Shire of Dardanup News

The Shire of Dardanup's newly elected councillors were officially sworn in on Wednesday, 22 October 2025 – marking the first ceremony of its kind to take place in the Council Chambers of the Library, Administration and Community building.

Six councillors have been elected including Tyrrell Gardiner, Luke Davies, Krystal Laurentsch, Annette Webster and Ruby Trevathan for four-year terms, and Brad Farrant for a two-year term.

They join continuing councillors Mark Hutchinson, Stacey Gillespie and Tony Jenour, who were not up for election this term.

The ceremony required each elected councillor to make a formal declaration, committing to serve the community with integrity, transparency, and dedication.

Former Shire President and Honorary Freeman of the Shire, Mick Bennett, addressed the newly elected Council.

Mr Bennett shared insights from his 28 years of service in local government, offering words of encouragement and wisdom about leadership, teamwork, and keeping the community at the heart of decision-making. His message was warmly received by councillors and guests in attendance.

Following the swearing in ceremony, Cr Gardiner was re-elected as Shire President and Cr Stacey Gillespie was elected as Deputy Shire President for the next two years.

As a fourth-generation councillor and following in the footsteps of his father John, who served as Shire President from 2011-2013, Cr Gardiner said it was a huge honour to continue in the leadership role after the past two years.

"The fact that people were willing to stand up and put their hand up for Council is the first step – and it's very exciting," Cr Gardiner said.

"I also want to thank Mick for his time as Shire President. I've really enjoyed the past two years in the role, and it's been made easier because of the way the organisation was left.

"This Shire really does punch above its weight, and it has a very bright future. To be the captain of that team is a privilege — and a humbling one. I'm thankful for the privilege of leading this team." Newly elected Deputy Shire President Cr Stacey Gillespie thanked

her fellow councillors for their support and said she was looking forward to continuing the Shire's strong record of collaboration. "I've been on Council for six years and I'm ready to take the next step. There are certainly big shoes to fill, our former Deputy President Ellen did a fabulous job," Cr Gillespie said.

"I take this role very seriously and see it as an opportunity not only to support the Shire President, but also to support all Councillors, especially our new members and hear the needs of our community. "I'm honoured to accept this position and am really looking forward to the term ahead."

Cr Gardiner added that the new group brings a great mix of experience, fresh ideas, and a shared commitment to supporting the continued growth and liveability of the Dardanup district. He also thanked outgoing councillors for their service and contribution, acknowledging their role in helping build a strong foundation for the future.

Bushfire Action Tips and Other Related News

Volunteer Bush Fire Brigades

Would you like to become a Volunteer Fire Fighter? Then why not join one of the Shire of Dardanup's 8 Volunteer Bush Fire Brigades and learn how to prevent fires and be trained in fire fighting! Volunteer Bush Fire Brigades protect the community, as well as attend fires all around the state and at times across the country. Male and female volunteers are very welcome. No experience is necessary as all training is provided. There are many dimensions to being a volunteer bush fire fighter and members are encouraged to choose the type of activities that best suit their capabilities and interest.

Volunteers are trained in the following areas:

- personal and team safety and survival
- fire suppression methods
- vehicle driving on and off road
- communications
- first aid

leadership and emergency management procedures.

If you don't feel you are up to fighting fires, you may want to consider joining a brigade's support team. The support team's main functions are to help our fire fighters and cadets with technical and welfare support during an incident, or during training and

fundraising.

Some of our brigades also have a strong cadet program and welcomes boys and girls from the age of 11 to 16 years to join. Being a cadet provides an opportunity for young people to learn about fire safety, fire equipment and develop important life skills through team exercises and leadership challenges.

Being a volunteer is a rewarding experience. It is an opportunity to meet new people, learn new skills and provide assistance in protecting your community. Respecting others, working together as a team and acting with honesty and integrity are the values embraced by members.

Prepare your emergency kit- what should it contain?

- It doesn't matter if you are staying or leaving, having an emergency kit can save precious time during an emergency.
- Everyone in the household should know where the emergency kit is kept.
- Your kit should include essential supplies such as an AM/FM battery powered radio, spare batteries, torch, first aid kit, woollen blanket, protective clothing, emergency contact numbers, important documents, water and non-perishable food.
- On the day, don't forget to add essentials such as your wallet/purse, car and house keys, medications and medical equipment, phone and charger, and pet supplies.

Prohibited Burning

All burning in the open is prohibited from 15 December until 14 March each year (subject to change).

Restricted Burning

Burning permits are required for all burning in the open from 2 November to 14 December each year, and 15 March to 26 April each year (subject to change).

Dates for Prohibited and Restricted Burning Times may change due to seasonal fire or weather conditions. All changes will be published on the Shires website and by public notice and local newspaper.

Firebreaks & Fire Prevention Measures

Fire prevention measures must be completed and all properties (including residential, commercial, industrial and vacant land) cleared of fire hazards on or before 30 November each year to reduce the risk of fires during the bushfire season. Properties must remain free of hazard until the close of the Restricted Burning Period.








ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER HISTORIES AND CULTURES



The Noongar season of *Kambarang* continues. The soil is drying out and the days are starting to heat up!! Make the most of the cooler mornings and evenings and get busy

tidying up before it gets too hot. It is your last chance to plant out the remainder of your long season crops including Pumpkins, especially if you are growing large varieties that require 100 days to mature for storage in Autumn.

I love the incredible diversity of a Summer vegetable patch and one of the benefits of living in a Mediterranean climate is being able to grow food year round. However, gardening in our climate during summer has a few challenges including Water, Heat and Shade or lack of... Here are my Top 5 tips for growing a Productive Summer Garden. Tip # 1 Grow smart - Focus on growing crops that give you the best bang for your buck - the ones you eat often, have a short shelf/fridge lifespan, can be hard to source and/or are expensive to buy. Tip # 2 Reduce your stress - planting seasonal veg varieties means tasty produce with less pest pressure. Tip # 3 Succession plant for staggered harvest and less gluts/food waste. Tip # 4 Get creative! Use your vertical spaces - grow food and create shade - Win, win. Tip # 5 Consistent watering is the key - always early morning or late afternoon.

Glorious Garlic! Harvesting time is nearly here and as your bulbs mature, keep an eye out for any scapes. A Garlic Scape is the flower stalk produced by hard-neck garlic bulb varieties and I find mine appear about 4 weeks before the bulbs are ready to harvest. Scapes are usually removed to encourage better bulb formation. They don't need to go to waste - they are very yummy added to stir-fries, sautéed with your asparagus and served over eggs for breakfast or added to a quiche. I make mine into Garlic Scape Pesto and freeze it in portions. Don't let your bulbs die right back, rot in the ground or pick them too early - you have worked too hard to waste the harvest now! * Here are my tips for knowing when to harvest your crop. Your garlic bulbs are ready when 4 leaves from the bottom have died/browned off, however I find a more reliable way to check is to brush a bit of dirt from around the top of the bulb, then run your finger around the outside of the bulb. You should be able to feel 'bumps' just like if you run your finger over knuckles on a clenched fist. These bumps are your well formed cloves. Cloves form in the last few weeks before harvest so if you happen to pick them too early the garlic will resemble an onion inside when cut open. Hang them to dry in a shaded area before brushing off the dirt, trimming the roots and plaiting them for long term storage.

With the price of eggs in the shop there is a renewed interest in people choosing to keep chooks at home. Many of you will be longtime fanciers and know the wonderful joy and incredible frustration that is the backyard chook... Chickens provide us with eggs, manure and at times can be a helpful clean up crew. They are fantastic foragers, will turn vegie scraps into compost but can also be mini tractors - chickens and newly planted seedlings don't mix - hence the frustration. While we grow a patch to feed ourselves, many commonly grown vegies and herbs are also useful companion plants for increasing the health of your chickens and assisting with egg production. Basil, comfrey, dill, fennel, lemon balm, nasturtium, silverbeet and parsley are all great for egg production. Add garlic, lavender, mint, oregano, rosemary, thyme and wormwood and

you have healthy hens. You can grow them around the edge of your chook pen or pick an occasional bouquet to supplement their grain and grit. Regular coup cleaning keeps them happy & healthy with the bonus that the materials can be utilised to increase your fertility at home. Chook poo is a great source of Nitrogen but needs to be composted before being added to your garden to reduce any potential fertiliser 'burn' and pathogen risks. Chooks are fun to watch and their eggs are a rewarding addition to your homegrown harvests.

What can we plant in November? Just about everything!

<u>Leaf crops</u> - Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Cabbage, Chinese cabbage <u>Root & onion crops</u> - Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, Carrot, Parsnip, Scorzonera, Daikon, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Yacon, Yam/Oca, Jerusalem Artichoke <u>Legume crops</u> - Dwarf Beans, Climbing Beans, Snow peas, Asparagus pea <u>Curcubit & Solanum family</u> - Cucumber, Luffa, Sweetcorn, Gourd, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Marrow, Zucchini, Tomato, Capsicum, Chilli, Tomatillo, Eggplant, Okra, Rosella, Sunflower. <u>Herbs</u> - Globe Artichoke, Asparagus, Basil, Buckwheat, Coriander, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary and Summer savoury

Dardanup Lions News



Early Settlement of Dardanup

By the commencement of World War I in 1914, the town of Dardanup had evolved from its colonial beginnings, surviving the trials of early settlement to become an important transport hub for local timber and agricultural industries.

The first inhabitants of this area were the Nyoongar people of the Wilman, Kaneang and Wadandi language groups. They lived from, and travelled across this land; towards the coast in the warmer months and inland in the cooler months, always near waterways. Nyoongar people cared for the land, burning country as they went to encourage new growth and attract game like yongka (kangaroos) and kwer (wallabies).

European settlement around Dardanup began in the early 1840s when the Reverend John Wollaston and his sons farmed an area known as *The Pools*. From that time until the end of the nineteenth century, Dardanup's economy was driven by a few large landholdings alongside smaller holdings taken up by migrants. From 1838 Charles Prinsep, through his agent Thomas Little, purchased over 20,000 acres of land in the area to breed horses for the Indian market. These properties were later run by his son Henry Prinsep who sold them to Henry Venn in 1877.

Thomas Little, an Irishman, purchased properties of his own. One would become *Dardanup Park*. From the late 1840s, Thomas and his wife Eliza supported Irish migrant families to settle on small blocks of land as tenant farmers in and around what is now the town of Dardanup. For much of the 1800s these smallholders subsisted off their land. Many lived in timber homes or whitewashed and thatched cottages, reminiscent of Ireland.



From the late 1840s, Irish migrant families at Dardanup often lived in whitewashed and thatched cottages like this one belonging to James Cleary. It was demolished in the 1920s and replaced with a timber cottage which still stands today.

Aside from horse and cattle breeding on the larger holdings, sheep, fruit, vegetables, potatoes, wheat and grapevines were grown on Dardanup farms.

Thomas Little established a strong Catholic community at Dardanup providing land and building materials in 1852 to construct the first Catholic church outside Perth. He also built the town's first school next to the Church. In the late 1800s and early 1900s, Italian migrants also began moving to the area.



From the 1840s until about 1900, the Dardanup area was home to large landholders like Charles and Henry Prinsep, Thomas Little and later Henry Venn. This image shows Thomas Little's standing in front of his house, Dardanup Park, in 1873.

A significant change occurred at Dardanup when the Bunbury to Boyanup rail line opened to locomotives in 1891 and the Bunbury to Perth line opened in 1893. Ready rail transport presented new business opportunities.

From 1896 the Canning Jarrah Timber Co. set up a large timber operation at Wellington Mills, accessed by rail, 19 kilometres east of Dardanup. Large storage yards, where sawn timber awaited transport to Bunbury port for export, were established at Dardanup. This was a turning point for Dardanup as many timber workers moved to the area.

By 1914, thanks these events, a town had formed along Charlotte St parallel to the railway line. The business life of the town was somewhat unusual as most operations were run by women, descendants of the first Irish settlers; the Dardanup Hotel by licensee Ellen Skipworth (nee Coonan), the general store by Catherine Prout (nee Slattery) and the Post Office from about 1905 by Mary Coonan (later Mary Holland).

A butcher's shop was built on Charlotte St in 1908 for Morrissey Bros, a well-known butchering business owned by the George Henry, John Patrick, and Richard Morrissey. In 1916, Dardanup would also become the site of large livestock saleyards, built to take advantage of ready rail transport to Bunbury and Perth.

According to diaries of George Fee, a Dardanup farmer, social life in the town was very lively. Even prior to the building of the Dardanup Agricultural Hall in1894 dances, socials, fundraisers and card nights were regularly held in private homes. The Catholic community remained strong in the town and the Church and presbytery were a focus of community and social activity.

The school set up in 1854 by Thomas Little, first at his home and then in a dedicated building, was taken over by the State government in 1880. A new public school was built and opened in 1897. In 1914, this was the only school in Dardanup although the Sisters of Mercy re-established Catholic education in Dardanup in 1920. From that time there would always be two schools.

Dardanup's population in 1856 was 110, with 75 of those recorded as Catholic or as tenants of Thomas Little. Fifty years later in 1898 the population was still only 118. By 1914 it was likely higher because of timber industry workers and probably around 150. When enlistees left Dardanup for World War I, thanks to the hard work and initiative of its early settlers, Dardanup had become a relatively sophisticated and connected community with a railway station, telegraph and postal services, thriving businesses and an active social scene. It would have been a beloved home for those who served.



This photo of Charlotte Street in 1916 shows how much Dardanup had evolved since early settlement. Hotel licensee Ellen Skipworth (formerly Coonan), sent the photo to her four sons at the Great War front; William and Joseph Coonan were killed in action while Michael and Marcus Coonan returned. The photo shows the Dardanup Hotel in the foreground, Morrissey's butcher shop next door, then the General Store. The post office is at the far end of the
