What the Dardanup Heritage Collective Has Been Up To

Its been about 5 years since this Collective was formed and what a lot has been achieved in that time. The important aspect for our community is that we have been collecting, documenting and preserving that history for future generations which is so valuable and sometimes we maybe don't realise how valuable. I always think back to that saying" if you don't know where you've come from then you don't know where you are going". The rich history that we have collected and provided to the community mainly through oral history, books and the webpage has provided a foundation for future generations to build upon our history and develop our culture that we all hold so dearly.

Other tasks we have been involved with this year apart from our monthly meetings which are not only interesting but a time of sharing friendship.

- We have held 2 events. The 1st being in August last year when we joined again with other like groups in a display at the Bunbury Museum and Heritage Centre. The displays were around d the theme of ancestors and migration so our history boards made another appearance. How valuable have these boards been and how well travelled. The highlight of the day was the talk John Guimelli gave about the Italian migration which was very well received. The 2nd event was held in November when we again organised which is now annual event in the Thomas Little hall our Heritage Collective Forum. This was held in conjunction with the FVVC Xmas fete attracting people with both interests to our community. The 7 Women of Charlotte St boards were part of the display and we also organised a display of precious memorabilia from notable people in our community. Alongside the memorabilia was a note about the significance of the item to that person. The day was well attended.
- * DHC has visited 2 more local historic homes. We all loved the visits to Dardanup and Princep Park and could see what has been done to preserve these historic buildings and unfortunately what needs to be done. Money, money and more money!
- * DHC has been successful in applying for 2 grants this year thanks to Janice Calcei and Jenny Trigwells efforts. We have received funding from the Shire for stationary to support our archiving and Harvey Water which will enable us to tell the story of irrigation in the Dardanup Shire. This story will be displayed on our website and on another interpretive sign on the railway reserve in Dardanup to add to our walk trail collection. Once this is completed no doubt we will have an opening ceremony.

- * Janice Calcei has continued to provide the Dardanup Times with interesting historical stories plus continually updating the website with items of historical significance. Great effort Janice
- * Members have attended the Greater Bunbury History Organisation meetings which provides us with good networking opportunities.
- * The Shire offices were damaged in October which resulted in a postponement of our cataloguing as we were unable to access the office we have been allocated by the Shire. Recently that office has been repaired, and the old carpet removed with beautiful jarrah flooring exposed. As feat would have it we now have a lovely space to work out of and I know the Shire are still moving forward with plans to allow us more space in the building but this may take a bit of time. Discussions with the Shire have been ongoing.
- * 13 oral history recordings have been undertaken over the last 2 years and I know recently Tom Dillon has been interviewed thanks to Darline Morgan and Danny Harris. These recordings form a valuable part of our oral history collection as nothing beats hearing perspectives from those living history.
- * Jenny Golding released her book Memories of Waterloo. Jenny also continues to submit other stories for the DHC website. Wonderful effort on all fronts Jenny.
- * Jenny Trigwell and Janice Calcei assisted Gwen Wells with improving the quality of the James Maguire commemorative photo and thanks to Mike Hall for donating the frame. Again an example of DHC preserving our rich history and work in the community.
- * The book Memories of the Ferguson written by Steve and Terri Gibbs was out of print. Thanks to Steve and Terri and Janice Calcei the book is now on our DHC website for all to read
- * DHC has been donated historical books over the year which has added to our valuable reference collection.
- * Sales of the Women of Charlotte St and Adventures on the Ferguson continue via the FVVC.


Lights, Camera, Action!

Dardanup Primary School students donned their filmmaker hats and learnt how to produce, film and edit a short documentary about the town's history and landmarks.

Teachers, Ben Howlett and Mrs Drummond, said part of their HASS (Humanities and Social Sciences) curriculum focuses on researching and presenting information about local history and it was decided this year to create an opportunity for students to create short videos, bringing their research to life. <u>Dardanup Heritage Collective – Sharing our history & heritage through stories of people & place</u> was a valuable website our students found interesting and informative.

The project was made possible thanks to funding from the Creativity for Schools Collaboration program which supports students and teachers to engage in enriching learning through art experiences.

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September is the second month of the Noongar season *Djilba* and as the month rolls on our cool nights and mornings should make way for warmer, sunny days. We have certainly had a bit of a roller

coaster ride with the weather! Interestingly, on our little patch we received the average amount of rainfall last month in only 8 days rather than the typical 18 - our weather events seem to be coming less often but more severe. Definitely a trend to consider when we plan, plant and manage our gardens. I do hope your tanks are on their way to being full and you have found ways to catch rain of all your roof surfaces.

I am loving the wildflower show as the forest begins to come alive with colour - pops of yellow, white, red and a few orchids. This also reminds me that in the vegie patch we need to prepare ourselves for an invasion of weeds, pests and an overwhelming urge to plant! I find it useful to take my cues from the garden and it is also a good excuse for trying not to be too 'tidy' in the garden, letting some crops go to seed. Self sown annuals will begin to pop up when the conditions are right and if they happen to be in the wrong spot, simply transplant them while they are still small. Who doesn't love a few free seedlings!

Traditionally the period in early spring is known as the 'Hungry Gap' and it is a time when vegie pickings can be less abundant. Many of my winter vegetables are finishing and the spring/summer vegetables are not yet ready to plant or harvest. There are a couple of tasks that will help keep you fed over the next month. Firstly, its feeding time! keep feeding your current crops with liquid seaweed, fish emulsion etc (be careful not to overfeed, just follow the instructions on the label) and be sure to keep picking your broccoli florets - if you let them flower they will become bitter and the plant will stop producing. Secondly, start planting fast growing crops that you enjoy eating, this will help boost the varieties on your plate and fill the gaps. Microgreens, Sprouts, Radish and quick growing greens will brighten up your plate and fill out the meals. A bit of general maintenance goes a long way this time of the year. Onions and garlic need to be kept weeded as they grow, they really don't like competition and it will impact the size of your crop. I like to pinch the tops of my broad beans to encourage flowering and bushier grown. If you have a cover crop growing, the best time to cut it down is just before it flowers and definitely before it seeds. You can leave the tops to rot down in place becoming your mulch layer or add to your compost heap. It is also a good time to lift and divide up clumps of perennials, including Rhubarb and Horseradish.

Spring is around the corner! So it is time to get *Prepared*. We expect a lot from our plot, growing vegies requires fertile soil so add compost, manures, blood & bone, rock dust etc where necessary. Check the wetting ability, I know this sounds strange with the amount of rain lately but anywhere that large leaves have shielded the soil or heavily compacted areas may not be as wet below the surface as you think. Now is the time to make all the necessary amendments for an abundant summer crop and to ensure you avoid problems such as blossom end rot. Make the most of your growing area by including some vertical space. Beans, cucumbers, zucchini and pumpkins can all be trained on a trellis. They can give you shade and a crop - *Win, Win!* Installing the trellis structures prior to planting limits root damage and having some ideas for creating shade will save you time and heart-ache mid summer.


What can I plant in September?

Leafy crops - Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Choi Sum, Gai Lan, Mibuna, Mizuna, Pak Choy, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Endive, Cabbage, Chinese cabbage, Corn Salad Brassicas - Cabbage, Kale, Spinach Roots & onions - Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, Carrot, Parsnip, Salsify, Scorzonera, Turnip, Celeriac, Daikon, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Jerusalem Artichokes Legumes - Broad Beans, Dwarf beans, Climbing beans, Snow peas, Asparagus pea Curcubits - Cucumber Herbs - Globe Artichoke, Asparagus, Basil, Buckwheat, Coriander, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary, Summer savoury, Fennel, Horseradish In the Greenhouse - Capsicum, Chilli, Eggplant, Luffa, Tomato, Tomatillo, Sunflower, Rockmelon, Pumpkin, Watermelon, Zucchini

Bec Eades, Artisan of the Month at the FVVC



Is Cape Tulip invading your property? - Support is Available The control window for Cape Tulip, a declared pest weed that invades many local paddocks, is short. Take advantage of available support to landholders within the Shire of Dardanup.

Is Cape Tulip invading your property?

This time of year, many Dardanup West landholders begin to see Cape Tulip emerging in their paddocks. The "dairy flats" characteristics of many of the properties within this area provide for ideal growing conditions, allowing this invasive weed to spread quickly and thrive. The Leschenault Biosecurity Group, our area's local recognised biosecurity group, can assist with guidance and equipment loan for Cape Tulip Control on private properties.

WHY IT MATTERS:

Invasive: Cape Tulip, a declared pest weed in WA, is notoriously difficult to control. It spreads rapidly, displacing native plants and disrupting ecosystems.

Toxic to Livestock: All parts of this plant contain toxic glycosides which affect the heart. Cattle are most often impacted, but all grazing animals are at risk. Stock accustomed to grazing on paddocks with Cape Tulip tend to avoid through selective grazing, it, leaving Cape Tulip to dominate and reduce carrying capacity of the pasture.

Reduces Land Productivity: By replacing desirable pasture species, Cape Tulip lowers overall yield and degrades land quality.

Difficult to Control: Cape Tulip reproduces via seeds and underground corms, making eradication challenging without consistent

management. **Economic Impact:** Left unmanaged, Capel Tulip increases land rehabilitation costs and can cause significant financial losses to land-

Local Support is Available - For those with large infestations, the Leschenault Biosecurity Group encourages landholders within the Shire of Dardanup to contact the group to discuss control strategies and loan of one of their weed wipers. This equipment applies herbicide directly to targeted weeds by wiping them with a herbicide soaked "wick" that allows you to specifically target pasture weeds that grow higher than your grazing pasture. This means reducing off-target damage and salvaging precious feed for your stock.

The control window for Cape Tulip is very narrow, and arranging contractors in time can be difficult. If you have a Ute or ATV and are confident with your paddock terrain, the weed wiper could be a cost-effective option. LBG staff can talk you through guidance for your property-specific control strategies and equipment use, and — with enough notice—often deliver the unit to your property.

Why Use a Weed Wiper:

Target weeds such as Cape Tulip and young Cotton Bush are treated through direct contact with a herbicide rather than a conventional spray boom which can affect off-target pasture species.

Can be towed behind Ute, ATV, tractor or other.

More time-efficient and affordable than traditional spray methods for Cape Tulip (and other weeds)

Provides for application of herbicide directly to the plant, putting chemical on the weeds rather than the whole pasture.

Additional advantages of using a weed or "contact/wick" wiper are that you can specifically target pasture weeds that grow higher than your grazing pasture. This means reducing off-target damage and salvaging precious feed for your stock.
