have seen all the recent publicity surrounding the concerns about the PFAS contaminated FOGO managed by Bunbury Harvey Regional Council sited on Banksia Rd. Even made Landline! Unfortunately Dept of Water, Environment and Regulation have given approval for Cleanaway to accept this PFAS contaminated FOGO plus any other Special Class 3 waste. The fight still goes on with DEAG submitting an Appeal opposing this approval for a variety of reasons. The process now is the Appeals Convenors assess our Appeal which may include further questions of DWER who approved the application and then recommendations if any by the Appeals Convenors to the Minister for the Environment who may or may not approve these recommendations. DEAG thanks Ruby Trevathan who organised the petition and facebook posts, Noel Hayward who worked very hard organising our Appeal submission, Lionel Machen for making

his home and himself available to the ABC and GWN news and the 22 people who assisted DEAG in our PFAS Appeals submission which shows the concerns far and wide and the opposition to Cleanaway accepting PFAS contaminated waste at its Banksia Rd Landfill site. Quite a few of the people who assisted have environmental science qualifications so if they are concerned then I think we all need to be concerned. DEAG has already had 1 meeting with the Appeals Convenors over our Appeal with a team of 3 travelling down from Perth to meet with us. They have suggested further meetings will be held on this issue before they make any recommendation to the Minister for the Environment.

Whenever you have the chance folks keep talking to your neighbours and family about the ever expanding Mt Rubbishmore. DEAG needs everyone to stand up and protest—Dump the Dump!

# **Dardanup Lions Club News**

"I love a sunburnt country, A land of sweeping plains, Of ragged mountain ranges, Of drought and flooding rains."

The problem comes when one of the big 3 calamities comes (fire's the other one), the toll is felt by farming families without feed for their livestock. In response and with help from Lions the organisation "Need for Feed" was set up.

Relief in the form of loads of donated hay was first undertaken with delivery from a convoy of trucks back after the 2009 Black Saturday fires.

Fast forward to December 24 when a run was organised to help hungry sheep after the Grampian Fires. First for year 2025 was when more than twenty five trucks delivered hay to the flood affected areas of Western Queensland on the Australia Day weekend.

Anzac Day and a different state and circumstance. The Need for Feed ran thirty three trucks and forty two trailer loads to drought affected areas of South Australia. The South Australian Government assisted with the transport costs.

Our club has responded to a request for funds from the Lions Victoria "Need for Feed' association/project with a donation of \$1,000. Phil Ottrey



South Event: Learn what an enhanced farm dam could achieve on your property

How can farmers improve livestock production, support biodiversity and reduce farm emissions all at the same time?

The answer is enhancing farm dams.

By fencing out livestock and revegetating around dams, water quality can be improved, leading to more weight gain in animals. Revegetation also increases water quality and provides habitat for critters. And on top of all that, improved wetland health means a reduction in greenhouse gas emissions.

In partnership with South West NRM( Natural Resource Management), Leschenault Catchment Council is hosting an event on Thursday, 26 June at Evedon Park to raise awareness about the benefits of enhancing farm dams.

The event will look at what enhancing a dam looks like and how emerging carbon and biodiversity markets could support landholders to fund this work in the future.

How does enhancing a farm dam link to carbon markets you might be wondering?

When manure and fertilisers enter a dam, it can become an emitter of greenhouse gases like methane.

Fencing and revegetating around dams can significantly reduce emissions and carbon in the atmosphere creating potential for funding opportunities through carbon markets.

A recent study found enhanced dams recorded lower levels of nitrogen and phosphorus and higher levels of dissolved oxygen. The result was a 56% reduction in methane emissions compared to typical dams!

With governments around the world encouraging strategies that will reduce emissions, many businesses are looking for ways to offset their own emissions by supporting reductions that occur elsewhere such as on farms!

With almost 2,000,000 dams across Australia, this seems like a winwin. And to sweeten the deal, the Australian Government is supporting development of "Carbon and Biodiversity" markets farm projects can be sponsored and carbon credits traded.

To learn more, we'll hear on the day from a carbon market consultant and from South West NRM about their new demonstration site at Thomson Brook where they are monitoring changes in greenhouse gas emissions and stock water quality.

Plus LCC will look at examples of other local dams that have fenced and revegetated in the past and provide advice for planning and managing vegetation around dams.







#### Let's talk parking safety in our Shire

Shire Rangers are out and about helping to keep our roads safe and accessible for everyone across the Shire of Dardanup.

A common issue they're seeing is vehicles parking against the flow of traffic – particularly in busy areas like town centres. While it may seem convenient, this type of parking is:

- A breach of the Shire's Parking Local Law 2022.
- A hazard when pulling out into oncoming traffic.

Not safe – even for a quick stop.

#### Here's how to park right:

- Park in the same direction as traffic.
- Use safe, legal bays.

Stay clear of driveways and pedestrian paths.

#### Avoid:

- Facing oncoming traffic.
- Stopping in unsafe or tight spots.

Following others doing the wrong thing.

Rangers take an education-first approach, followed by written warnings if needed. Infringements may be issued where unsafe or repeat behaviour occurs.

#### **Ordinary Council Meeting highlight**

#### Council opposes revised amendment 1 to Parkridge Structure Plan

Councillors unanimously supported a motion to recommend that the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) refuse updated Amendment 1 to the Parkridge Estate Structure Plan, following a reconsideration order given by the State Administrative Tribunal to the WAPC.

Council in November 2023 previously recommended refusal of an earlier iteration of Amendment 1 which was upheld by the WAPC. The revised amendment proposed changes to Public Open Space, residential layout and lot yield, which were considered to result in adverse environmental impacts and be inconsistent with planning policy.

June marks the beginning of the Noongar season *Makuru*. Traditionally these are the coldest and wettest two months of the year with frequent storms. This is the time of the year for bonfires and backyard clean ups. I enjoy these too but before you burn

everything... lets rethink the concept of 'waste'. In our gardens there are resources we can use to create fertility, make support structures and even extra plants.

The summer veg are finished, deciduous trees are shedding their leaves and the weeds are plentiful this time of year, making it the perfect time to start composting - It doesn't have to be too complicated or time consuming and you can use a bay, plastic dome/bin or ring of mesh lined with shadecloth. Cutting up the material as fine as you can will speed up the process, a shedder/chipper is fantastic but a lawnmower will also do the trick. Why buy it, when you can make it and know what is in the final product! If you are limited on space or material you can make a 'weed tea', just be sure not to add any weed seeds to your brew. Some of your tree prunings will be too woody and thick for the compost but perhaps may make good sturdy tomato stakes for next season, a bean trellis or shade structure.

Edible Perennials need a bit of care and maintenance this time of year. Increase your future yields by lifting and dividing herbs such as mint & chives, rhubarb crowns and globe artichoke suckers. Stressed and overcrowded plants are beacons for pests so you will reduce spring aphid population explosions by dividing you garlic chives too. It is also a good time to plant out asparagus crowns and berry canes, keep an eye out for them in your local nursery.

The winter months are a great time for observation, reflection and planning. How did your garden perform over summer. What lived/died and were there any standout crops? Is there anything you can change to make the space more efficient and resilient moving forward? We aim to have productive gardens but they also need to be cost effective.

Starting crops from seed will save you money and also open up a world of new varieties. I love to support WA local seed sellers but also buy some of my seeds in bulk from <a href="edenseeds.com.au">edenseeds.com.au</a> in Qld. They have an excellent and informative website to help you choose the right variety for your growing conditions. I love finding new and tasty open pollinated crops to add to my regular ones. Why think about this in winter? Well, if you want to grow from seed and have them ready to plant out, it takes some time and preplanning. For example, I start my tomatoes seeds in August ready to plant out in the garden in October. This also means I can plant when I am ready, not having to wait until plants are available in the shops.

Are you thinking about expanding your orchard or designing a food forest? Now is the best and most economical time to plant Natives and Bare rooted trees as they are in stock at most nurseries. Check for varieties that are suitable for your area. Remember to double check fruit trees for their pollination and chill hour requirements before you purchase.

Another money saving tip is to maximise your harvest and reduce your food 'waste'. Brassicas are abundant this time of year but don't forget that the stems and young leaves are also edible! Once you harvest the main Broccoli head, give the plant a feed and within a week or so it will start to produce side shoot 'florets'. You can keep picking these for months as long as you don't let any go to flower. To keep everything happy and healthy this time of year, I apply a good quality soluble Seaweed or Fish emulsion tonic every couple of weeks. <a href="soildynamics.com.au">soildynamics.com.au</a> have a great range. Remember that higher Nitrogen % is good for leafy vegies but not your root veg. Check your labels carefully, *more is not better*. You can alternate with your homemade weed or comfrey tea. The cold temperatures slow down growth significantly, so it is best to only plant quick growing crops or advanced seedlings in your vegie patch. What can I plant in June?

<u>Leaf crops</u>: Asian greens, Cress, Lettuce, Mustard greens, Witlof and Chicory. <u>Brassica crops</u> (seedlings only): Broccoli, Cabbage, Collards, Kale and Spinach. <u>Root crops</u>: Carrot, Radish, Parsnip and Potato (frost free only) <u>Legume crops</u>: Broad Beans, Snow peas, Shelling Peas and Sugar snap peas. <u>Onion family</u>: Onions, Salad onion, Potato onions, Tree onions <u>Edible Perennials</u>: Artichokes, Berry canes and Strawberry plants.
