August heralds the beginning of the Noongar Season *Djilba*. It is referred to as the first Spring and it is when we begin to enjoy the initial flush of wildflower blooms. Generally we still

experience a mix of wet days, clear cold nights, and this trend doesn't change until late in the month or into September. We have had a series of cold fronts bringing welcome rains but the mornings have been rather chilly! In frosty areas keep an eye out for low single digit or minus temperatures and make sure you keep protecting those sensitive crops.

Winter crops are hardy to the cold and continue to produce an abundance, so it is the perfect time to preserve any excess for use later. Many of the kales, Brussel sprouts and winter roots taste better/sweeter after a frost. This time of year I take the opportunity to freeze batches of washed and chopped mixed greens and portion up sautéed 'soffrito' (carrot, celery and onions) for use in cooking later. It saves me a good 15mins prep and cooking time which is very welcome on a busy weeknight. It is time to start planning and planting for your spring and summer garden. Raising plants from seed is the cheapest way to produce abundant vegetables. Try to purchase organic, open pollinated seed as it gives you the option of keeping your own seed at the end of the season and gives you greater choice of varieties. The soil is still cold so the best choices are faster growing crops (40-60 days) such as Radish, Bok Choi, Pak Choy, Rocket, Mizuna, Tatsoi, Spinach and Turnip and some of the slightly slower growing (60+ days) Beetroot, Peas, Carrots, Parsnips and Broad beans. Root crops prefer to be direct sown where they are to grow as they don't like the root disturbance. For other crops you can start the seeds in tray, punnets or pots to reduce rotting or them getting eaten before germination. You can also speed up the germination rate by soaking larger or wood seeds overnight and if you have a warm spot of greenhouse they will appreciate being kept out of the wind and for the soil & ambient air temperature to be above 10 degrees.

This summer season you will need to keep in mind that Tomato, Capsicum and Chilli seeds may be limited to the supply Fruit Virus out of WA. It is worth going through your stash or searching out your favourites early so you don't miss out. Now is the perfect time to get them started, especially if you want home grown tomatoes before Christmas. Most summer crops such as tomatoes, beans, corn, cucumbers, and zucchini need warmer soil at 15+ degrees C. You can grow these in a greenhouse, on a window sill or a sheltered sunny corner with a closh at night. Capsicum, chilli, melons and pumpkins are some of the most sensitive to cold and need soil temperature in excess of 18 degrees C, so are best planted in ground in November.

To give your seeds the best start, a good quality seed raising medium/soil is very important. You already in WA, this is in an effort to keep Tomato Brown Rugose can purchase ready made ones or make your own with Compost, Coir peat and Sand. There are a variety of different 'recipes' on the internet just remember a good mix should be light and airy, whilst retaining moisture without becoming waterlogged. Remember to wear your PPE when handling compost, potting soil and mulches - Even the homemade ones! There have been quite a few deaths linked to Legionnaires disease in the greater Bunbury region over the last few years. Wear a face mask and gloves when opening bags and keep your mix moist when using. Dispose of the bags and Wash your hands well afterwards.

If like me you have a few weeds around the garden, why not turn them into garden gold and make some compost. It is a great activity for warming you up on a cold day! Choose a bin, bay or heap to suit your garden size. You don't have to get it perfect the first time - start simply by adding layers of weeds, dry leaves, spent hay, prunings and kitchen scraps, "lasagne style" and make sure each layer is moist/wet before adding the next. With a cool or cold compost you don't have fill the bin in one go, you can add more as you have materials available and it will take 6-9months to break down. I like to make it where I need it rather than wheelbarrowing it around the countryside... Pop one of you compost bins directly into a garden bed that needs a bit of love and fill it there. Once is to full and broken down, lift the bin off, spread out the compost and move the bin to the next spot.

Want to get busy planting in the vegie patch? While it is still a bit cold, quick growing crops are best. As it warms up then you can plant more: Leaf crops - Asian greens, Cress, Lettuce, Mustard greens, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Sorrel, Spinach. Brassica crops* seedlings - Cabbage. Root crops - Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi. Legume crops - Snow peas, Dwarf Peas, Broad beans. Onion family - Leeks, Onions, Spring onions. Perennial Herbs - Artichoke, Asparagus, Strawberry plants, Nasturtium, Cape Gooseberry, Mint. Greenhouse only / heat mat- Capsicum, Chilli, Eggplant, Tomato, Sunflower

The Shire of Dardanup has officially ditched the use of harmful second-generation anticoagulant rodenticides (SGARs) in favour of wildlife-friendly first-generation alternatives across its facilities — a move designed to better protect native species and pets.

Following feedback from concerned residents and in support of ongoing campaigns by BirdLife Australia, the Shire has transitioned to using first-generation anticoagulant rodenticides (FGARs) at key locations including the Library, Administration and Community Building, Eaton Recreation Centre, Eaton Foreshore toilets, Shire Depot, Dardanup Office and Dardanup Hall. Shire CEO André Schönfeldt said the change reflects the Shire's strong commitment to environmental stewardship and responsible pest control practices. "We've listened to our community and acted to ensure our pest control measures align with our values," Mr Schönfeldt said.

"SGARs may be effective at killing rodents, but they're also deadly to the animals that eat those rodents –

including our owls, ospreys, lizards, and even beloved pets. That's simply not good enough.

"By switching to first-generation products, which biodegrade much faster and pose far less risk to native predators, we're helping keep our wildlife safe while still managing pests effectively."

Mr Schönfeldt said SGARs accumulate in the bodies of animals that consume poisoned rodents, often resulting in secondary poisoning and death — especially in birds of prey that are critical to natural rodent control. In contrast, FGARs are considered a safer alternative, as their faster breakdown reduces the likelihood of poisoning non-target species.

Eds note; All the community should take the lead from the Shire if they haven't already done so and eliminate the use of SGARs. Kirk and Emma from Dardanup Rural or Liz from the Dardanup Vets will be able to advise on the best FGARs products to use, if required.

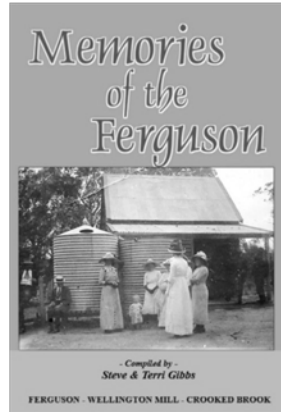

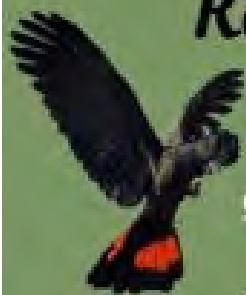

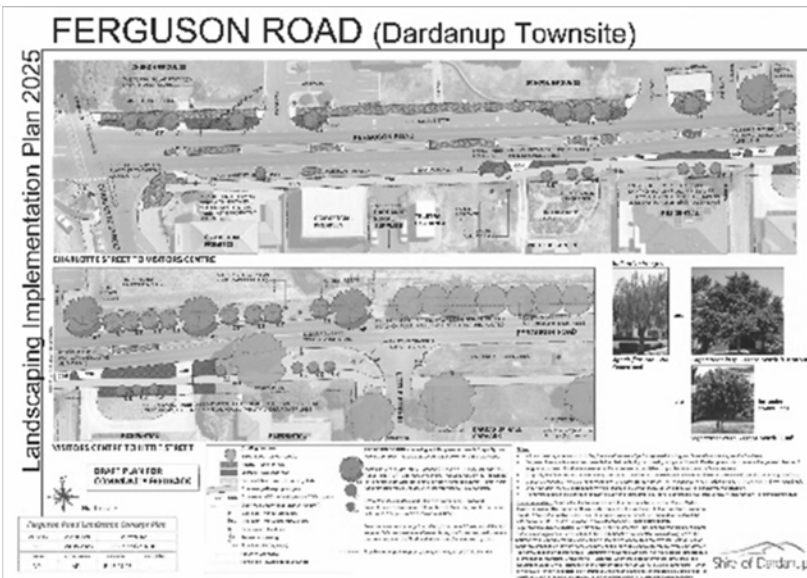

Next Gen Skills Program – Life skills for young people

The program includes hands-on workshops covering topics such as health, finance, trades, technology, and culture. Participants can choose to attend individual sessions or take part in the full week of activities. It's a great opportunity for youth to build confidence and capability in areas that matter most as they transition into adulthood.

Planet Matters – Worm farming workshop

Families, gardeners, and composting enthusiasts are invited to a fun and educational worm farming session hosted by The

Worm Shed. Held at the Eaton Community Library on **Thursday, 14 August from 4-5pm**, this Planet Matters event will teach attendees how to turn kitchen scraps into nutrient-rich compost, reduce household waste, and improve soil health. The session is suitable for all ages, and no prior experience is needed. Bookings can be made via the Shire's website, or attendees can simply drop in.

Responsible pet ownership – Keeping pets safe

The Shire reminds residents of the importance of responsible pet ownership to help keep animals safe and out of the pound. Rangers have noted an increase in impounded pets, many of which could have been returned quickly if registered or microchipped. Pet owners are encouraged to ensure their animals are registered, microchipped, and kept secure at home. Other key responsibilities include cleaning up after pets, keeping dogs on leads in public areas, and preventing nuisance behaviours such as excessive barking.

Shire Given Green Light For Local Planning Scheme No.9

The Shire of Dardanup's planning framework has entered a new era, with the Western Australian Planning Commission approving Local Planning Scheme No. 9 (LPS9). LPS9 was published in the Government Gazette on 23 June 2025 and now replaces Town Planning Scheme No. 3, which has been in effect since 1979.

Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner described the approval as a "game-changer" for the community.

"We're now working with a planning framework that reflects the needs and opportunities of the 21st Century," Cr Gardiner said.

"This is about setting the foundations for responsible growth while preserving the lifestyle, environment and values that make the Shire of Dardanup such a great place to live."

Cr Gardiner said the updated scheme brings the Shire in line with current State planning policy and provides greater clarity and consistency for landowners, developers and the wider community.

"With the South West region continuing to attract new residents and investment, the Local Planning Scheme No. 9 is key to ensuring well-managed development that supports thriving, connected communities," he said.

Shire Budget Reflects Responsible, Community-Oriented Investment From the Shire website

The Shire of Dardanup adopted its 2025/26 Annual Budget at last night's Ordinary Council Meeting, reflecting a disciplined and forward-looking approach to financial sustainability while continuing to invest in essential services and infrastructure for a growing community.

Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner acknowledged that the decision to increase rates by 6.1% was not taken lightly, especially given the financial pressures many households are currently experiencing.

"We know that times are tough for many in our community, and any increase in household costs can be difficult," Cr Gardiner said.

"This year's 6.1% increase in general rate revenue is necessary to keep up with inflation and the rising costs of delivering essential services, as well as to invest in renewing the infrastructure our community relies on every day." Cr Gardiner emphasised that the Valuer General's revaluation reflects strong growth and increasing demand for property in the Shire of Dardanup.

"The 49% average increase in residential property rental values is a sign of the desirability and continued development of our region," Cr Gardiner said.

"In response, Council has reduced the rate in the dollar to ensure this growth doesn't translate to an unrealistic rates burden. We're committed to managing this transition responsibly and supporting our community with fair, sustainable financial decisions."

The 2025/26 Budget outlines a budgeted operating expenditure of \$42 million, with a surplus of \$173,999 and a strong focus on maintaining service levels, renewing infrastructure, and preparing for future growth.

"We're being responsible today to avoid problems tomorrow," Cr Gardiner said.

"This budget reflects our commitment to long-term financial sustainability, ensuring we can continue to meet the needs of our community now and into the future."

Community satisfaction drives strategic investment

The Shire's budget priorities have been shaped in part by community feedback received through the [2025 MARKYT Community Satisfaction Scorecard](#), where nearly 900 residents shared their views.

The Shire was recognised as one of WA's top-performing local governments, ranking 2nd overall among regional councils and 8th out of more than 70 councils that have participated in the Scorecard since 2003.

The Shire was celebrated as an industry leader in several key areas, reflecting high levels of satisfaction across a broad range of services.

Cr Gardiner said this feedback has reinforced the Council's commitment to maintaining service quality while planning responsibly for the future.

"Our community has told us what matters most, and this budget responds to that," Cr Gardiner said.

"We're investing in the areas that residents value – roads, parks, community programs – while ensuring we remain financially resilient."

Investing in the future

"The Shire's key focus is to preserve and maintain the assets our community relies on today, while also building reserves to deliver the infrastructure and renewal projects our growing community will need tomorrow," Cr Gardiner said. "We're using our reserves wisely while ensuring we're setting aside enough to meet future renewal demands, in line with our revised Long Term Financial Plan."



France Or Bust

Who's mad idea was it to cycle around France? Well for a week anyhow! This was the aim of our friends Peta and Michael Gelmi and Tom and I, given none of us are spring chickens and only 1 of us regularly cycle. Me down to the front gate and back a couple of times before we left.

Arriving in Bordeaux and after a guided tour of that beautiful city we hauled our 8 suitcases to the large Bordeaux train station bound for La Rochelle, a city on the west coast of France. Our 1st experience at using French public transport wasn't a good one. Luckily we had bought our tickets online but despite this we couldn't find anyone to direct us to our train platform. The French in general don't speak a lot of English and you rarely over hear conversations in English. There was 6 halls which meant 6 areas where people gather to get on the train, so we are talking a huge train station and us lugging 8 suitcases up and down escalators in search of said platform must have looked rather comical. Anyhow with literally 2 seconds to spare we jumped on the train with the closing door nipping our backsides. We learnt a valuable lesson – look for the 4 small numbers on your ticket which will align with the train you have to catch. From then on over the next 3 weeks we became experts and rarely needed to ask for help. La Rochelle is a seaside city with an internal harbour and the old fortifications visible, built around the 11- 1300s. At the time of our visit there was a Festival being held so the place was very busy, pop up bands playing every 50 metres which tests your senses as everyone eats outside. Whilst we were enjoying our 1st seafood meal a drumming band decided to play in between the 2 existing bands. Very chaotic and entertaining. The tables at restaurants are all very close and the French seem to eat out a lot and they are able to smoke at the tables. Cant say it was ever so noticeable as mostly they seem to smoke e cigarettes so the smoke was controlled. Regardless you do notice far more people smoking that at home.

We met our cycling hosts the next day. Susan originally from Canada and her partner David originally from England but both living in France for quite some years. Luckily we were the only people on the tour so we had lots of attention from this pair. They also had a mini van to carry our suitcases which they advised we should cut in half thus leaving 4 at the hotel for our return as we had to train back to La Rochelle to continue onto the next leg of our journey. Thank god for lithium and e bikes. Forgot to mention that and bet you were thinking this was not going to be pretty. Anyhow once we all got the hang of riding an e bike it wasn't so hard doing our 50 kms per day. Susan or David took the lead each day and the other drove the van. It soon became clear to them that we needed to stop mid morning for a coffee. This became a challenge, not the stopping but what sought of coffee we would end up with. The French like their short blacks and I became a fan of those but my companions enjoyed milk with theirs and sometimes would order extra milk as the spoon could stand up in the coffee. And just because they advertise latte and you order latte didn't mean you would get a latte or any sought of coffee with milk. Anyhow one thing for certain was the baguettes filled with chicken and salad at lunch were divine and all the cakes not only looked delicious but tasted so as well. The french are big bread eaters and you always get a basket of sliced baguette with every meal whether you order it or not. The baguettes don't keep so the French buy fresh every day and we often saw people walking back from the boulangerie(bakery) with a baguette under their arm. The supermarkets are small too. Nothing like Woollies or Coles but a lot smaller. Spose if everyone eats out there is no need for too much food in the pantry. The other thing we did notice is that no one opens up til 10am, some shops close for a few hours in the middle of the day and open again about 3 until 7pm and everyone stays up very late no matter the day of the week and this includes children. Im talking 10.30/11.00pm here.

Cycling was certainly a different way to see the countryside as you see the small details. We all stopped each time we saw an otter or the huge white swans along with their cygnets which are common. Cattle always attracted attention, mainly Charolais and Limousin and the wheat, barley, corn and sunflower crops with Michael giving Susan and David a lesson on how to tell the difference between the 2 cereal crops and how they are harvested. We stopped in little villages and toured a chateaux, and old roman coliseum and Hennessy's

cognac processing plant in Cognac , following the coast along the way and the Charente River. We stayed in lovely hotels, some with swimming pools which was welcome as some days were warm. We cycled mainly on cycle paths which could be rocky and some of the time we had to cycle through built up areas and main roads with me crossing all fingers and toes. Though cyclists have right of way in this country. Anyhow we all made it to Cognac with none of us falling off and cycling 268 kms. And yes my backside got sore for the first few days and I had padded nickers and padded gell seat to boot. Should have done a few more kms on my bike before I left home!

Next stop was a place called Puy Du Fou where we stayed for 2 days. Its hard to describe except to say its unbelievable. Its set on about 500 acres with lives shows set on about 10 stages, mostly outdoor and some inside theatres. Most shows seat about 2-3000 people with the evening show probably closer to 10,000. The shows are all at different times and last for 20-30 minutes and depict part of Frances history. We went into a recreated roman coliseum and witnessed chariots races, parades and mock battles, another with birds of prey swooping above the audience, knights jousting and lots and lots of special effects too numerous to mention. The engineering feats were unbelievable. On the boundaries of the theme park are themed hotels. We stayed in a mediaeval hotel with the staff all wearing medieval costumes and ate in another hotel that was themed on Place of Versailles. We saw 10 shows in the 2 days plus the evening show which was spectacular - water spouts moving in time to music, coloured lights and people diving off platforms into water. You name it and Puy du Fou does it.

Onto Paris for a week and seeing all the sights; Eiffel tower, Notre Dame, Saint Chapelle, Palace of Versailles, Musee de Orsay and the Louvre to mention a few. One day we visited an art display of colourful inflatables in the Grand Palais and when we came outside found ourselves in the middle of a huge South American themed carnival that wound it way down the Champs de Elysée.

Then we trained down to Avignon where we boarded a river cruise for 2 weeks. The 1st leg was on the Rhone River finishing at Lyon where we trained to Paris to get on the 2nd leg on the Seine from Paris to Rouen where we bused to the Normandy beach's and viewed museums and cemeteries; the site of the WW2 invasions by the Americans, British, Australians and Canadians in 1944. Back on the Seine to Paris stopping to see Monets garden and Malmaison, the home of Josephine and Napoleon Bonaparte. So much history in France and some of the buildings are so ornate and huge its hard to comprehend how they were ever built and the cost at the time would have been phenomenal. No wonder a few lost their heads.

We tried to do our best for Tourism WA to promote our state and country with the result that im not expecting too many French people holidaying here, though we do get the odd backpacker. Time and time again when we did have some little conversations with the locals all they could

say about Australia was that we had plate sized spiders and kangaroos that wanted to punch you, not to mention the snakes and crocodiles. No matter how many times we denied that this was the case or they would only come across these animals if they were in the wrong place. They disputed all of this as they had seen in on youtube. Anyhow, besides you are too far away they would say!

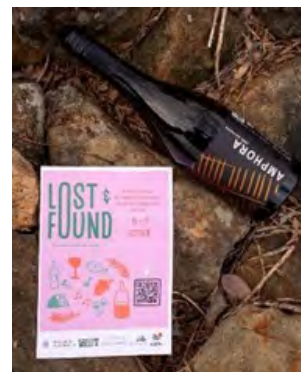
