Boost to Local Emergency Services With Additional Manager

The Shire of Dardanup has welcomed the announcement from the State Government that our community will benefit from one of the newly allocated Community Emergency Services Managers (CESM) positions in Western Australia. Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner said this outcome follows strong and persistent lobbying by Shire staff and councillors, who have long advocated for more on-the-ground support to help keep our community safe. He said the CESM program is a vital part of how local governments prepare for and respond to emergencies – working closely with our volunteer bushfire brigades, community groups and agencies to make sure we are ready before, during and after an incident. "This is fantastic news for our community and volunteers, the additional CESM will make a real difference locally," Cr Gardiner said. "We all know how important it is to be prepared, especially as we head into bushfire season. "Our CESM will play such a critical role in supporting our volunteers, coordinating resources and ensuring our Shire is ready to respond. "Council and staff have worked hard to push for more resources in this space,

so to see this outcome is really rewarding. "At the end

of the day, it's about making sure our community is as

the CESM announcement reflects a strong commitment to the South West. "The CESM role is an acknowledgment from the State Government of the need for further investment into the South West's emergency management sector "The position will only strengthen the relationships between the Shire and DFES and will allow us to improve and expand the suite of Prevention, Preparedness, Response, and Recovery (PPRR) activities for its communities." Dardanup Chief Bush Fire Control Officer Chris Hynes also welcomed the announcement, saying it would provide vital support for local brigades and the wider community. "This is a very positive step for our Shire," he said. "Our volunteers already do an incredible job, and this additional role will provide them with extra backing and resources, while also strengthening



collaboration between brigades, DFES and Shire staff."



(Editor's note. What follows is the first instalment of Rob and Diana's circumnavigation of Australia back in 2000 - 2004 on the yacht *Norlee*, a Sparkman and Stephens 39)

INTRODUCTION

Sailing has been a preoccupation for both Diana and Rob since they were first married way back in 1992. Sunday afternoons were spent pounding the rattling boards of yacht club jetties looking for the right boat; something not too small and not too big. The Court 750 at South of Perth Yacht Club (SPYC) looked tidy, the broker was young and enthusiastic, and before long, they were making plans to sail her back to their river mooring on the Swan right out front of The East Fremantle Yacht Club (EFYC). Now this is a sail of some 5 or 6 miles along a mostly benign river with the only challenge being the odd sand bank. They approached it as you would a rounding of Cape Horn. There were sleepless nights, anxious mornings and stomachs thick with butterflies.

They pushed off from SPYC and into 5 knots of fierce wind with seas noisily lapping inches above the waterline. Hours later, they tied up to the mooring outside EFYC and toasted their first successful voyage. They had made it. What relief. Little did they know that this tiny sail was to be the first of many voyages on yachts and in particular their circumnavigation of Australia. If someone had come on board after they pulled up at EFYC and said that one day you two will sail a yacht across to Sydney and in fact all the way around Australia they'd have told him, "ya dreamin". Dreams, however, have a habit of coming true.

And so to Tell Tales.

There were friendships made that will last a lifetime and there would be genuine fear as lightening boomed 50 metres from the boat half way across the Great Australian Bight. But there would also be discovery of the most exquisite kind.

So, sit back and enjoy the journey as Rob, Diana and Motley the ship's cat set out to sail Australia in their trusty Norlee.

"CHAPTER 1

BEGINNINGS

The dream had probably started for me (Diana) as a child when I consumed books such as Robinson Crusoe, The Swiss Family Robinson, and writers such as Thor Hyerdel and later Kay Cottee. I thought that perhaps the dream would take the form of building my own house, growing my own food, having a few chooks and being self-sufficient, but my Dad had also planted the sailing seed. As a twelve year old girl, he taught me how to handle our old clinker built cadet dinghy, Scylla. The three of us, Mum, Dad and I would tack, gybe and weave our way around the Swan River during Perth's long summer days. Mum, a determined, yet nervous sailor never forgave me for gybing the boat suddenly. She claimed she fell off the boat, but I suspect she jumped and felt a lot safer in the green waters of the Swan.

Sailing took a back seat in my life for many years, years, which were filled with study, children, a failed marriage and a new career and relationship. An opportunity presented for a crewing position on Dunrobin, a 22ft yacht sailing with an all-female crew from Royal Perth Yacht Club. The flickering pilot

light of adventure had been ignited. A country posting and a two-year sojourn in Japan where I married Rob seemed to satisfy the need for adventure and again placed sailing in the background. On our return to Perth in September 1992, it became obvious there was a gap that needed filling. We started doing jetty crawls, an affliction that affects most boating people. Jetty crawling involves walking up and down these long wooden walkways in a desperate search for that yacht you saw in the broker's window. Meanwhile, you breathe in the salty air, the wind gently ruffles your hair and your eyes seem drawn to the jagged horizon just over the sea wall. It's the stuff of dreams. I am sure bored landlubbers, after having done their Sunday jetty crawl, can actually taste the fresh crayfish and the chilled chardonnay and feel the warm glow from the sunset seen on anchor in some remote island far away. To jetty crawl is to drift pass boats that quietly sing their siren song of seduction; "why don't you step aboard, untie my lines and I will take you wherever your heart desires"... Before Rob knew what had hit him, we were the proud owners of Chardonnay, a 24ft Court. Six years of racing around the river taught both of us much about sailing, but there was more to be made of this life than sailing circles around the Swan River. Then Cruising Helmsman came into our life. It's a magazine that relates stories of people who have thrown off their mooring lines and gone cruising. The Cruising Helmsman is often the source of much jetty crawling. Our fate was sealed and the pilot light of a dream ignited into the flame of an idea. We were going to go cruising!

Harmony, a Viking 30, was the next stepping-stone in our journey. We thought we could transform this river racer with its spongy deck, lightweight rigging, and limited stowage into a cruising boat. It only took us eighteen months to realise our folly. Harmony would only ever be suitable for day sails and the occasional longer journey to Rottnest Island, a popular destination some 13 nautical miles off Fremantle or maybe even Geographe Bay, a sailing haven a hundred miles south of Fremantle.

I am a great believer in fate and resigned to the fact that I am just a leaf in the wind, going where the wind dictates. Norlee came into our life on a Saturday morning at a family function. During an inevitable lull in the conversation, Rob piped up and said, "I've found the boat of our dreams" "Funny about that, so have I"! I quickly added. Separately, we had perused the paper and found the same advertisement. "NORLEE S&S 39 THE BEST IN AUSTRALIA 130 000 ono.

We were a bit daunted by the price, but what the hell; it couldn't hurt to have a look. It was time for a jetty crawl. In no time we were down on C Jetty at Fremantle Sailing Club hoping for a meeting with the owner. We found Norlee and we were in awe of her elegant lines, her size and 'I mean business" demeanour. We were in love. However, the owner failed to show, so, despite a sneak peak though the hatch (it was unlocked...) we reluctantly walked away. It really wasn't meant to be and anyway, she was way beyond our means. As we dejectedly walked back along the jetty. I spotted a figure hurrying towards us. It had to be...yes it was the owner. Maybe this was meant to be. He didn't have to sell the boat to us, we sold it for him. Down below Norlee did not disappoint, with her polished teak, beautiful galley and fresh upholstery. The owner had spent \$70,000 refurbishing her only to have a change of heart and a different goal in mind. Our only problem now was how we were going to afford this beautiful vessel. To every problem, there is a solution and the solution was to move on board, rent out our house and continue to work for two years until we had paid her off. Within a week of signing over the papers, we were moving on board and starting a new phase of our life.

planting plans last month the soil temperatures are finally warm enough for me to start planting out summer crops in the garden. It is really important to keep an eye on soil moisture levels, especially if you have garlic and onions growing. If they get too wet they may rot in the ground before you get a chance to harvest them. As I harvest the remains of my winter crops, my spring / summer succession planting begins. It is a great tool for keeping my garden producing and it works for any sized garden. As I harvest something, I plant another crop in its place, this means I have something to harvest year round. If you love your summer salads a great tip to remember is *Leafy greens can be planted with everything* and are

October is one of my busiest times in the garden. After making

harvest year round. If you love your summer salads a great tip to remember is *Leafy greens can be planted with everything* and are great used as 'space fillers' and act as living mulch. Radish are delicious roasted, pickled or simply sliced and popped in a salad, making them a versatile quick growing crop for this time of the year. Does anyone else have an overwhelming urge to plant everything now!? For most crops if you stagger sowing seeds or seedlings you will have plants maturing at different times, less gluts and lower food waste. It is time to start thinking about Christmas - *yes, I did just say that ...* don't shoot the messenger just yet:) Here is my thought process - Do you want to brave the craziness of the shops during the silly season or would you prefer to just pop out and pick what you need from your own garden?

Garden smarter, It is as easy as 1, 2, 3... Plant once per season. Crops that take a long time to grow are generally only planted once and will mature with an extended crop for the entire summer season. These include Tomatoes, Eggplant, Chilli, Capsicum, Pumpkin, Sunflower, Luffa, Melons, Squash, Pumpkins & Silverbeet. Plant Twice per season. Crops that have a shorter time to maturity and harvest length can be planted twice and this will extend your harvest through into the autumn months. These crops include Zucchini, Corn, Dwarf Beans, Climbing Beans, Snow peas, Cucumbers, Gherkins, Beetroot and Carrots. Plant every 2-3 weeks. Quicker growing crops such as Lettuce, Asian greens, Cress, Rocket and Coriander can be planted every 3 weeks to allow for a continuous harvest. They prefer a sheltered, cool, shaded position or will 'bolt' in the heat.

Before you go crazy and plant everything.... I know it is very tempting... Have a think about how much time, space and water you have available. In our climate, water is one of the most limiting factors we have for growing in our backyards and community garden spaces. Make the most of your garden by growing crops that cost the most, are hardest to find, keep for the shortest time in the fridge and/or the ones you eat the most! I also like to choose varieties that

give me good yields for the amount of space or time they take to grow.


Why not try some new varieties - for example, Queensland Blue pumpkins are very popular but they take 110 days to mature and only give you 1 or 2 pumpkins per vine! My top 5 choices for yeild and better use of space are Golden Nugget, Potimarron, Buttercup, Kakai and Trombonchino. All grow smaller (~1.5kg or less), are delicious and have good storage fruit that suit smaller families / spaces, added bonus is you don't need a chainsaw to cut them open! Golden nugget give you 12-15 small fruit on a compact plant and is the quickest, meaning you can start harvesting from 75 days. Kakai is a good hull-less variety to grow for pepitas and while Trombonchino grows on a 6m+ long vine, it trellises really well and gives you both zucchini and pumpkins on the same vine. If you want to save your own seeds and keep them 'true to type' then you will need to grow several types from different species so they don't cross pollinate. Pumpkins belong to the Curcubita family and there are 3 different species we generally grow - C. maxima, C. moschata and C. pepo. The species should be written on the seed packet. My favourites to grow are Golden Nugget, Butternut and Trombonchino.

What can we plant in October? Just about everything! <u>Leaf crops</u> - Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Cabbage, Chinese cabbage Root & onion crops - Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, carrot, Parsnip, Scorzonera, Turnip, Celeriac, Daikon, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Yacon, Yam/Oca, Jerusalem Artichoke Legume crops - Dwarf Beans, Climbing Beans, Snow peas, Asparagus pea Curcubit & Solanum family - Cucumber, Luffa, Sweetcorn, Gourd, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Marrow, Zucchini, Tomato, Capsicum, Chilli, Tomatillo, Eggplant, Okra, Rosella, Sunflower. Herbs - Globe Artichoke, Asparagus, Basil, Buckwheat, Coriander, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary and Summer savourv Happy Gardening!

Is Cotton Bush invading your property?

Across our area, a quiet war is being waged against Cotton Bush (Gomphocarpus fruticosus)—an aggressive invader that chokes paddocks,

waterways, and native habitats. For many landholders, the battle has been long and frustrating. Cotton Bush returns, and spreads, season after season, with no simple or one-off "fix". But with persistence, hard work, and consistent follow-up over multiple control seasons, progress is being made. The war isn't over—but battles are being won

Our local Leschenault Biosecurity Group (LBG), which provides support to private landholders, has been actively supporting many landholders in their efforts to reclaim their land from this weed. LBG is helping landholders to turn the tide providing support including site visits for tailored control advice, equipment loans, referrals to contractors and long-term Cotton Bush management planning. Properties once overrun with Cotton Bush are showing signs of recovery with native grasses and productive pasture reclaiming lost ground. And with each season of action, the victories continue to

WHY IT MATTERS:

Invasive: Narrow Leaf Cotton Bush, a declared pest weed in WA, spreads rapidly, can form dense thickets that outcompete native vegetation and pasture species, reducing biodiversity and altering natural ecosystems. Infestations can spread across paddocks and into reserves, riparian zones, and roadside corridors, making coordinated management essential.

Rapidly Spreads: This plant reproduces by seed. Suckers may also be produced off lateral roots that are close to the soil surface. Its small, fluffy seeds are contained within distinctive pods that burst open upon maturity. Each pod can hold over 300 seeds, which are dispersed by wind, livestock, machinery and by floating on water. Toxic to Livestock: Cotton Bush is poisonous to livestock and humans, and has caused deaths in cattle, sheep and poultry. It is seldom consumed fresh by livestock, but may be dangerous if it contaminates hay, fodder or chaff. Severe gastroenteritis is the main symptom of poisoning by this species.

Reduces Land Productivity: Infestations of cotton bush outcompete valuable pasture species, forming dense thickets and making large areas of pasture inaccessible to livestock, reducing overall grazing capacity and increasing feed costs for livestock.

Difficult to Control: Once Narrow Leaf Cotton Bush takes hold, it can be very hard and costly to remove. The plant produces a seed bank that can stay alive in the soil for several years, meaning new plants are likely to keep popping up over several seasons, even after spraying or removal. This means follow-up work is essential over several years to fully get on top of an infestation.

Economic Impact: Cotton Bush can become an expensive problem if left unmanaged with landholders faced with reduced land use and high weed control and land rehabilitation costs, including lowering the carrying capacity of paddocks, increasing feed costs for livestock.

What happens when someone reports Cotton Bush sightings to the LBG?

Cotton Bush is unique in the South West for being the only declared weed with an active compliance pathway, backed by legislation, and enforced by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD). According to the LBG, reports of Cotton Bush to their group surged during the second quarter of the year, although the weed has remained widespread across the region throughout 2024 and into 2025.

When a report is made to LBG, it kicks off a structured process each step designed to assess, address, and support control of the infestation. Often, reports come from community members frustrated by infestations on neighbouring properties. These reports are crucial, as they help LBG target areas that may otherwise go unnoticed and limit further seed dispersal. All reports are treated confidentially to protect the identity of the informant. The intent is not about blame, but rather to alert the landholder to the need for action and as applicable support the landholder in undertaking control actions. From there, the LBG Weeds Project Officer conducts a site visit to verify the presence of Cotton Bush and assess the scale of the infestation. Determining land ownership can be complex, particularly when clear information isn't available. Once the landholder has been identified, LBG makes initial contact and provides information about their responsibilities and available support. In most cases, this results in positive action—landholders either begin their own control efforts or seek help from LBG via equipment loans or referrals to contractors.

From there, the LBG conducts a site visit to verify the presence of Cotton Bush and assess the scale of the infestation. Determining land ownership can be complex, particularly when clear information isn't available. Once the landholder has been identified, LBG makes initial contact and provides information about the landholder's responsibilities and available support. In most cases, this results in positive action—landholders either begin their own control efforts or seek help from LBG via equipment loans or referrals to contractors. Only in rare cases, where compliance isn't achieved despite written warnings and offers of support, does DPIRD step in to issue a Pest Infringement Notice (PIN), which can result in a fine. Fortunately, most landholders choose to cooperate well before the process escalates to this level.

Controlling Cotton Bush isn't just a legal requirement—it's a shared responsibility that protects the productivity, biodiversity, and beauty of our landscapes. Every report, every season of follow-up control, and every landholder who takes action helps in our collective battle against this invasive declared pest! Together we can better protect our beautiful and unique landscapes.
